

ARCHITECTS DEMAND
THAT GOVERNMENT
KEEP ITS PROMISE
Senator Chamberlain Re-
ceives Complaint From the
Oregon Chapter of Institute
CONTEST IN GOOD FAITH
Competitive Designs Submitted on Pub-
lic Buildings and Acted Upon by
Committee Chosen With Care.

(Washington Bureau of the Journal.)
Washington, June 1.—The Oregon
chapter of the American Institute of
Architects has asked Senator Cham-
berlain to take up the complaint of the
institute against the government for
breaking faith on an important com-
petition for designs for public buildings.
Senator Chamberlain has taken up the
question with the treasury depart-
ment. The statement of the matter
with special reference to the depart-
ment of justice buildings, is set forth
by the American institute as follows:
"In May, 1908, an appropriation of
\$2,500,000 was made to purchase land
for a group of government buildings
for the departments of state, of justice
and of commerce and labor.
"This project was looked upon as so
important that the secretary of the
treasury decided to institute a competi-
tion to select an architect for each of
these three buildings. To assure the
widest opportunity of choice, 60 of the
leading architects in the United States
received and accepted an invitation to
compete, 20 being invited for each
building.
"Program Is Definite.
"The program was perfectly definite
in its statements that the competition
was for the selection of three archi-
tects to whom the erection of these
buildings would be awarded, stating
that the selection of one of the de-
signs by the secretary of the treasury
and its subsequent approval by the
president, the secretary of the treasury
and the head of the department to oc-
cupy the building would be final and
conclusive, and further, that the suc-
cessful competitor would be designated
to prepare drawings and specifications
and locally supervise the construction
of the building.
"The competition was judged by
three separate juries, composed of five
architects each. The award was made
January 8, 1911. The 60 competitors
and 18 judges acted throughout in
the belief that the government in good
faith had committed itself to the
award and to the erection of these
three buildings by the architects se-
lected.
"The three winners were called upon
to develop and harmonize their plans,
and a contract for the architectural
services in connection with the build-
ing for the department of justice was
signed August 28, 1911. It constituted
a definite contract for preliminary
services as far as the appropriation
enabled the department to act at that
time, and stated that the supplement-
ary contract would be made when the
building was authorized.
"First Payment Made.
"The first payment was made to the
winner of the building for the depart-
ment of justice on September 11, 1911,
in amount of \$19,431.85. This was a
partial payment on account of the pre-
liminary contract and represented not
only what was due at that time for the
competition drawings, but also eight
months' work in revising and complet-
ing the preliminary drawings.
"Work was continued on the plans
by the winner until the spring of 1913,
when he was advised by the supervis-
ing architect of the treasury not to do
any further work. Subsequent to this
he was notified in January, 1914, to go
to Washington to revise and complete
the plans in the position of the building
and to prepare another estimate of cost,
thereby receiving assurance that the ad-
ministration proposed to carry on its
agreement with him.
"H. R. 12801, a bill for an appropriation
for the department of justice, fol-
lowed along the same lines and provid-
ed that the architect selected in the
competition should execute this build-
ing. The attorney general gave evi-
dence on this bill at a hearing on Feb-
ruary 6, 1914, and the secretary of the
treasury gave evidence at a hearing on
February 25, 1914, opposing this bill
and proposing in its place H. R. 13870,
the bill now under consideration, which
gives authority to a commission to ap-
point an architect, either by competi-
tion or selection, to render archi-
tectural services in the preparation of the
plans under the control of the supervising
architect. While it is true that this
bill does not definitely state that the
architect already selected by the com-
petition would not be appointed as the
architect of the building, yet inasmuch
as this bill, while apparently puts it
in the power of the commission to ap-
point an architect other than the archi-
tect already selected, takes the place
of a prior bill introduced in the house,
which gave definite assurance that the
building would be built according to
the designs of the architect originally

selected, the assumption was made
if it was the intention of the govern-
ment to proceed along the same lines
no change would have been made in
the bill first introduced.
"The details of the case, which is the
statement given above, have chiefly to
do with the building for the depart-
ment of justice, because that building
is the only one now under considera-
tion, do not affect the great question
involved—namely, that of national
fair play. The government, through
its authorized agents, made a promise
which was accepted in good faith. No
reason has been advanced for breaking
that promise, and the subsequent
change of method in the administration
of government architecture as now
advocated by the government should
not affect the fulfillment of a promise
previously made."

Sweden is Carlsbad's most distin-
guished visitor just at present.
The king has almost completely re-
covered from the operation he under-
went for stomach troubles at Stock-
holm recently, and his visit here was
only undertaken to put the finishing
touch on his cure. It is said his
majesty's illness probably would not
have resulted fatally in any case, but
that the operation has had a wonder-
fully beneficial mental effect, since it
removed the fear Gustav unquestion-
ably felt that he was suffering from
cancer of the stomach.
There is no further talk of his abdi-
cation, and it is said that when he re-
turns to Sweden he will immediately

Germans Indorse
Rural Credit Plan
Urges Campaign to Start Movement of
Desirable Countrymen From Crowded
Centers of Old Country to States.
Eugene, Or., June 1.—The delegates
to the Confederation of German
Speaking societies, after finishing the
business of the convention yesterday
forenoon, were invited to the German
club house on the outskirts of the
city, where a concert was given. At
the morning session a resolution pro-
posed at the Saturday session op-
posed to prohibition was adopted.
A resolution urging the state to
begin an active campaign to produce

a movement in the emigration cen-
ters of Europe, urging desirable emi-
grants to locate in the state and that
a bureau be established by the state
which will assist and direct emi-
grants upon their arrival here was
adopted and the rural credit system
was indorsed, the establishment of
a farm credit bank in the state was
urged.
A resolution was passed at the
Sunday session recommending that
every German organization in the
state appoint a committee to urge
the instruction of the German lan-
guage in its community and that the
German societies organize and con-
duct schools where instruction be
given along the line required in ex-
amination for citizenship papers.
