# MOTHERS' DAY TO BE **OBSERVED TOMORROW** THROUGHOUT WORLD

All Protestant Churches in Portland to Join in First International Celebration.

Tomorrow is Mother's Day, when sons and daughters of almost the whole world will wear the white carnation, the symbol of the first international honor day. Every Protestant church in Portland tomorrow will observe the occasion in some way or another, and practically every pastor will devote one of the two sermons of

the day to its memory.

The popularity of Mother's Day is remarkable. With no organization, state or government, to introduce it; with no funds to spread its mission. with no literature save one two-page leaflet, the day has, in less than 10 years, become a universal honor day, authorized by congress and celebrated by people of all nationalities, of all races and of all creeds.

The movement was first started by Miss Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia, who inserted a simple little notice in a church paper asking that all sons and daughters who wished to honor motherhood should wear a white carnation on the second Sunday of May of each year. 
