Between motor speed events Thomas has performed some startling aviation stunts. He has had many narrow escapes from death by air and on race courses. Today's race was his first American appearance.

(Continued From Page One.) with the whistle, giving me one prolonged blast. I then looked over the side of my ship into the water and I saw that my ship was stopped.

Boats Exchange Signals. "I then stopped the engines and blew two long blasts, meaning 'My ship is stopped and has no way upon her.' He answered me again with one prolonged blast.

"At the same time I put my engines full speed ahead with the object of avoiding a collision if possible. Almost at the same instant the starboard struck and cut us down beneath the funnels.

"I then shouted to the Stortstad captain to keep his ship on the starboard side and to get ahead of the hole he had made. He then backed away. The Empress then began to fill and listed over rapidly.

"When the Stortstad struck us I had stopped my engines. I then rang full speed ahead again when I saw the danger was great. My object was to try to run her ashore to save the passengers. Almost immediately the engines stopped, the ship filling and going all the time to starboard.

"I had in the meantime given orders to get the lifeboats launched. I rushed along the starboard side of the boat deck and threw all the gripes out of numbers 1, 3, 5 and 7 boats, and then I went back to the bridge again.

"Get the Boats Out." "I saw the chief officer rushing along to the bridge. "I told him to tell the wireless operator to send out distress signals at once.

'YOU'D ALL BE RICH IF I WERE PRESIDENT' IS T. R.'S PARTING WORD

After Admitting He Can't Talk Intelligently, Roosevelt Gives Statement.

HE HAS LEFT FOR MADRID

He Says in Ten Days He Has Found the Country Is in Bad Shape and Needs the Progressives.

(By the International News Service.) New York, May 30.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt sailed today for Spain to attend the wedding of his son Kermit. Before leaving he gave out the following statement:

Since my return from South America I have received hundreds of telegrams and letters from all over the country requesting statements from me on the political situation. It has been utterly impossible to reply to these communications, first because of lack of time, and second because I must be remembered that I have been out of the country for nearly eight months and have been only home 10 days and therefore not been able to acquire the necessary information that will enable me to respond intelligently to many of the inquiries made of me.

"When I return from abroad I shall at once take up actively the political situation. It goes without saying that I intend to the utmost of my ability to do all that I can for the principles for which I have contended in the past, men throughout the country who have stood so valiantly in the fight that the Progressive party is waging and has waged for these principles.

Cost of Living Not Reduced. "There is widespread apprehension among our people that the pinch of poverty is felt in many a household. We cannot ignore the conditions which have brought about this state of things. The cost of living has not been reduced. Not the slightest progress has been made in solving the trust question. It has been shown that the reduction of the tariff in no shape or way helps towards this solution.

"The economic conditions are such that business is in jeopardy and that the small business man, the farmer and the industrial wage worker are all suffering because of these conditions. The truth simply is that the only wise and sane remedy is a more energetic governmental progressivism and the resolute purpose to secure good results instead of fine phrases were the principles enunciated in the Progressive platform in connection with the trusts and the tariff alike.

King Cables His Sympathy. London, May 30.—King George today cabled his regrets and sympathy for the Empress of Ireland's loss to the Duke of Connaught, governor-general of Canada, and to Sir Thomas O'Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific. He also received a message of sympathy from President Poincare of France.

Army Soldiers Sail for London to Attend Congress. New York, May 30.—The most remarkable body of pilgrims that ever left these shores sailed out of New York harbor today on the steamship Olympic bound for London to attend the third congress of the Salvation Army. The party comprised upwards of 700 officers and soldiers of the Salvation Army in the United States and was in charge of Commander Eva Booth.

Politicians Out of Jail. Trenton, N. J., May 30.—Half a dozen former public officials and political leaders of New Jersey are to be released from the state penitentiary tomorrow, as a result of the commutation of their sentences by the court of pardons. The most conspicuous among the men to be restored to freedom is "Commodore" Louis Kuehnle, the former political dictator of Atlantic City and county. Kuehnle was convicted last December on a charge of conspiracy and sentenced to serve one year in prison and to pay a fine of \$1000. It is understood that he intends to return to the hotel business in Atlantic City, but whether he will make an effort to regain his prestige as a political boss has not been made known.

