Preparations for Good Roads Day, next Saturday, are nearing completion. Over 600 tickets have already been bought for the "Good Roads Special," that will take the volunteer builders of Portland to work on the Columbia Highway.

There is keen competition between organizations to be represented by the largest number and to do the most work.

From reports made by representatives of a score of organizations at a meeting in the Commercial club last night it appears that to date the Woodmen of the World will have the largest number on the work.

Contest Getting Sharper.
The contest for this distinction will, however, become sharper before Saturday. The Ad club is especially anxious to furnish the largest number of workers because the plan for Good Roads Day was originated in the club.

S. N. Hewitt, chairman of the general Good Roads Day committee; J. B. Yeon, county roadmaster; J. Fred Larson, J. E. Werlein and others went this morning to the point near Latourelle Falls, where the work is to be done, their purpose being to mark out the stretches where the "gangs" of various organizations will be put to work. They will return to Portland this evening.

PLEA FOR HELP IS MADE BY AFRICAN MISSIONARY

Schools Needed to Teach Word of God, Says Dan Crawford, at Y. M. C. A.

Dan Crawford, African missionary and author of the sensational book, "Thinking Black," addressed large congregations at the White Temple, Young Men's Christian Association and First Congregational church Sunday, soliciting funds for his work.

"Take the map of Africa," he said; "half it, and half it again, and in the middle of the middle is my mission, 200 miles farther inland than Livingston penetrated. I have prepared a testament for my natives. I can teach the word of God, but we must have schools to carry on our work. Each school costs \$500. New York gave me four, Philadelphia three and other cities one. Can't Portland give me one, too?" he pleaded. "My natives would be Christians if they could; you could help make them Christians if you would. Why not get together on this proposition?"

Crawford's addresses were curious mixtures of wit, causticism, religious fervor and cynicism. "What do I see in Portland, Oregon?" "Signs saying go to church Sunday? Why, I thought Sunday was the day you were supposed to go to church."

He condemned savagely the idea of modern society that success is gauged in terms of worldly goods, pleading almost tearfully for help for his natives. Crawford declared also that this was his last trip to the continent. "I am disgusted with the snobbery, the selfishness of it all," he exclaimed, "and I am going back to finish my work among the blacks, who never argue whether there is a God. You will never see me again. This meeting of ours is tragic. Help me, I ask you."

meeting at noon tomorrow. The general question of Good Roads Day observance will again be before the club. Mrs. J. F. Graham, president of the Metzger Woman's club, in Portland yesterday, announced a plan for celebration of the day that involves not only a large amount of work accomplished, but a basket dinner and program at noon. Half a hundred men will be at work on the main road to Metzger, which joins with the Rex-Tigardville road, said Mrs. Graham.

Will Carry Own Lunches.
The work will be done under direction of the local road supervisor. The Woman's club of Metzger has undertaken to arrange for the picnic dinner and a good roads address.

"Tuition seems will haul gravel; 200 men will work at Chehalis Center, near Newberg," said E. T. Carnwell of the Ad club, who returned yesterday from Yamhill county. "They intend to build in one day two miles of permanent road."

In Portland all workers are expected to carry their own lunches. The fare for the round trip is 75 cents, this being less than the usual one way fare. The day will be divided between work and in seeing the scenic beauties of the waterfalls, cliffs and mountains that border the Columbia Highway where the road work is to be done Saturday.

Will Be No "Utility City" in Hood Valley

Voters Declare Decidedly Against Proposition to Create a New Municipality for Purpose of Issuing Bonds.

Hood River, Or., April 21.—The proposition to create the new municipality of "Utility City" out of a section of the Hood River valley was defeated yesterday by a vote of 753 to 27. The plan was launched with the idea of bonding the proposed municipality for light and power service.

The landslide against the measure was somewhat of a surprise to the voters. The defeat of the proposition is charged to the fact that the plan to make a city out of an exclusive farming district was considered somewhat of a "freak" measure, which would probably have meant serious complications in financial and governmental aspects.

Forest Grove Man to Manage Ranch

W. H. McEldowney Will Take Charge of Big Acreage of the Baldwin Sheep Company, in Crook County.
Forest Grove, Or., April 21.—W. H. McEldowney left this week for Crook county, where he will manage a 26,000 acre ranch for the Baldwin Sheep company. On the ranch are 20,000 sheep and 10,000 lambs, which were born this spring; 2000 hogs, which are fed in the winter upon a diet of alfalfa hay, and which, according to Mr. McEldowney, are topped out for the market with very little grain. Five thousand acres are used for general farming purposes, and alfalfa is raised on

17,000 acres. A store, hotel, blacksmith shop and several dwellings are on the ranch, and will be under the supervision of Mr. McEldowney, who will use an automobile to get over the territory.

Yamhill Ready for "Good Roads" Day

Court Promises Cooperation of Road Supervisors With Squads of Enthusiastic Volunteers on Highway Work.
McMinnville, Or., April 21.—"Good Roads Day" is to be observed in Yamhill county, and the county court has promised the cooperation of the road supervisors with the squads of volunteers who will do duty with pick and

shovel in the various districts. In McMinnville, April 24 is to be "Better Roads Day," as Saturday would interfere with the business men. Mayor Tilbury is to declare a holiday on that occasion.

The county court is calling for bids on newly prepared plans for the Booth Bend bridge, which were executed by the department of state highway engineers. Bids were opened some weeks ago on the same bridge, but pressure was brought to bear to have other plans, and so new bids are called for. Work on the construction of the Mill Creek bridge, near Sheridan, is in progress.
