

Mrs. Bohlman's Funeral Tomorrow .-The funeral of Mrs. Dorothea E. A Bohlman of 461/2 North Ninth street, who died Sunday of heart disease, will be held temorrow afternoon at 2 c'clock in Finley's chapel, and the body will be laid to rest in the Riverview cemetery. Mrs. Bohlman was the wife of H. C. Bohlman, secretary of the German Relief society, and for 20 years aided him in his work. During the score of years she engaged in the work she put in virtually all her waking hours visiting and aiding the poor. Among them she was known as "Mother" Bohlman, and there are many men occupying good positions in and near Portland today who came to her "down and out," and through her efforts, got work. Mrs. Bohlman lived 47 years of her life in Portland. She was born in Hamburg, Germany, July 10, 1835, and came to the United States in 1867, the year she and Mr. Bohiman were married.
