

NUMBER OF PRECINCTS IN MULTNOMAH HAS INCREASED TO 326

City of Portland Has 293 and Outside Districts in County Have 33.

LIST IS NOW MADE PUBLIC

Sheriff's Office Gives Out List of Polling Places That Will Be Used Friday.

- Under the 1914 subdivision of Multnomah county into electoral districts the location of polling places for Friday's primary election has just been made public by the sheriff's office. Multnomah now has 326 precincts. Numbers 1 to 293 inclusive are within the corporate limits of Portland, 294 to 299 inclusive are in St. Johns and the remainder are located in the country districts of the county.
- Voters who are in doubt as to the number of their precinct may learn the same by inquiry at the county clerk's office. The polls will be open Friday from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

'Shepherd Will Get Results,' McCredie

Former Congressman from Washington Points Out Need of Deep Channel from Portland to Sea.

"Eight years ago when George Shepherd began his fight for 'Deep Water to the Sea' he was not taken seriously," said W. W. McCredie, ex-congressman from the state of Washington. "However, during my term in congress, he convinced me of the seriousness of the situation and I undertook to assist in the fight. You know the result. When up for re-election, all the river counties stood by me loyally, but a bitter fight was waged from Puget sound, the papers referred to me as Congressman McCredie of Portland, and my lead was overcome. All this because I insisted in the cause of deep water on the Columbia river bar."

"Portland is now my home town, and as deep water made Seattle and San Francisco great seaports, it will make Portland if we get it. We must send a real fighter to congress and I know Shepherd will get results if we send him. I have known him for 25 years. In fact, he studied law in my office. 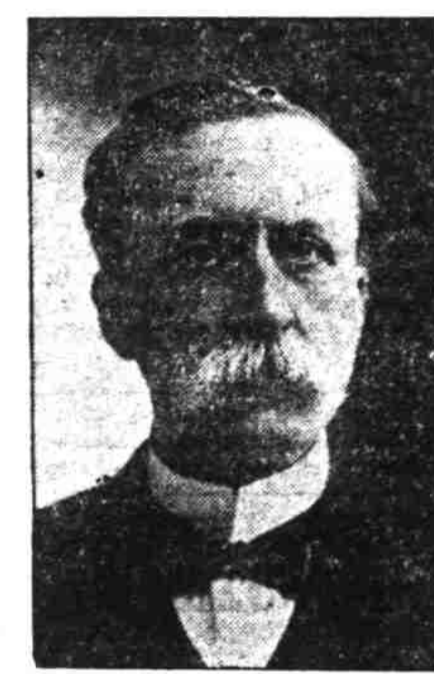

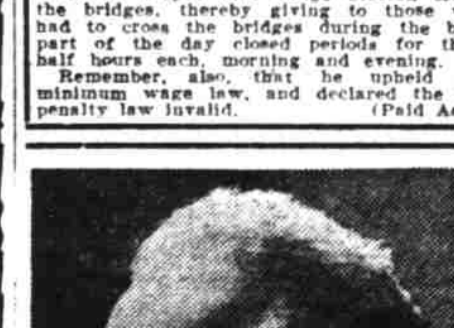

JUSTICE OF THE SUPREME COURT

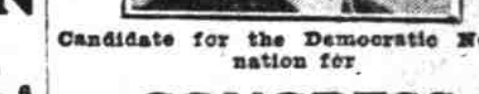
