

GREAT SEA TRAGEDIES FROM 1867 TO 1914

1867, October 29.—Royal Mail steamers Rhone and Wye and about 50 other vessels driven ashore and wrecked at St. Thomas, West Indies, by a hurricane; about 1000 lives lost.

1873, November 23.—French liner Ville du Havre, from New York to Havre, in collision with ship Lochan and sunk in 16 minutes; 110 lives lost.

1874, December 24.—Emigrant vessel Cospatrick took fire and sank off Auckland; 478 lives lost.

1876, May 7.—Hamburg Mail steamer Schiller wrecked in fog on Scilly islands, 200 lives lost.

1876, November 4.—American steamer Pacific in collision 30 miles southwest of Cape Flattery; 236 lives lost.

1878, September 2.—British iron steamer Princess Alice, sunk in the Thames river; 700 lives lost.

1878, December 18.—French steamer Byzantin sunk in collision in the Dardanelles with the British steamer Rinaldo; 210 lives lost.

1879, December 2.—Steamer Borussia sank off the coast of Spain; 174 lives lost.

1880, January 31.—British training ship Atlanta left Bermuda with 290 men and was never heard from.

1881, August 30.—Steamer Teuton wrecked off the Cape of Good Hope; 200 lives lost.

1882, July 3.—Steamer Daphne turned turtle in the Clyde; 124 lives lost.

1887, January 29.—Steamer Kapunda in collision with bark Ada Melore off coast of Brazil; 300 lives lost.

1887, November 15.—British steamer Wah Young caught fire between Canton and Hongkong; 400 lives lost.

1888, September 13.—Italian steamship Sud America and steamer La France in collision near the Canary islands; 89 lives lost.

1889, March 15.—United States warships Trenton, Vandalia and Nipsic and German ships Adler and Eber wrecked on Samoan islands; 147 lives lost.

1890, January 2.—Steamer Persia wrecked off Corsica; 130 lives lost.

1890, February 17.—British steamer Duburg wrecked in the China sea; 400 lives lost.

1890, March 1.—British steamship Quetta foundered in Torres straits; 124 lives lost.

1890, July 4.—French liner steamer La Bourgogne in collision with British sailing vessel Cromartyshire; 571 lives lost.

1904, June 15.—General Slocum, excursion steamboat, took fire going through Hell Gate, East river; more than 1000 lives lost.

1906, January 31.—Brazilian battleship Aquidaban sunk near Rio Janeiro by an explosion of the powder magazine; 312 lives lost.

1906, January 22.—American steamer Valencia lost off Clocosa, Pacific coast; 140 lives lost.

1907, July 26.—American steamers Columbia and San Pedro collided on the California coast; 100 lives lost.

1907, November 24.—Turkish steamer Kaptan foundered in the North sea; 110 lives lost.

1908, March 23.—Japanese steamer Mutsu Maru sunk in collision near Hakodate; 300 lives lost.

1908, April 30.—Japanese training cruiser Matsu Shima sunk off the Pescadore owing to an explosion; 200 lives lost.

1909, January 24.—Collision between the Italian steamer Florida and the White Star liner Republic, about 170 miles east of New York during a fog; a large number of lives were saved by the arrival of the steamer Baltic, which received the "C. D. G." or distress signal sent up by wireless by the Republic January 22. The Republic sank while being towed; six lives lost.

1910, February 9.—French liner steamer General Chanzy off Minorca; 200 lives lost.

1911, September 23.—French battleship Liberté sunk by explosion in Toulon harbor; 233 lives lost.

1912, April 15.—White Star liner Titanic struck by iceberg, sank; 1517 lives lost.

1913, October 10.—Steamer Volturino burned in midocean; 136 lives lost.

Howe Says No "Greatest Woman"

Head of Department of Literature at U. of O., Tells Class Story That Madame Curie's Honors Due to Man.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., May 1.—"Man's curiosity has led him to delve into the sciences, to discover the fundamentals of biology, chemistry, physics—the why of nature and life; woman's curiosity has led her to other things. There have been women scientists, women painters, women writers, but there has never been a 'greatest' woman," said Professor Herbert Crombie Howe, head of the department of literature in the University of Oregon, to his class in living English writers.

