Three Vessels to Berth

The presence in the slip of such a vessel would interfere with the berthing of two other ships at the same time at the face of the main dock. Thus the berthing capacity of the dock will be increased by three vessels. The adjoining open dock will receive a vessel 456 feet long and 55 feet beam.

Whether a successful issue of the libel suit would affect the Heusner-Portland railway contract is causing speculation.

Net Cost Would Be Reduced.

Adjacent to the open dock proposed is about an acre of ground, ultimately to be used as one of three warehouse sites, which will be utilized for the piling of bulky and heavy materials at low storage rates.

Engineer Hegardt Estimated the Total Cost of Making the Change at \$1,550.

The change in plan would, however, give the city an estimated credit of \$41,400 from the contractor, thus reducing the net cost to \$18,550. This figure includes the dredging of 70,000 cubic yards of material, said the engineer, as this amount would be needed in filling. The remaining 30,000 yards would be dredged and removed would cost in removal \$9000 at a high estimate. The slip as planned would lie between the west side dock and the ferry landing.
