

COMPANY OBJECTS TO SHIFTING ABOUT THE HARBOR FOR CARGOES

Plan May Be Devised for Assembling of Shipments for Steamers, to One Dock.

BELT LINE IS DISCUSSED

Connecting Facilities Would Be Distinct Advantage to This Port in the Contention Made.

Plans by which cargoes for big carriers may be assembled on one wharf instead of compelling the craft to shift to several docks may indirectly result from a letter of complaint from the Royal Mail Steamship company, read before the dock commission this morning.

The steamship company owns the steamship Cardiganhire, recently in port. She had to shift from dock to dock to pick up her cargo. While the members of the commission asserted that the company is equally applicable to Puget Sound, it was conceded that it would be an advantage to this port to have facilities for the assembling of cargo, particularly a connecting belt line. The letter from the steamship company follows:

Royal Mail's Letter.

The report on the loading of the Cardiganhire in Portland recently by the antiquated methods still in existence and lack of general facilities for dealing with large quantities of cargo, the various authorities interested in Portland have continually pressed the Royal Mail Steamship company to provide a direct service of steamers in and out of the port. Steps have been taken to provide the service, the most up-to-date cargo steamers being built specifically for the purpose. If the people of Portland wish the company to continue to send these steamers into their port, they must improve the conditions very considerably.

It is ridiculous to shift steamers like the Cardiganhire from one berth to another to pick up lumber, coal or small developed or undeveloped, do they have to go hunting round to get their cargo.

The cargo is brought to the steamers and this must be done in Portland. The service is to be continued with these large liners.

Will you please represent the matter to the authorities, whichever it is, and it is hoped the position will be realized and dealt with in an up-to-date business manner. Anyone who has had experience in handling large liners in other ports will admit that our criticisms are justified.

Contracts Are Completed.

The commission accepted the completion of the contract with Guthrie, McLaughlin & Co. and ordered payment of 50 per cent of the \$5755 contract price. The contract of Williams & Beas company for sprinkler equipment was accepted as completed and \$754 of the contract price ordered paid.

The purchase of five life preservers was authorized. A plan of J. W. Ransom, wharfinger, for numbering doors was accepted and the work awarded to the East Portland Sign company for \$72.50.

A petition asking refund of taxes on

property bought from the Northern Pacific Terminal company, as advised by the city attorney, was approved for submission to the tax commission. An ordinance asked by City Commissioner Daily forbidding dredging dangerously near submerged water mains, was passed.

A resolution was adopted ratifying the contract with the North Coast Contract company for the installation of a truck scale at dock No. 1. Communications were received from the engineer relative to a vacation by the railroad company, a portion of the public levee at Jefferson street and the building of a fence made possible by the vacation.

The commission discussed a proposed establishment fund that would care for depreciation and maintenance of property. A six months' dock construction privilege was given the Alhambra Fuel company and the commission agreed to look over the company's property with reference to an extension of the privilege.

WE WILL MEET SOON IN MEXICO CITY, VILLA WIRES TO GONZALES

Rebel Chief Sends His Congratulations to the Captor of City of Tampico.

Juarez, Mex., May 14.—"My congratulations to General Villa, the victor of Tampico—General Villa telegraphed today to constitutional headquarters here. 'We will meet soon in Mexico City.'"

Rebel officers swarmed about the telegraph office, clamoring for news from the fallen city. There were excited shouting, gesticulating groups on every street corner. On all hands was heard the prediction of an early rebel march on the capital.

Military men expressed the opinion that the federalists would evacuate Saltillo without resistance, concentrating in San Luis Potosi, for a last stand before retreating to Mexico City. It was believed the force under General Zaragoza, ousted federal commander of Tampico, was trying to reach San Luis Potosi.

Maas Is Superseded.

Vera Cruz, Mex., May 14.—That General Maas had been superseded by General Pena in command of the troops in Vera Cruz, was confirmed here this afternoon.

It was believed to mean that President Huerta wanted to keep peace, for the threat at least, and feared that such occurrences as Maas' attack on the Vera Cruz water works and the reported execution of Private Parks would precipitate hostilities.

In the meantime the Mexican government was preparing for a struggle if mediation should fail.

Solace Brings More Dead.

New York, May 14.—The hospital ship Solace arrived today from Vera Cruz, bringing the bodies of Clarence Hirschmenger and Ray Harry Pulliam, two members of the landing party, and the Mexican port, who shot during the fight which attended its capture, died of the wounds after the departure of the cruiser Montana, with the bodies of the 17 bluejackets and marines killed outright.

Cheyenne to Get Refugees.

San Diego, Cal., May 14.—The monitor Cheyenne steamed south today for San Quentin, Lower California, to take on board any American refugees that could be found in that part of Mexico. There are said to be some 20 Americans living near San Quentin.

More Guards at Fort Wingate.

Fort Wingate, N. M., May 14.—Five companies of the twentieth infantry were due this afternoon from El Paso to reinforce the soldiers guarding 5000 Mexican federal prisoners here. Several federalists recently attempted to escape and it was reported that a member of the twentieth cavalry was wounded when he caught several of the prisoners in the act of getting away.

Villa Asks for Arms.

Paradon, State of Coahuila, Mex., May 14.—If Americans still fear that they may have to invade northern Mexico and that any ammunition they let us have will be used against them, said General Villa in an interview here today. "I suggest that President Wilson appoint a military commission to decide just how much we will need to fight our way to Mexico City and let us have that much and no more."

Skirmishing was in progress between the rebels and the federal outposts about Saltillo.

