Switch Tracks Have Now Been Laid to Municipal Dock No. 1.

Terminal Facilities Completed.
Switch tracks to connect the Northern Pacific Terminal company's yards with the new Municipal Dock No. 1 were laid Tuesday, marking the completion of the terminal facilities at the new public wharf. The track will give access to the dock from Front street and the main terminal yards.

Arrives on Inspection Trip.
J. Q. Barlow, assistant chief engineer of the Southern Pacific, arrived in his private car from San Francisco yesterday on an inspection trip. He went east over the O. W. R. & N. late in the day to Ogden, to return over the Central Pacific line to Sacramento.

C. N. Senechal of San Francisco, vice president and general manager of the Pacific Fruit Express, is in Portland aligning the business for the movement of green fruit this season.

Camp for Crater Lake.
Klamath Falls, May 14.—Preparatory to resuming work on the construction of highways in Crater Lake National park, the war department is establishing a road camp at Wild Cat, at the southern boundary of the park, as a base of supplies. There is a road from Wild Cat to Kirk, the northern terminus of the railroad, over which machinery is shipped into the park. According to George Sparrows, in charge of the work now being done, there will be 60 men at work there in two weeks.

Trust Company Completes.
Salem, Or., May 14.—The Bennett Trust company of Marshfield has qualified under the new trust company law and yesterday afternoon State Superintendent of Banks S. G. Sargent issued the company a certificate of authority to do business in the state. The officers of the company are J. W. 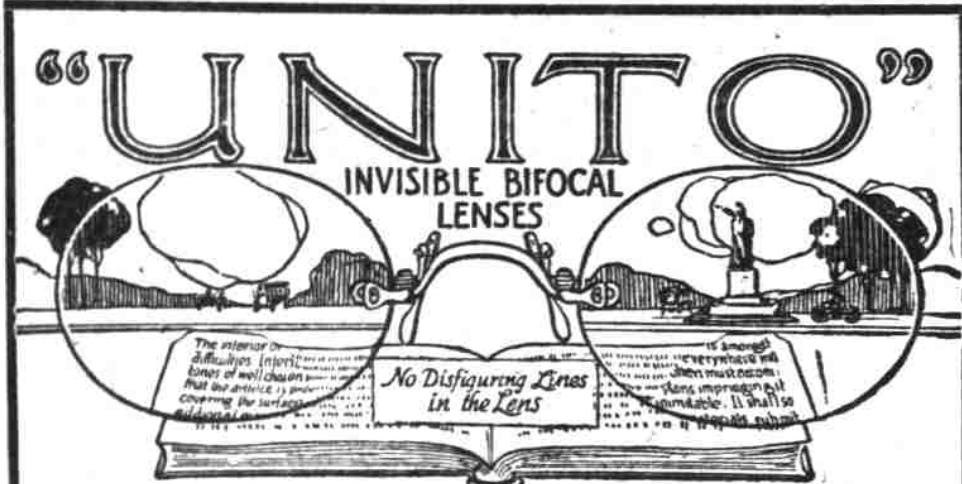
