

I. W. W.'S GO TO JAIL IN TARRYTOWN BECAUSE OF THEIR RABID TALK

Arthur Caron and Ten Followers Start Talking on Colorado Strike in Street.

WILL BESIEGE OIL KING

Prisoners Sing in Jail and Say They Will Go to See Rockefeller as Soon as They Are Released.

Tarrytown, N. Y., June 1.—Arthur Caron, I. W. W. leader, with nine men and one woman follower, arrived here at 9:30 Saturday night and proceeded immediately to Fountain Square.

Mounting a soap box in the middle of the square, Caron waited until a crowd had gathered. Then he began: "Have you ever heard the wall of a dying child? Have you ever heard the wall of a dying mother? Children and mothers were murdered out in Colorado and the real murderer—"

A rush of police through the crowd put an abrupt end to the address and in spite of the protests of his followers Caron was dragged from the soap box and led away to police headquarters. As soon as he was taken away another orator took up the harangue but as soon as he reached an incendiary stage in his speech, he too, was arrested.

A third took his place and met the same fate. This continued until all the men and women had been locked up.

The prisoners spent the night in singing and making speeches from their cells. They declared that they would be released on the charges of speaking without permits and would go Sunday to besiege the Rockefeller estate.

Calls Arrest Outrage.
New York, June 1.—News of the arrest at Tarrytown of persons, who were

endeavoring to carry into his home the campaign against John D. Rockefeller, in connection with the Colorado strike, elicited emphatic comment from Mayor Stricker today. He termed the arrests "an outrage," and declared that he probably would go to the city where the oil king lives to join the agitators in their fight.

"There is no reason why people should not speak as freely at Tarrytown as elsewhere," he declared. "The fact that Rockefeller lives there should not bar them."

Chinese Guarding Revolution Agent
Hatch Reaches San Francisco from Portland and Young Chinese Adherents Are Watching Over Him.
San Francisco, June 1.—Trusted adherents of the Young China movement were keeping vigilant guard today over Y. P. Hatch, or Yao Yung Pak, to give him his name in correct Chinese, who arrived from Portland Sunday to stir revolutionary sentiment against President Yuan Shi Kai's present government of China. Rewards amount-

ing, according to some accounts, to as much as \$100,000 are said to have been offered for Hatch's head, and the San Francisco Young Chinese did not want anyone to earn them while the revolutionary agent is in their grasp. Hatch said he came as the personal representative of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, leader of the revolution which overthrew the Manchus and first provisional president of China. He declared Yuan has established a dictatorship and that Sun and his followers were resolved to have a real republic.

Spanish Remember Colonel's Book
Criticism of Them in His Writings Does Not Tend to Add to Joy in His Impending Visit.
Madrid, June 1.—Hints that Colonel Roosevelt's record as a campaigner in Cuba during the Spanish-American war is being recalled here by certain persons in upper circles at King Alfonso's court were heard here today by connection with comments on his expected presence in Madrid at the wedding of

his son Ramon with Ambassador Willard's daughter.

The mere fact that he fought Spaniards would not signify so much, it was intimated, but some of the passages in his book recounting his experiences in Cuba were commented on rather bitterly.

It was agreed on all hands that he will be given an outwardly very cordial reception, but the impression given was that there were quarters in which this cordiality would not be entirely sincere.