Celebration at New Strelitz. Berlin, May 30.—A dispatch from New Strelitz says the little capital was en fete today in celebration of the tenth anniversary of Adolphus Frederick as the reigning grand duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz. The grand duke is probably the wealthiest of all the German sovereigns. More than one-half of the great duchy, which comprises about 1000 square miles, is his property. In a political sense, Mecklenburg-Strelitz is a strange anomaly in the midst of modern Europe, for its constitution dates from the middle of the sixteenth century. The little country is ruled absolutely by the grand duke, and no kind of parliamentary representation exists.

Ex-Mayor of Rome To Represent Italy

Ernest Nathan Has Been Appointed National Commissioner to the Panama-Pacific Exposition in 1915.

Washington, May 30.—Plans were being made at the Italian embassy here for the exhibit which Italy intends to send to the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco next year. With an appropriation of 2,000,000 lire by the Italian parliament, assuring the exhibit, the Italian ambassador, Mr. Confalonieri, has officially notified the state department that his government will participate in the international fair and has made arrangements for the arrival here next week of Ernesto Nathan, ex-mayor of Rome, who has been appointed the national commissioner from Italy.

IRRIGATION DISTRICT WOULD CLOSE UP ALL PROJECTS AT YAKIMA

Balance of Money Allotted Subject to Requirements of Secretary of the Interior.

NO FUNDS FOR GEM NOW

Application From Idaho District Turned Down for Present—Ryan Is on Western Trip With Willcox.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, May 30.—E. W. Burr, attorney for the North Yakima Irrigation district, called on the reclamation service a few days ago in the interest of getting the projects under that district closed up. The total cost will be about \$500,000, of which five-eighths has been expended. He said that he was especially solicitous at this time about the Snipes Mountain Irrigation district and the Sunnyside Irrigation district, for the Benton extension of the Sunnyside main canal. Two of the five districts being formed in the limits of the Yakima project. The balance of the money required to complete these districts is allotted subject to compliance with the requirements of the secretary of the interior.

Bubonic Plague Is Feared at Panama

Health Officers of Canal Zone Guard Against Infection by Rats Because of Manta Epidemic.

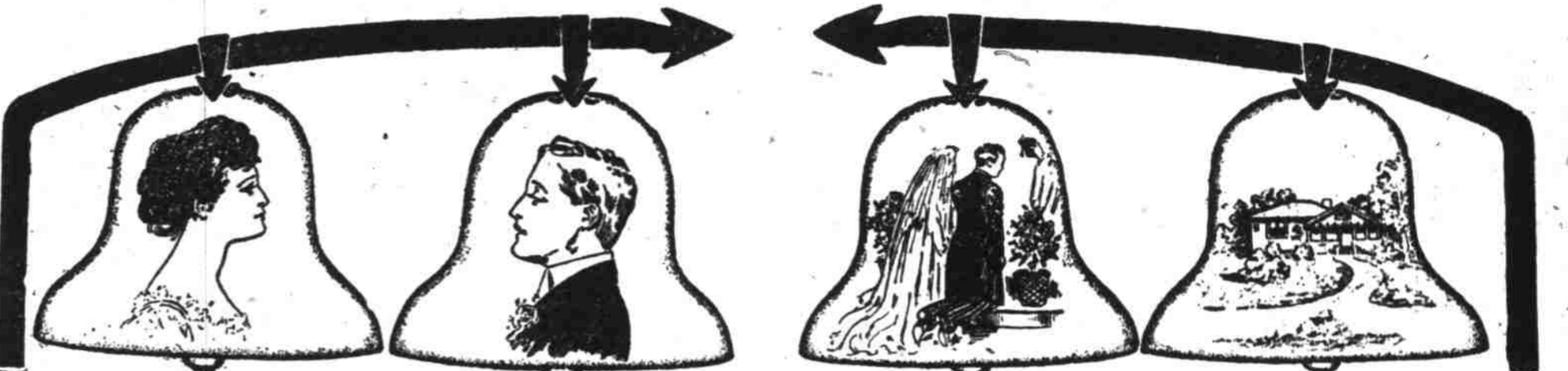
Washington, May 30.—With the bubonic plague just 48 hours away from the city of Panama, in the Ecuadorian port of Manta, the health officers of the canal zone are taking no chances of infection from that quarter, and daily there is a vigorous rat hunt under governmental auspices in the ancient isthmian city.

Announcement has just been made that the court of claims has awarded the contractors on the Shoshone project 6 cents damages and 6 cents costs. The contractors sued for \$100,000 damages.
