

BISHOP SCADDING OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IS DEAD

End Comes Early This Morning After a Brief Illness From Pneumonia.

The wish of Mrs. Scadding that they be as simple as possible.

The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Pro-cathedral of St. Stephen the Martyr was the bishop's church, but because of its limited seating capacity, the services will be held at Trinity church at Nineteenth and Everett streets.

Just who will conduct the services has not yet been decided. Several clergymen will participate and Portland and out of town ministers will officiate as pallbearers. Burial will be in Riverside cemetery. It is expected that the regent choir of Trinity will furnish the music.

The body was prepared for burial this morning. Clergymen of the diocese will watch over the body day and night. The bier will remain in the private chapel of the late bishop in his home until Friday night. Then it will be taken to the pro-cathedral at Thirteenth and Clay streets to remain in state until the funeral hour at Trinity.

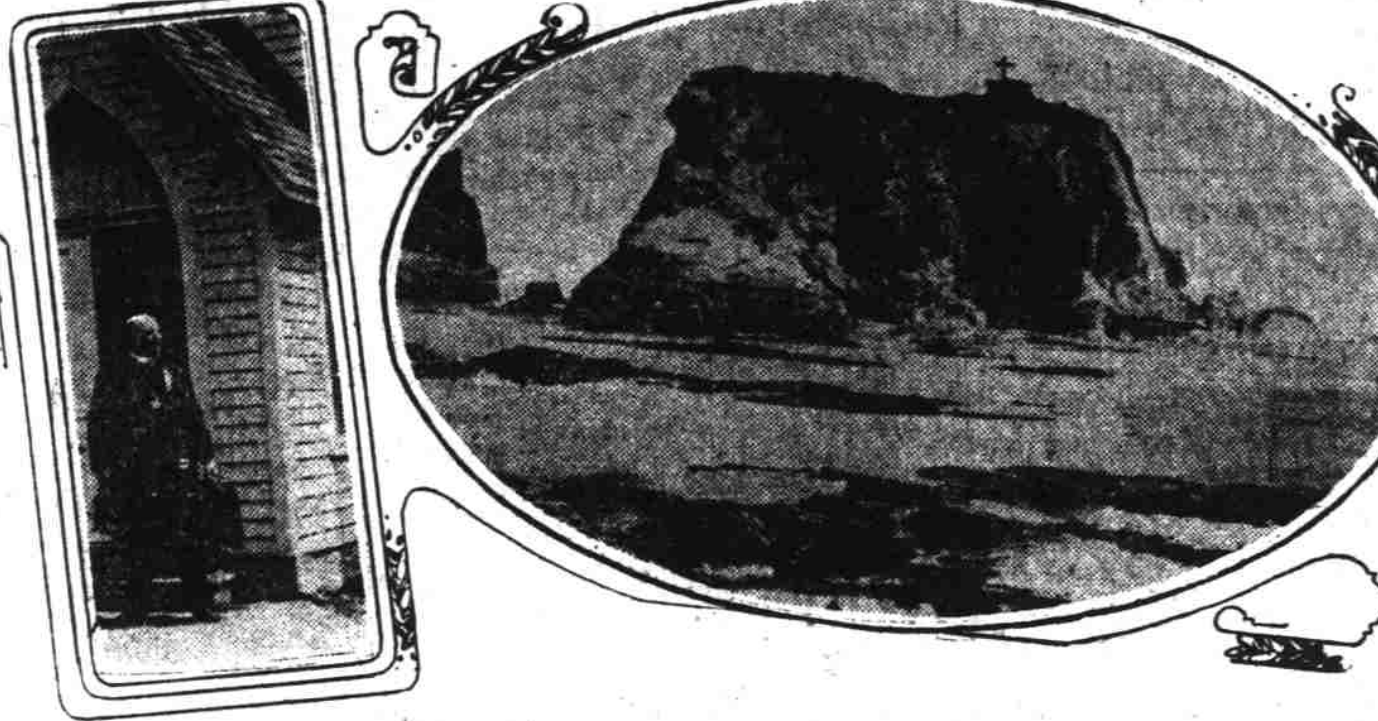
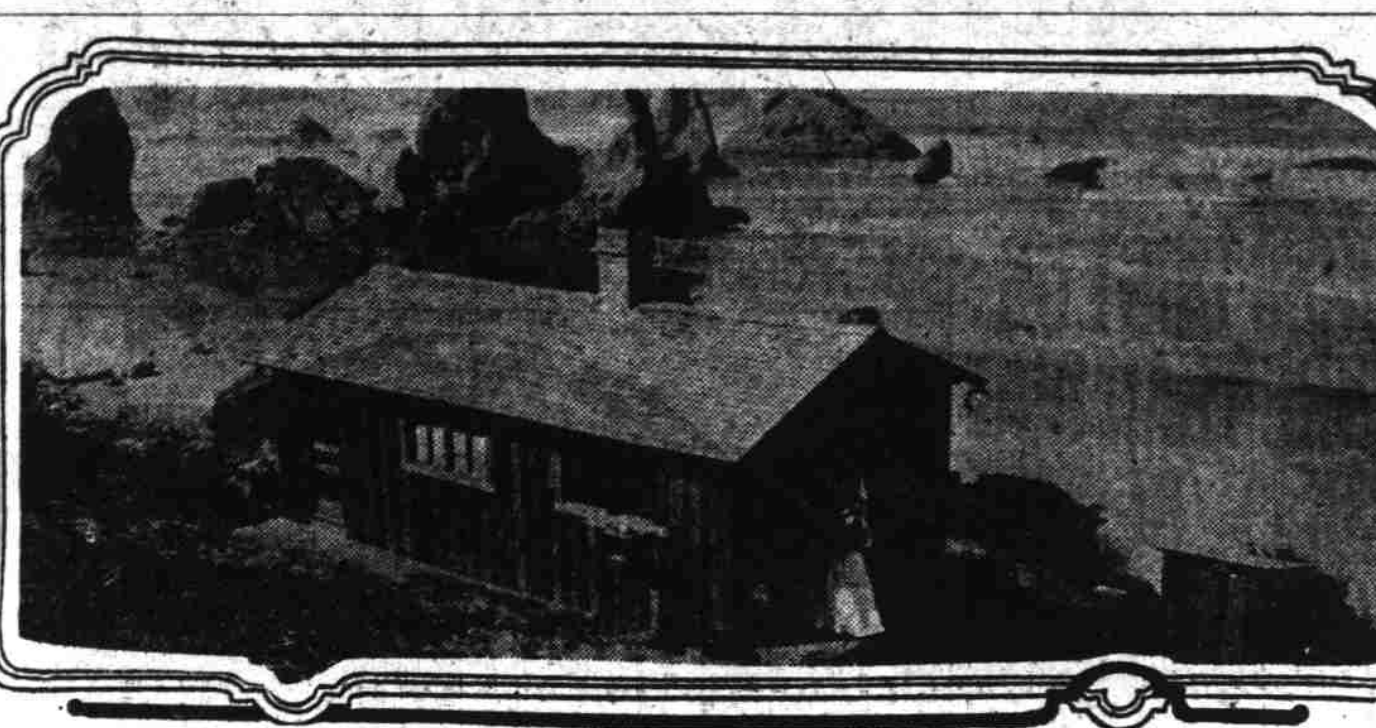
To Arrange for Watch. A meeting of Portland Episcopal clergymen was held at the Portland hotel at 1:30 this afternoon at which arrangements for the watch and the various services that will be held were made.

Charles Scadding became bishop of Oregon September 29, 1904. He was born in Toronto, Canada, November 25, 1841, and his mother, Elizabeth W. Scadding, at a very advanced age, is still living in Toronto. A younger brother, Dr. Crawford Scadding, is a leading physician of Toronto. Word of the serious illness of the bishop was sent him Sunday and he is now on his way to Portland and will arrive Saturday morning.