PROPOSED MEASURE FOR MEAT INSPECTION NOW FULLY REVISED

Ordinance Will Be Presented to City Council Monday Afternoon.

CHIEF INSPECTOR URGED

All Slaughter Houses Within One Mile of City Limits Would Come Under the New Regulations.

Revision of the proposed ordinance requiring meat inspection has been completed by W. L. Brewster, commissioner of public affairs. It will be presented to the council meeting at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. The federal requirements have been followed as much as possible.

The ordinance provides for the inspection of all animals killed in slaughter houses within one mile of the city limits when more than five a week are killed, and for the inspection of all farm-killed animals at a place to be designated by the city council. Federal inspection is excluded. For the present there is to be no inspection of meat products except those of slaughter houses under government inspection.

In the case of farm killed animals, the carcasses are to be determined whether the animal was diseased.

Slaughterhouses are to be required to secure a permit from the health bureau before doing business and are to agree to comply with all city ordinances in regard to sanitation, construction of buildings and city inspection.

The ordinance provides for one chief inspector at a salary of \$40 a month and two deputies at a salary of \$120 a month each, all to be experienced graduate veterinarians. One is to be stationed at the central inspection booth and the others to inspect at slaughterhouses.

Should the inspectors not be able to see all animals that are killed, the proprietor of the slaughter house must place a stamp designated by the health bureau on the carcass providing that the meat is fit for human consumption.

Should it be found that the proprietor has marked meat which is unfit for food, prosecution will follow. Condemned meat is to be destroyed. Several processes are allowed for destruction.

Commissioner Brewster believes this measure will be more effective than the old ordinance proposed and has had the cooperation of those opposed to the old measure.

COST OF REPAIRS IS SHOWN

The cost of patching the pavement on Alder street in the last two years and four months has been 15.4 per cent of the total cost of an entirely new improvement according to data compiled by Commissioner Dieck and which will be used as an argument for repaving the street from Sixth to Leavens street.

Property owners have written to the city commissioners asking that the city patch the holes instead of entirely resurfacing the thoroughfare. The matter is being discussed by the commissioners this afternoon.

FRANCHISE WAS DISCUSSED

The city council this afternoon is discussing the new bridge franchise sought by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. Objection has been found to the franchise by Commissioner Daly, who contends that in case the city should ever acquire the street car system no value should be fixed on the bridge franchise. Provisions in the franchise sought are not clear on this point, according to Mr. Daly.

Japanese Admirals Forced to Retire

Graft Scandal in the Navy Compels Two High Officers to Leave the Service; More Revelations Are Expected.

Yokohama, May 14.—The retirement of Admirals Count Yamamoto and Baron Saito in connection with the navy graft scandal threatened today to precipitate fresh trouble in parliament.

It was not charged that Yamamoto and Saito profited personally by the graft, but Premier Count Okuma took the position that they ought to have known about it, and retired them for their carelessness. Both admirals, however, are influential men and it was understood that their friends among the lawmakers intended to raise the point that while they, despite the fact that they are not suspected of actual dishonesty, have been severely disciplined, none of the real culprits have been punished.

What will be intimated, and perhaps said outright, is that men in even more exalted positions than the two admirals are involved and that the administration fears it will expose itself if it presses the actual offenders too hard.

The nature of the work which called Major Morrow to the capital was not given out, but it is rumored that extra duties that have fallen to the engineering department on account of the Mexican situation is responsible for his transfer. Mrs. Morrow remained in Portland. It is not known how long the major will be retained in the east.

Becker Trial Waits Arrival of Webber

"Bald Jack" Rose Finishes His Story, Repairing Breaches Made in It by Becker's Attorney Yesterday.

New York, May 14.—With every breach in his story repaired and his narrative practically untouched, "Bald Jack" Rose finished his testimony here today in the second trial of former Police Lieutenant Charles F. Becker for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, a New York gambler.

By questioning the witness on re-direct examination today, District Attorney Whitman closed every apparent discrepancy in Rose's testimony accused by Manton of coaching witnesses last night. This charge resulted in Manton being sharply rebuked by Justice Seabury.

After Rose was excused, Justice Seabury ordered a recess to permit "Bridge" Webber time to arrive. Webber was afraid to enter New York alone, and detectives guarded him during his trip from Passaic, N. J., to this city.

U. S. Vessels Reach Tampico.

Washington, May 14.—The United States warships Des Moines and Dolphin, Admiral Mayo commanding, moved up the Panuco river to Tampico at 11 a. m. today, according to dispatch to the navy department. It was stated that Tampico was quiet.

Postoffice Department Explains Why It Turned Down Commercial Club's Offer of Quarters for Station.

Washington, May 14.—First Assistant Postmaster General Daniel C. Rogers has been notified that the postoffice department could not consistently accept the proposal of the Portland Commercial club to lease quarters for a station in Portland.

The offer of Charles K. Henry to lease the present quarters for a term of five years was for \$1320 less rental annually, and is but one block from the site offered by the club, so it has been accepted.

Washington, May 14.—Senator Cham-

berlain today introduced a bill amending the act to authorize construction of a dike on Olalla slough, authorizing the construction on foundations already laid or farther up the stream of a dike with a gate for purposes of navigation, the plans to be approved by the secretary of war.

Postal Changes.

Washington, May 14.—Ernie R. Row has been appointed rural carrier, Route No. 1, Holbrook, vice Herman A. Gans. The postoffice at Dodge, Clackamas county, will be superseded by rural delivery May 31.
