BATTING AVERAGES

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DROWNING AT FORT STEVENS DECLARED QUITE UNNECESSARY

Said That Waves Threatened to Engulf Launch When It Set Out.

LIEUTENANT IS CRITICISED

Corporal Klempe and Private Price Lose Lives While Picking Up Submarine Mines.

Fort Stevens, Or., May 1.—It is freely maintained here by both commissioned officers and privates of the Thirtieth company that the incidents leading up to the drowning late yesterday afternoon of Corporal Klempe and Private Price of the Thirtieth company, were little short of criminal.

The two men were in a small gasoline launch picking up submarine mines that had been planted by the Ringgold in the south channel of the Columbia, and it is believed that the heavy cables held the launch in the trough of the sea, and that a big wave completely swamped the little boat.

Three other occupants of the boat, Musician Hoenig, Private Smith and Private Decker, were saved by the yawl, commanded by Sergeant Simmons. Private Smith made an heroic effort to save Private Price, holding on to him until his hands became so numb that he lost his grip.

It is maintained that the waves were threatening to engulf the launch from the moment it set out and that it should not have been dispatched at all at that time.

Censure is heard because of Lieutenant Cowley's apparent indifference to the safety or comfort of the men throughout the entire mine-planting season.

The launch is the same one that sank at Astoria last year when Corporal Miller deserted rather than face responsibility for the sinking of the boat, which was recovered by a wrecking company.

FOUR AUTOMOBILES TO BE PROVIDED FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT

Three Cars Now on Hand and Council Authorizes Purchase of Another One.

Portland will soon have four automobiles for use by the police department, where only a few months ago two cars were all that were in use.

The department now has three machines and Wednesday the city council, on the recommendation of Mayor Albee, authorized the purchase of another car for use as a patrol wagon.

Some time ago the large touring car which was used by the department was badly wrecked when it struck a Southern Pacific train at East Morrison and Water streets.

Saturday repairs to the damaged machine were completed and it went back to the police garage.

Chief of Police Clark prevailed upon the mayor to allow both touring cars to be used by the police, and so far has resisted all attempts to have the newer car removed from his department.

In addition to these two automobiles the department has a large patrol wagon, but the chief wants another one, and so one is to be purchased.

Then the department will have four machines—two for carrying those arrested, one for use by the detectives and in emergency cases, and one for the use of Chief of Police Clark.

It is said that Chief Clark is to use the newer and larger machine, while the repaired automobile will be used by the detectives and for emergencies.
