

GOVERNOR WEST MAY CALL SPECIAL SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE

Has Certain Reform and Economical Legislation That Would Be Considered.

COULD REFER MEASURES

Candidates Would Have Opportunity to Make Good on Platforms.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., May 28.—It is known that Governor West is considering calling a special session of the legislature to meet in August or September, to consider certain reform and reform legislation. He has discussed the matter with friends but as he is now out of the city it is not known whether he has reached a conclusion.

He favors the adoption of a constitutional amendment limiting the tax levy for both state and county taxes. He also favors the enactment of a new tax law, providing for semiannual payment of taxes and removing the penalty on the deferred payment. He favors the consolidation of the office of labor commissioner with the state industrial accident commission. He is advocating the abolishment of the desert land board and the office of state engineer.

Besides such measures as these there are a number of measures needed to make law enforcement more sure and easy, and certain reform legislation which the governor would like to see enacted into law before he leaves the office of governor. It is understood.

As many of the legislators are candidates for reelection, and as most of them are out on reform and economy platforms, it is pointed out that a special session of the legislature before the general election in November would give them an opportunity to put their platforms into effect immediately.

Another feature of a special session, pointed out, is that the legislature could refer to the people for vote at the November election the measures that it was not willing to enact without an expression from the people. Constitutional amendments could also be so referred, eliminating the necessity of circulating petitions. The governor had announced he was going to promote a number of measures and constitutional amendments by holding a series of meetings throughout the state.

Each individual is six and a half hours in 24. I believe there is no greater problem than making this time a wholesome, active time.

The session this morning was largely attended by students of the university, who have been released from attendance upon classes today and tomorrow, to attend the sessions, and by townspeople and visitors from Portland and valley towns.

A cafeteria lunch was served the visitors on the campus this afternoon. The theme for the special session was "Oregon Development," with E. B. Piper of Portland presiding. Papers were read by W. B. Dodson, John H. Lewis, state engineer, R. W. Raymond, Dr. Hector MacPherson, H. G. Starkweather, L. L. Sharp and Professor G. E. Stafford of the University of Oregon.

The conference makes the university for two days the focal point in Oregon for the best thought and experience in community advance and state progress. It has called together representatives of many agencies that specialize in effort for general good.

What Will Result.
Each has opportunity to learn from others, and the sum of information assembled, if organized, will constitute a development program such as Oregon has never before had.

There is general insistence that indulgence in glittering generalities will not build a state, that offerings should consist of, and plans be based upon, exact facts and clear-cut ideas.

The survey includes municipal organization and planning for efficiency; a session is to be devoted to women in Oregon politics; the development of electric power and the state's resources; the Oregon system in practice; legislative needs, especially along social lines; unemployment, immigration, tax revision, state finance, treatment of delinquents and municipal administration with particular reference to a year of commission government in Portland, and the industrial and commercial state survey.

Exhibits of development and betterment already programed help visualize suggestions made.

The first general session of the sixth conference was held in Villard hall last night. The theme was "The University and Constructive State Development." Science and Sentiment in Oregonianism, by Dr. J. B. Wilson of Portland, chairman of the board of higher curricula, made the principal address. John C. Veatch of Portland, president of the University of Oregon Alumni association, opened the discussion. Eugene Brookings of Portland, scheduled for an address, was unable to be present.

Dr. Wilson said in part: The university and the state—that is the new designation. We have been used to Oregon university and the state university but now we have a new and pregnant designation.

The university must seek men and fit each one of them for his destiny. The first thing it should teach is how to enjoy himself, and then he will be ready for the higher calling, a citizen of the world. When you have done this you have done the largest part of your task in making the university serve the state, for these men and women going out from your halls will constructively develop their commonwealth.

The university must teach Oregon commerce. What will a 20 foot channel to the sea be worth unless we have "made-in-Oregon" goods to be shipped to the whole world?

Mr. Veatch urged his alma mater to show Oregon the state's troubles and then convince the people that the university has the right remedy.

Professor F. G. Young, dean of the graduate school and head of the department of economics, presided.

Clark keeps one of the big touring cars largely for his own use. This machine is a large seven passenger car and cost the city \$2225.

In defending the police department for the use of four high priced automobiles, Mayor Albee says that other cities the size of Portland have more automobiles for departmental use.

C. A. Bigelow, commissioner of finance, does not approve of the manner in which a number of machines are handled, and although he has had the matter up with the other commissioners a number of times, little has

been done to stop abuses. He believes, however, that most of the machines are necessary and that they do much to cut down the number of employees.

Plan Is Always Opposed.
A number of times he has urged that all of the city's machines be placed under one man and that when needed they be taken out on requisition. This scheme met opposition every time proposed and as a result the heads of the municipal shop are gradually losing control of the machines.

In addition to the machines owned by the city there are a small number of cars owned privately by city officials and employees, which are sometimes used for the city's business and for which the city cares at its municipal garage. The cost of repairs and fuel for these machines is small, however.

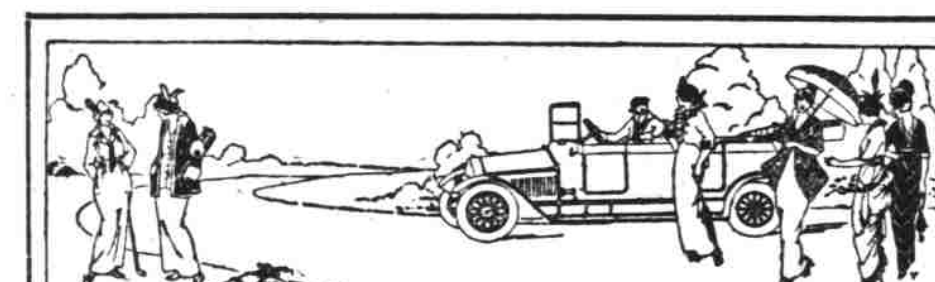
