Aviators Attack Mazatlan.

Juarez, Mexico, May 15,-Mazatlan's capture by the Mexican rebels was expected hourly today, according to a nessage relayed here on its way from General Obregon, who is directing the attack on the west coast city, to General Carranza at Durango.

His aviators, said Obregon, were do ing most effective work, and the federal sharpshooters seemed unable t get their range. They were dropping bombs within the enemy's ranks and doing great havoc. One aviator, it was added, succeeded in hitting the federal gunboat Guerrero with a bomb, damaging it badly.

A dispatch from Parras announced that actual fighting had begun in the vicinity of Saltillo, General Villa's vanguard having encountered a federal outpost at North Saltillo. An hour's engagement ensued, at the end which the federals fell back.

Villa's main body was leaving Paredon this morning on its way overland to Saltillo. Officers here said they expected the general assault on the city would begin Sunday.


