

This Will Be Fourth Edifice to Be Erected by Scientists in Portland.

### TO COST ABOUT \$40,000

Interior Decorations Will Be Carried Out in a Simple, Yet Dignified, Manner-Seating Capacity.

The Second Church of Christ, Scientist, which has been holding services for several years in Woodmen's Hall, at East Sixth and East Alder streets, has just begun the construction of a new edifice at the northwest corner of East Sixth street and Hoiladay avenue. This is the fourth church building to be eracted by the Christian Science de-nomination in Portland.


The First church completed its building at Nineteenth and Everett streets in 1911. The Third church built at East Twelfth and Salmon a year ago, and the Fourth church opened its new building at Emerson street and Vau-couver avenue the early part of this year. The design of Second church is of the classic order, Doric columns being used in the portico. George Foote Dunham is the architect. The style has been chosen because of its dignity and simplicity and its adaptability to the requirements of the simple order of services of the Christian Science church.

The building will face south, and cover practically the entire quarter block, with small terrace and lawn on the street frontages. The construction is to be of concrete and interlocking tile, and the exterior of gray stone finish, with white trim. The dome and, byterian church, for over eight years, roof will be of metal.



INVITATION OFFERS A

Conditions Change, Says Announcement, but Christian Truth Is Constant.

William R. Moody, son of Dwight Moody, and president of the Northfield schools at East Northfield, Mass. has issued the call for the thirty-second season of the Northfield conferences and summer schools for religi-ous workers. A bold challenge to present day students of religious thought and critics, furnishes the keynote of his invitation to all denominations to attend the gathering. He
