"AS GOOD AS A MAN"

WELL, what's the good news now?" I asked as Mrs. L. Louise Pattison, bird lover and writer of nature books, came toward me wearing one of her biggest and sunniest smiles.

"I'm taking manual training lessons," she announced, "and I'm going to build my own bird houses."

"Going to be a lady carpenter?" I asked.

"Not altogether," she answered, "but I'm taking lessons from a lady carpenter. In fact, I'm entered in a regular public school manual training class. Moreover, I know a number of club and society women who are going to form a manual training class this fall. They think the modern woman ought to know how to fink around the house without hitting her thumb every time she uses a hammer."

"How is this?" I asked Miss Anne H. Stewart, a little later, when I found her completely surrounded by boys, carpenter's benches, sawhorses, and a full assortment of tools. "Mrs. Pattison tells me some women are thinking of learning carpentering as a necessary addition to feminine efficiency. Should the average housewife know how to carpenter?"

"Miss Stewart, who is round, pink cheeked and jolly, laughed heartily. "I'll answer that by telling a story," she said. "When I was teaching at Carlisle Indian school we had as many girls as boys in our manual training school. Yes, given the same training, the girls did as well as the boys. 'The children there are sent into the country under what is called an 'outing system.' One of my girls, Flora, had qualified particularly well in the manual training school. She was sent to a farm for a time. When she returned I asked her how she liked it."

"Very much at first," she said. "But one day my country mother asked me if I could fix a screen that didn't fit. I fixed it so well that afterward I had to do all the repairing and fixing around the house and the whole farm."

"And the moral of that," said Miss Stewart, "is whatever you may wish to make it."

Miss Stewart looks as if manual training work agreed with her. A native Chicagoan, she originally taught music in that city and sang in oratorio. "When," she said, "I began to look around for a profession that would support me when my voice would give out."

"Manual training was beginning to be the rage in Chicago, and I thought: Why not? So I took a course in training, and, still teaching music, taught in the Carlisle Indian school. I took the post-graduate course at Naas, Sweden, where a woman must present a physician's certificate that she is physically fit before she can be admitted."

"I thought I knew what hard work was in Chicago, but at Naas I worked eight hours a day over the bench and was required to take physical culture besides! Still, I enjoyed life there. The Swedes are pleasant people."

"Graduating at Naas, I went to Carlisle, where I taught six years, then to Cleveland, where I have taught eight years in the public schools."

I might add that the boys in her classes are rather proud of the fact that their teacher is a "lady carpenter." They show her the greatest respect, and the tallest and lankiest of them told me confidentially that she is "as good as a man."

Lad Writes President Opposing Canal Tolls Other Nations May Believe Us Cowards

In the opinion of 10-year-old Emmet McCaffery of 14 Seventh street north, a student in the Holladay school, congress and the president should not work for the repeal of the Panama canal toll clause.

After reading everything he could find on both sides of the question, the lad decided that the United States should not yield to the demands of Great Britain to the detriment of our own interests, then sat him down and wrote the following letter to President Wilson, explaining his views on the much mooted subject.

Here is the letter:

"To Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America: I am only a little boy of 9 (though I will be 10 April 21), but nevertheless I am in the fifth grade. I go to a school called the Holladay school.

"Having read all I could find about Panama canal tolls in the newspapers

and in Current Events (a little four page newspaper which I take), I thought I would send you a letter to let you know my opinion on Panama canal tolls. I think the United States has a right to do what it pleases with what it owns. I understand that Great Britain is making a demand that we make our ships pay toll for going through the canal as well as hers.

"Well, if we do that the other nations will say: 'The United States is afraid of Great Britain and so has granted her request.' As I would not like it to be said that we were afraid of Great Britain, I think it best that the act which allows American vessels to go through the canal free should not be repealed. Hoping to

hear from you soon, I am, yours respectfully, EMMETT McCAFFERY.

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KITCHEN HELPS

Never scrape enamelled ware, because the coating will be apt to chip and then the enamel will be under the use. If food burns on the bottom of pots of this kind, put a small lump of common soda into it with hot water and boil until the soda has melted, say, about fifteen minutes. If very obstinate, the pot can be scoured with fine sand. Enamelled ware will be protected if the bottom is rubbed thickly with soap. This will do half the scouring. Soda will probably be needed when the pots are very greasy.

Never let cooking vessels get dry after being emptied. It will not be convenient to wash them at once, but one can put a little water into them and set them at the back of the stove. Covered with water, they do half the scouring. Soda will probably be needed when the pots are very greasy.

Frying pans, too, should never be scraped, but should be cleaned in the same way as enamel.

When iron ware becomes rusted, rub over with grease and set in the oven for an hour or so, then wash off with soap and water.

Hot salt and vinegar will keep copper pots and kettles in good condition. It should be applied with any small stiff brush, polishing afterward with old woolen rags.

New tins should not be used until thoroughly cleaned, because they often become covered with lead or a similar substance. The tins should be filled with water, adding a good lump of soda, and be boiled out before washing in the usual way. As tin rusts very quickly, pans should be allowed to dry thoroughly on the top of the stove before putting away. Cloths will not do it. A better plan is to prevent rust forming at all. To