The bishop received his education in Toronto public schools and at Trinity college in the same city, from which he received a degree in 1865. He was married to Nellie Davy Donaldson, July 11, 1868, at Toronto. Her death occurred in 1894 and two years later, when he was rector of Trinity church at Toledo, Ohio, he married Mary R. Pomroy, who survives him.

Had Many Charges. He studied for clerical orders early and at his graduation from college became a deacon. In 1866 he was made a priest and became assistant pastor of St. George's church, the famous place of worship of J. P. Morgan. He remained there until 1890 when he became rector of Christ church at Middletown, N. Y. In 1893 he became the rector of Trinity church at Toledo, a very large parish. Five years later he was made rector of

the large Emmanuel church at La Grange, Ill., where he remained for ten years.

The Rt. Rev. B. Wistar Morris, second bishop of Oregon, who had held office since 1888, died on Palm Sunday of 1906, and at the meeting of the diocesan convention in June, 1906 Charles Scadding, rector of the LaGrange church, was elected by the clergy and the election was confirmed by the lay delegates unanimously. He was the undisputed choice on the first ballot taken. Bishop Scadding at that time had never been in the west, was known to scarcely any one here per-

sonally and his only record was his accomplishments.

Consecrated Bishop. He was consecrated bishop in his own church at LaGrange in September of that year and October 12 arrived in Portland to take up his labors as head of the diocese. The diocese of Oregon then comprised the whole state. By action of the general convention of 1907, Eastern Oregon was ceded over to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary society and became a missionary district. By this act the diocese of Oregon was limited to the area west of the Cascades.

Bishop Robert L. Paddock was placed in charge of the missionary district east of the mountains. His home is at Hood River, and a peculiar coincidence of this time is that Bishop Paddock is very ill, suffering from a nervous breakdown, at Good Samaritan hospital in this city. He will be unable to do any work in his district this summer, it is believed.

Was Hard Worker. Bishop Scadding's great work has been the solving of the pressing problem of the "Silent Churches." When he came there were but 13 active churches of the Episcopal denomination in Oregon, although there were many abandoned churches. He had, by his enthusiasm and ceaseless energy, re-established the church in many of these parishes. The number of self-supporting churches remained the same, 13, but there are 36 promising missions and over 30 clergymen at work.

Bishop Scadding took a great interest in the Good Samaritan hospital, of which he was president of the board of trustees, and since his incumbency many improvements to the institution were made.

He was also president of the board of trustees of St. Helens Hall, the girl's academy, and of the recently established Bishop Scott Academy for boys at Yamhill.

The sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the diocese was to have been celebrated within two weeks and Bishop Scadding was wrapped up in plans for this affair. The life of the diocese began in 1854, when Bishop Thomas Fielding Scott came from New

York as the first bishop of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The celebration, which was to have been held between the dates of June 2 to 8, has been called off. Bishop Scadding had invited and received acceptance from Bishop Charles E. Woodcock, head of the diocese of Kentucky, a personal friend, to be present as the guest of honor of Oregon diocese. Bishop Woodcock was notified this morning of the death of the Oregon church head, and of the fact that the anniversary observance is off.

Wallis Nash, who was closely associated with the late Bishop Scadding, and who presented the bishop with an address of welcome on behalf of the diocese, who will be deeply felt by the unexpected death of Bishop Charles Scadding, of the Episcopal church," said Mr. Nash.

"Since he came to Oregon in September, 1904, on his election as bishop for the diocese that then covered the entire state, Bishop Scadding has exerted a growing influence for good that has reached far beyond the communion of which he was, by virtue of official position, the most prominent member.

"He never failed to respond to calls that came to him as a citizen as well as a bishop. He threw himself, heart and soul, into efforts for the upbuilding of Oregon in many forms since the first day that he became identified with this young state. In his travels beyond her boundaries he was ever her convinced and convincing advocate.