"There is a story," continued Professor Howe, "that the honor which the world has bestowed upon Madame Curie, the discoverer of radium, was heaped upon her because of the gallantry of the scientist who worked with her, a man. Madame Curie has done nothing for science since the discovery of radium."

Vessel Worth \$2,000,000.

At 3:45 o'clock this morning Assistant Manager Frye of the Pacific Mail Steamship company issued the following: "We have received nothing further than the press report beyond a cablegram confirming the fact that the Siberia is aground. The steamer is estimated to be worth \$2,000,000. What the value of her cargo is I cannot say at all accurately. We expect to have more details soon."

At the offices of the Pacific Mail Steamship line here it was stated at 8:15 a. m. today that the liner Siberia unquestionably was in trouble, but it was not yet certain what was its nature, or how serious it was.

The Federal Wireless company received a message from Japan today to the effect that the Pacific Mail liner Siberia had been wrecked on the coast of Formosa. It was not indicated whether there was loss of life.

The Siberia left San Francisco with 60 first and 50 second class passengers, 250 in the steerage and a crew of 30.

The number in the first cabin had been reduced to 40, however, by disembarkations at Honolulu, Yokohama, Kobe and Nagasaki. The company in the second cabin was also considerably smaller than at the beginning of the voyage, but in the steerage there were still many Chinese, bound for Hongkong.

The officers were: Adrian Zeeder, commander; Thomas Blau, first officer; J. S. Hamilton, chief engineer; F. C. Charnan, purser; E. A. Stanton, freight clerk; Dr. S. P. Strange, surgeon; V. X. DeCaro, chief steward; E. A. Kirby, second steward. Thomas Graham of the Valvoline Oil company of San Francisco, an extensive traveler in the Orient, advanced the suggestion that the break in wireless communication with the Siberia might be due to unfavorable conditions merely. "About Formosa, he said, they are frequently so bad that the effective radius of the most powerful apparatus is less than six miles."

Will Seek Widening Of Union Avenue

Width of Eighty Feet Between Morris Street and East Morrison Is Requested by Property Owners.

The city council will be asked to enact an ordinance providing for the widening of Union avenue to 80 feet between Morris street and East Morrison street, so that future buildings will be built on an 80-foot building line, but the actual widening, arcing of buildings, etc., will not be done until traffic demands it.

This plan was embodied in a resolution of the meeting of Union avenue property owners and others interested held in the Albina library under the auspices of the East Side Business Men's club, Union Avenue Development league, East Burnside District Improvement club and the Woodlawn Improvement club. L. M. Lepper presided.

The following committee was appointed to present the resolution, to the council and to secure an estimate of the cost of the widening, to be presented at a similar meeting later: O. E. Heints, John H. Hall, J. H. Weidner, John Dick, F. Beier and H. Ward.

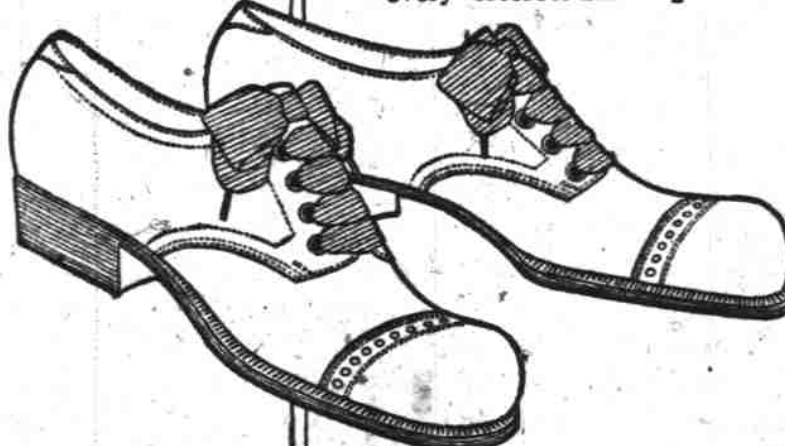
