

GOVERNOR APPLIES A 'SHORT AND UGLY' TO POLICE CHIEF CLARK

If Portland Official Doesn't
Like It He Will Be Accom-
modated at Capital.

ONLY 'HILL IMPORTATION'

Statement Is Result of 'Effusion' on
Swearing Chaucer
Episode.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 30.—Governor
West, in a statement issued today,
declared that Chief of Police Clark,
of Portland, knows "he is an unmiti-
gated liar," for his alleged statements
in a newspaper story published yes-
terday afternoon, regarding the gov-
ernor's calling a policeman when he
ran across an automobile owner
cursing on the street. If Chief Clark
doesn't like it the governor invites
him to call around at the executive
office. The governor's statement
says:

"When in Portland Tuesday I wit-
nessed the spectacle of a drunken
owner of a broken automobile stand-
ing in the street cursing, and women
being obliged to pass along and listen
to his vulgarity.

"Upon being informed that this in-
dividual had been performing in a
like manner for an hour or so, I
called up police headquarters and
asked it to kindly send an officer
to pick him up. This was at 4:30
o'clock in the afternoon. In the
course of an hour an officer arrived
upon the scene, but his bird had long
since flown. From the officer who,
by the way, was a gentlemanly fel-
low, I gathered that he and come im-
mediately he was notified. The de-
lay, therefore, was due to the failure
of some higher up to give the matter
prompt attention.

"The incident had passed from my
mind until my attention was called
to an effusion in the way of a news
item from the lips of the distinguished
gentleman imported from St. Paul by
Louis Hill and presented to the citi-
zens of Portland as chief of police by
its good mayor.

"Governor West has no reason to
complain. Last fall he coddled the
street speakers and that other tough
bunch and told them to go ahead. He
thought he could handle it, but he
could not. Why didn't he handle that
fellow last night?

"I wish to advise this importation
from St. Paul, and in words plain
enough to insure his understanding,
just what I mean that when he says
I advised the said street speakers to
go ahead with their program he knows
he is an unmitigated liar. Now let
him handle this.

"Our office hours are from 8 to 5.
We are always glad to keep them
open to a later hour if necessary to
accommodate an out of town official."

would forward his opinion to the city

the dealer tried to sell him various
articles.

RAILROAD NEWS

Will Tear Up Rails of Klamath
Lake Railroad.

Road Cost \$1,500,000.

Crews of men soon will begin tear-
ing out the rails on the Klamath Lake
railroad, a 24-mile line built by the
Klamath Lake Lumber company from
Thrall, California, to Pockewong, Or.
J. A. Frazier of Ashland, representa-
tive of the Weverhaeuser interests,
which took over the line several years
ago, will superintend the work. The
road was put in at a cost of \$1,500,000,
but soon after it was built the mill
it was intended to serve at
Klamath was destroyed by fire and re-
built. Its fortunes began declining
then and though irregular service has
been maintained, it never paid any-
thing over operating expenses. E. T.
Abbott of Thrall has been general
manager.

passenger agent of the Oregon Electric,

operation for appendicitis. He will re-
sume his duties after a season of rest
and recuperation.

Auto Trucks in Service.
Seven automobile trucks will ply
this summer between Bend, the ter-
minus of the North Bank road, and
Burns, according to information re-
ceived at the company's general offices
today. These will care for the freight
business of the territory beyond. Three
trucks will go into service to Silver
Lake, two more than were used last
year.

Many to Leave for Norway.
Carrying a delegation of 125 Nor-
wegians back to the fatherland to help
celebrate the centennial of its in-
dependence, a special Northern Pacific
train will leave Spokane tomorrow for
the east. Included in the party will
be Norwegians from Portland, Seat-
tle and numerous other northwestern
communities who will get to Spokane
in the regular trains. The party,
sponsored by others from intervening
points, will sail from New York May
7 on the steamer St. Louis and reach
Norway in time for the celebration,
which opens May 17.

Boy Refuses to Inform on Dealers

Youth Would Not Tell Where He Had
Bought Tobacco; Judge Orders Him
Locked Up.

Chester McNeill, 19 years old, living
with his parents at 5451 Tenino street,
was arrested twice last evening by Pa-
trolman W. E. Davis for smoking. In
the municipal court this morning the
boy refused to tell where he had been
buying tobacco, and was ordered held
until willing to tell.

Patrolman Davis found McNeill
smoking a pipe at East Thirtieth and
Spokane streets with a crowd of boys.
McNeill was taken home and turned
over to his parents. Fifteen minutes
later the same patrolman caught Mc-
Neill on the street again smoking. He
was taken to the police station, his
father depositing bail for his appear-
ance in court.

In court the boy told the judge he
could buy tobacco all over town, but
he said he had taken the supply of to-
bacco last evening from his father's
tobacco jar. The boy refused to tell
from what dealers he could purchase
tobacco. For this the judge ordered
him locked up. The father left the
courtroom, but later returned and
asked permission to take the son to
lunch. Judge Stevenson agreed, upon
promise to return the boy this after-
noon for trial.

Bug, Portland, on Beach Near Rapids

Oregon City, Or., April 30.—The mo-
torboat "Bug," of Portland, was
beached Wednesday night near the
Clackamas rapids. Three Portland
boys, Herbert Sessions, Adelbert Gor-
don and Harlan Littlejohn, all stu-
dents of the Lincoln high school, were
planning to make an excursion to Ore-
gon City. When they reached the Clack-
amas rapids they hit a rock, the boat
began to sink and after considerable
effort the boys were rescued. The boys
then came to this city in a canoe be-
longing to Joseph Hedges which they
were towing from Portland.

The boat was put in the repair shop
in this city. The rudder and a large
hole in the bottom is the extent of
the damage.
The boys will return by car to their
homes.

is survived by one daughter, Miss
Whyte, and her mother, Mrs. Quiltness,
Holtsclaw, both of Vienna, Va.

duct and was sentenced to pay a fine

MEXICAN GUNBOAT AT MAZATLAN READY TO FIGHT THE AMERICANS

The Morales Drew Up Under
Guns of Fort to Repel At-
tack as News Came.

NO AMERICANS INJURED

Refugees Beach San Diego on Board
the Justin, Bringing Word of Ex-
citement on the West Coast.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Diego, Cal., April 30.—A bitter
anti-American demonstration occurred
at Mazatlan, on the west Mexican
coast, April 23, the night the news of
the occupation of Vera Cruz reached
the city.
This was the word brought here to-
day by 18 refugees on board the United
States collier Justin. No Ameri-
cans at Mazatlan were attacked, as
far as known. About 20 still remain
in the city. Between 30 and 40 are
coming north today on the supply ship
Glacier.

The Justin left Mazatlan at 10:30
p. m. on April 23. News of the oc-
cupation of Vera Cruz was received that
evening and handbills calling a mass
meeting of citizens, were at once is-
sued. The Mexican gunboat Morales,
in the harbor at the time, immediately
came in and anchored in the shadow
of the fort, evidently fearing that the
Americans and Raleigh would
open fire on the city.

Rear Admiral Howard ordered the
Raleigh to follow the Morales, and a
patrol was kept in the harbor during
the night.
The highest tension prevailed
throughout the evening, the refugees
said. Americans were denounced at
the mass meeting, but no violence
was shown to those in the city. The
few Americans remaining there are
heavy property holders, who decided
not to leave.

Those who arrived on the Justin
are mostly well-to-do business men
and their families. None in want.
They brought no news of any out-
rage against Americans on the west
coast.