"Ardent and enthusiastic churchman as he was, Bishop Scadding never failed in recognition of those servants of the same Lord who had cast in their lot with other branches of the church of Christ. His kindly greeting and warm handclasp will be missed by high and low, who recognized him as their friend in every town, every village, in his widespread diocese. He was an indefatigable worker who never spared himself, and he proved himself no less efficient an organizer than Bishop Morris, his loved predecessor. He attracted many recruits to the ranks of the Episcopal clergy in Oregon and has left a distinct impress of his own personality on the western Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church."

St. Johns Company Asks Re-Hearing

Water Works and Lighting Concern Holds That Rates Fixed by Railroad Commission Are Unreasonable.

Salem, Or., May 27.—Alleging that the meter rates fixed by the state railroad commission for the St. Johns water works and lighting company are so low as to be wholly unremunerative, the company today petitioned the commission for a rehearing in the case. The company alleges that the meter rates for residence districts are so low that when the consumers understand the situation they will all demand meters, with the result that the company will be put to a large expenditure and at the same time will be deprived of means for providing funds for paying the expenses of installing meters. The commission's order fixing the rates of the company was the outcome of a complaint made against the company's rates by the city of St. Johns.

BRIEF NEWS OF NORTHWEST

Will Visit Hatchery.

Eugene, Or., May 27.—Members of the state game commission will be in Eugene Tuesday night and will leave Wednesday morning for the state hatchery on the McKenzie river, 30 miles above this city. In company with a party of 12 or 15 Eugene and Springfield men. The object of this visit is to inspect the hatchery with a view to enlarging it and providing for nursery ponds.

Several hundred farmers around Eugene have taken stock in the association and it is planned to interest more farmers.

Veterans Will Ride.

Walla Walla, Wash., May 27.—The Civil War veterans of Walla Walla will ride in the Memorial day parade this year. Citizens have come forward with the offer of automobiles, and the members of the G. A. R. have accepted the offer.

Barrel hoops and dirty streamers hung about the statue erected to the Spanish war veterans on a downtown corner, last night aroused the wrath of Police Sergeant Fred Roecker, and a vigorous search is being made for the miscreants.

A monument to the men who fought in the Civil war and who are buried in the local G. A. R. cemetery is to be erected this summer, at a cost of \$1500. The monument will be paid for by popular subscription.

Members of the county board of education will meet Monday for the purpose of selecting new text books for the schools of the county.

County Auditor J. W. Sweeney has received notice from the state game office that 200,000 steelhead trout have been shipped to the Walla Walla hatchery, and that they will be available for the stocking of local streams.

F. L. Bueckhalter, division superintendent of the Southern Pacific, is the guest of the Cottage Grove Commercial club today.

The Cottage Grove cannery has received its first order, which is for a car of green gooseberries to be shipped to Oklahoma.

Immediately after the testimony had been submitted in the case of the Pass Creek Rural Telephone company vs. the Pacific Telephone company, the Oregon railway and warehouse commission, which held a session here yesterday, ordered a reinstatement of the service between the two companies' lines.

The case of the City of Cottage Grove vs. the Cottage Grove Electric company was heard here today by the Oregon railway and warehouse commission. The city asked better service and lower rates. A decision will not be rendered for several days.

Rain in Lewis County.

Chehalis, Wash., May 27.—From all over Lewis county showers are reported as doing the growing crops thousands of dollars' worth of good. In and directly around Chehalis there has been but little rain. Indications are good for a downpour.

County School Superintendent W. M. Smith. About 75 per cent of those who failed passed in all but one or two subjects and they will have opportunity to take another test in those subjects in June. Those who failed in more than two subjects will not be permitted to try again at the June examinations.

County School Superintendent Smith said the main cause for so many failures was the fact that the pupils had been passed through the lower grades too rapidly. He said they had not been thorough in their work in the fifth and sixth, and other lower grades. He blamed the teachers for this.

Most of the failures were in grammar and arithmetic.
