Jurors Explain Attitude.—Eight of the 12 jurors who were kept out 96 hours by Circuit Judge Davis in the trial of Ed Ruby on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a 9-year-old girl, decline to take the blame for the disagreement and in a statement of their attitude say that they stood for conviction from the start.

Blind Masseuse Files Suit.—Onne Jurva was sued yesterday for \$330 by Peter Kokko, a blind masseuse, alleged to be due wages for services rendered. Kokko alleges that he paid Jurva \$150 for lessons in his art and that after he became expert Jurva hired him, contracting to give him one-half of all proceeds from work and his board and lodging.

Negro and Indian Arrested.—Philip Whitehead, a negro, and Ralph Johns, an Indian, were arrested for selling liquor to Indians at Lakeview, and the latter accused of taking the liquor on the Klamath Indian reservation, and have been brought to Portland by Deputy United States Marshal George Jackson and lodged in the county jail.

Assets Exceed Liabilities.—A bankruptcy petition in which the partnership and individual debts and assets of Johannes Rattanan and Kristian Wuori, tailors of Astoria, are scheduled, has been filed in the federal court. The partnership indebtedness is \$15,582.90 and assets are \$19,522.22.

Railroad Man Dead.—Following an illness that lasted for nearly 18 months, Eugene S. Ferguson died yesterday at his home, 47 Eighth street. Until he was obliged to retire on account of illness, Mr. Ferguson was contracting freight agent of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway in Portland. He is survived by his widow.

Given Verdict for \$800.—Damages to the automobile of John Mathiesen in the sum of \$800 were allowed Mathiesen yesterday in a verdict in Circuit Judge McGinn's court against the Portland Gas & Coke company. One of the company's trucks, according to the testimony, was traveling along Broadway, near Clay street, down hill, on January 6 when Mathiesen started across the street in his car. He alleged that the driver of the truck put on the brakes but the truck skidded completely around on the wet pavement, the rear end striking his automobile. He asked for \$1000 damages.

Appropriation Not Available.—Because the 1914 budget made no provision for any appropriation to aid the chamber of commerce permanent exhibit the county commissioners advised Secretary C. C. Giltner of the chamber that no appropriation as asked could be made. Secretary Giltner had suggested that from \$500 to \$1000 be appropriated to aid in preserving fruits and to the exhibit that a good showing might be made for prospective visitors to the city.

Judge McGinn Adjoins Court.—Circuit Judge McGinn adjourned court this morning until Monday, when he learned that attorneys in cases set for trial were not present. He said that he would give all attorneys until Monday to be ready. When court is taken up again in his department all jury cases will be tried first, that the jury may be excused as soon as possible and not kept at expense while court cases are being tried.

Administration Required.—Because H. R. Trowbridge, who died May 13, failed to mention his three minor children in a will made in 1905, Mrs. Caroline E. Trowbridge, his widow, yesterday filed a petition for her own appointment as administratrix of his estate, valued at approximately \$21,250, without asking for the probate of the will. The will provided that she should receive the entire estate.

Must Abstain From Liquor.—Steve Conner must abstain from liquor for one year and make monthly reports to Deputy District Attorney Hammerley, according to the parole granted him yesterday when he pleaded guilty to a charge of assault. Circuit Judge Morrow granted the parole after sentencing Conner to a year in the county jail.

Miss Millard to Speak.—Miss Jessie Hodge Millard will discuss the subject of "Story Telling and Children's Literature," and tell some illustrative stories at the Infant Science lecture at 2 o'clock under the auspices of the Parents' Educational bureau. All interested in child problems are invited.

Overheated Stove Starts Blaze.—An overheated stove this morning in the King Hill delicatessen at 42 Twenty-third street north this morning caused a small blaze in that place. Five fire companies responded, but the cook put out the fire with water. The delicatessen is owned by Mrs. Clara Vintin.

Noted Lecturer to Speak.—Dr. Frederick Jonte Stanley, a noted lecturer on affairs in the orient, has just advised the Portland Y. M. C. A. of his acceptance of an invitation to lecture there next Sunday afternoon. He will speak

at the men's meeting at 8:15 o'clock, his subject being, "Supremacy on the Pacific—Occidental, Oriental, or Both?" Dr. Stanley is now a resident of New York but was formerly head of the English department of Waseda university at Tokio, Japan. He is recognized as an authority on oriental affairs and has lectured to large audiences in the principal eastern cities.

Play at Richmond School.—The Parent-Teacher circle of Richmond school will present a play, "The Old Maid's Convention," at 8 o'clock tomorrow night in the school assembly hall. A portion of the proceeds will be used to provide prizes for the industrial exhibit to be given in this school in June.
