Weather Conditions.

A small disturbance is central over Arizona and low pressure area of moderate energy has made its appearance north of Montana. A large high pressure area is centered over the lake region and the barometer is relatively high over western Washington. Showers and thunderstorms have occurred in Utah, Colorado, New Mexico, western Nebraska and in the San Joaquin (Cal.) valley. Light rain has also fallen in Minnesota. It is warmer in Idaho and Montana and cooler in Utah; elsewhere the changes in temperature have been unimportant.

The conditions are favorable for fair weather in this district tonight and Saturday except in southeastern Idaho, where it will continue unsettled and showery.

Shippers' Forecast.

Produce shipments as far north as Seattle against minimum temperatures of about 44 degrees; northeast to Spokane, 40 degrees; northwest to Boise, 38 degrees; south to Ashland, 40 degrees. Minimum temperatures at Portland tonight, about 40 degrees.

Woman's Arrest Is Asked.—An information asking for the arrest of Mrs. Mary E. Stevens, a ranch owner of Crook county, on a charge of allowing her stock to trespass on the Ochoco national forest, was issued in federal court yesterday. Mrs. Stevens' land adjoins the government land, according to Assistant United States Attorney Beckman, and she has disregarded all orders of forest service officials to keep her cattle from running over the reserve. A civil suit asking damages was filed at the same time against Mrs. Stevens. According to Beckman she was arrested once before for the same offense and paid a nominal fine.

Wife Will Keep Children.—Permission was given Fred Widdell to visit his two young daughters each Sunday afternoon by Circuit Judge McGinn, but he was refused custody of them. The children will be left with Martha Widdell, their mother. Judge McGinn said that he always considered the mother of children their natural guardian unless very strong reasons should be shown that the mother was not the proper person to care for them. He refused to set a definite date for the hearing of the divorce suit pending between the Widdells in which Widdell is the plaintiff.

Petitions in Bankruptcy Filed.—A petition in bankruptcy was filed yesterday with the federal court by attorneys for B. Patrick and J. A. Randall, proprietors of the Princess Roller Skating rink at 320 East Morrison street. The indebtedness is \$223.12 and assets are \$410. Another petition was filed asking for the liquidation of a carpenter of Portland, he declared bankrupt. His indebtedness is \$1407.71 and assets, \$215. Walter G. Hoyle and Frances Hoyle, as Hoyle & Hoyle, Portland, filed a petition scheduling debts of \$905 and assets, \$550.75.

Wife Was Given Divorce.—Circuit Judge Davis yesterday believed the testimony of Martha A. Stevens and allowed her a divorce from Royal R. Stevens on a cross complaint. Each charged cruelty. Mrs. Stevens was given custody of a child and \$15 a month for support.

Colored Man Convicted.—Joe Miller, colored, was convicted yesterday of assault with a revolver on Charles Williams, colored, in the Union club last December, by a jury in Circuit Judge Kavanagh's court. The trouble between the two arose over a card game.

Denicke to C. W. French and was subsequently endorsed by several holders before Storey received it.

Wifebeater Goes to Rockpile.—Jacob Miller, 429 1/2 East Russell street, was given five days on the rockpile this morning by Municipal Judge Stevenson for beating his wife with a razor strop. The wife, frail and afraid to testify against her husband, was in court. She denied her husband had abused her, but the court had testimony from others, to whom she told Monday how she had been whipped.

Municipal Court Receipts.—The total receipts of the municipal court for April were \$4427. The amount for April, 1913, was \$2211. The gain is due to several high fines, chief of which was \$500 paid by Joseph Riden for selling morphine, a fine of \$600 against Chinese gamblers, and several women who sought to operate disorderly houses in defiance of the police.
