

# MUNICIPAL DOCK AT ASTORIA WILL BE MODERNLY COMPLETE

Buildings to Be Covered With Pure Corrugated Iron to Prevent Rust.

TO ACCOMMODATE LINES

Driving of First Pile One Feature of Today's Celebration.

Astoria, Or., June 3.—The first unit of the Port of Astoria municipal dock at Smith's Point, starting of construction on which was a feature of the joint celebration here today, will include a dock and warehouse 30x100 feet along the west side, and dock 100x600 feet across the north end of Pier 1.

The buildings will be of frame construction, covered with pure corrugated iron. This iron differs from the ordinary commercial article, or mild steel, in that it has all impurities removed which makes it impervious to rust. The buildings will be well lighted and equipped with automatic sprinkler system and mechanical freight handling devices.

E. J. Walsh, engineer of the Port of Astoria commission, is engineer of unit one.

The development, when completed, will provide 6000 feet of water front, and the piers are long enough to accommodate the largest ships that can pass through the Panama canal. Ship one in the plan is 400 feet wide at the entrance, narrowing to 250 feet at the land end. This plan was adopted to facilitate the entrance of ships under adverse conditions. Ship two is 270 feet wide for its entire length. This is wide enough to accommodate a line of ships on each side, and a space of 70 feet left for the handling and movement of barges and vessels.

The completed plan provides space for 3700 lineal feet of dock and warehouse of one or two stories height, and 20 feet wide with ample trucking facilities; 20,000 tons coal storage, and coal handling equipment; a cold storage building to handle the fruit shipments of the Columbia river valley; grain elevator, and river boat

landings. Fuel and water pipes will be installed along the front of each pier, so ships may replenish their supplies while discharging cargoes.

Insurance Covers Bridge Fire Loss

Operator W. A. Hart on Hawthorne Span Is Transferred to Position of Gate Keeper on Broadway Bridge.

Following the accident to the Hawthorne bridge last Friday, which caused about \$400 worth of damage and tied up traffic more than 24 hours, W. A. Hart, the operator who was in charge when the heavy lift span got beyond control, today was replaced by C. F. Smith as operator by the county commissioners. Hart was transferred to the Broadway bridge as gate tender, position he had occupied before being advanced to operator.

During the last two weeks the Hawthorne bridge has figured in two costly accidents. The first was a fire. It will cost about \$500 to repair the damage. The fire loss is covered by \$2000 fire insurance taken out by the county some time ago.

The county has carried nominal insurance for the reason that it operates the bridge and must pay for repairs. Workmen engaged in repairing the damage done by fire probably will complete their work by this evening.

There is a possibility that the county commissioners may follow the example of the O. W. R. & N. company and cover the under wooden parts of the Hawthorne and Broadway bridges with asbestos to prevent future fires.

Selection of Chapin Jury Commenced

Third Attorney Added to Defense in Case of Larceny by Bailie; Second Trial Proceeding.

Work of selecting a jury for the second trial of W. H. Chapin, a realty dealer accused of larceny by bailie, began this morning in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court.

Chapin, member of the former Chapin-Herlow Mortgage & Trust company, was indicted along with E. C. Herlow, on a charge of having secured \$3500 from Mr. and Mrs. William Grace, an aged couple, who had been his life long friends. They entrusted the money to him, it is alleged, for the purpose of making some investments, and instead of doing so converted the amount to the firm's use.

At Chapin's first trial last week the jury is said to have stood 11 to 1 for conviction.

The retrial today was marked by the entrance of a third attorney into the case for the defense, and in addition to A. King Wilson and George Rossman, Chapin is now represented by J. J. Fitzgerald.

It is believed that the jury will be completed and opening statements made before adjournment late this afternoon.

ROSE FANCIER HONORED

Auto Fire Quenched

A lighted cigar butt thrown under automobile No. 4682, from which gasoline was leaking, ignited the gas and slightly damaged the machine at 1 o'clock this afternoon at the corner of Broadway and Morrison streets. Chemicals brought by employees in the kitchen of the Portland hotel extinguished the flames before any serious damage resulted.

Construction Crew Goes on Strike

Hood River, Or., June 3.—The construction crew of the Western Union Telegraph company engaged in building a line from Hood River to Portland are on strike on account of difficulties arising out of the return of St. Oiler, who was returned as foreman after his trial in the justice court here on a charge of striking a workman with a pair of steel knuckles, for which he was bound over to appear before the grand jury at the July term of the circuit court, and released from custody upon giving \$3000 cash bail.

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The club also seeks to have the Alberta line cross the Broadway bridge instead of the steel bridge, to save time on trips downtown.

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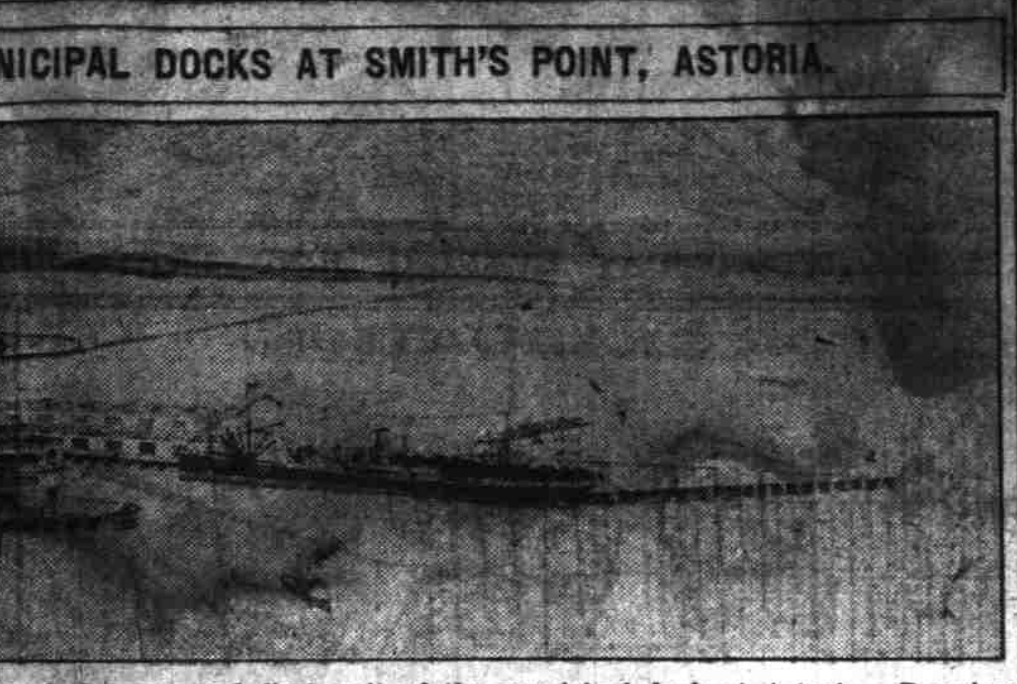
