

OREGON MEN QUOTED IN FREE TOLLS SPEECH BY SENATOR RANDELL

Lumber Industry on Pacific Coast Used as Instance to Drive Home Argument.

EVIDENCE FROM HEARINGS

Louisiana Senator Advocates the Exemption of All American Ships From Payment of Tolls.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, June 3.—In his speech on the Panama canal tolls question Senator Randall of Louisiana said he would exempt all American ships from the payment of tolls. He referred to the Pacific coast lumber trade and quoted Mr. Ransom of Portland, saying:

"As a concrete instance, let us take lumber, a commodity which exists in very large quantities on the Pacific coast, and is becoming scarce along the Atlantic seaboard. The evidence of Mr. Ransom, a lumberman of Portland, Or., before the committee on interoceanic canals, page 605 of the hearings, was that the present railroad rate from the northern Pacific coast to the Atlantic terminals, such as Boston or New York, is 75 cents per hundred pounds, which is approximately \$24 per thousand feet on rough lumber, and less on the lighter grades. He states that the water rate through the canal will be 30 cents per hundred pounds, or \$9.00 per thousand feet.

"His testimony is corroborated by Mr. Skinner of San Francisco, who is also in the lumber business, and who states, on page 808 of the hearings, that his company now has an offer of tonnage in cargo capacity of \$9 a thousand feet from Puget sound to New York or the east coast of Pennsylvania, if tolls are not assessed. If they are, the tolls are to be added to it." He also states that at the same time a 30 cent rate was offered to St. Louis and Mississippi river common points, as against a 55 cent rate by rail. The rate to Mississippi river points, however, was made contingent on the establishment of a line with free tolls.

"There was a difference of opinion as to what amount a thousand feet of average lumber would pay with the tolls at \$1.20 per net ton, and Mr. Teal of Portland, Or., who is one of the ablest and purest men in the chamber, testifying before the interoceanic canals committee, page 929 of the hearings, estimates that it would be about 6 cents per hundred pounds, or \$1.65 per thousand feet, which, I believe, is correct.

"This evidence proves that in any event there will be a net saving in freight from the Pacific to the Atlantic of from \$12 to \$15 per thousand feet, which is certainly a very material item; and if the tolls are collected this saving would be reduced by \$1.65 per thousand feet; hence the consumer of lumber is interested in this question to the extent of \$1.65 on every thousand feet of lumber he uses. How would this apply to a citizen of Washington desiring to construct a house in which 20,000 feet of lumber would be required? If there be free tolls, he could get his lumber at a reduction of \$1.65 on each thousand feet, or \$32.20 less than if tolls are charged. This is quite a saving to the citizen, and, though lumber has been used as an illustration, the same would apply to the innumerable articles exchanged in the course of trade between the two sections of our country, and a proper benefit would be derived on every one of them."

Railroad Hearings Set.
Salem, Or., June 3.—The application of the St. Johns Water & Lighting company for a rehearing on its rate case has been set by the railroad commission for June 19 at Portland. The commission fixed the water rates for the company, which now asserts that the meter rates are unreasonably low. The commission will hear the application of the Oregon Short Line railroad company for permission to reduce its train service on the Vale-Brogan branch from daily to tri-weekly at Vale on June 12.

The application of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern to suspend the right of way fencing law on its Alpine and Bellfountain branches will be heard at Monroe June 18.

Harry M. Bouvy Wins Saylor Prize and C. F. Larson Wins Anatomy Medal. Changes in Faculty.

The commencement exercises of the University of Oregon Medical department will be held at 8 o'clock this evening in the auditorium of Lincoln high school, and are open to the public. The class to be graduated is composed of 26 members, the largest in five years. W. W. Cotton will deliver the graduating address: "Medical Education a Function of the State." Dr. Kenneth A. J. McKenzie, dean of the school, will deliver the "Charge to the Students." A majority of the graduates will assume internships in the hospitals of the northwest. Two of them are medal winners. Harry M. Bouvy was awarded the Saylor prize, having received the highest grades in all departments during the four years' course; and C. F. He is charged with misappropriation of \$330 of the company's funds which he had in his charge from collections. He is held for bail of \$1000. Less than a week ago Ernest Arehart, who was with Eilers as a piano tuner until about May 1, left the city with W. M. Roberts, another piano tuner, in a rig belonging to the Yakima Eilers' establishment and have not returned. Warrants are out for their arrest on a charge of grand larceny in the theft of the team.

Settlers Request Survey of Lands

Cowlitz County Homesteaders Arrive in Portland; Senator Chamberlain's Aid to Be Sought.

With an appeal to Senator Chamberlain to use his influence in having the government to survey their lands, five Cowlitz county, Wash., settlers were in Portland Monday consulting with Attorney Charles R. Reeves. The settlers say that the extreme delay of the government in not surveying the public lands they occupy is greatly hampering development of a rich area. Six sections are occupied and on all the quarters, from \$600 to \$2000 in improvements are expended. Application to have the government survey the lands was made in 1911, and the money was appropriated by the government. The committee of the settlers was recently told by a government official, however, that the survey had been held up because of a lack of competent surveyors in the government service. The land is 30 miles from Portland, about 12 miles east of Woodland on the Lewis river.

Better Service for Newberg Patrons

Commercial Club Efforts Are Successful; Theatre Train Is One of New Features Introduced by S. P.

Newberg, Or., June 3.—Some weeks ago a committee from the Commercial club went to Portland and had an interview with Southern Pacific officials in regard to a change in train service between Portland and Newberg. The committee was told that the request would be given due consideration.

Today a reply was received from General Passenger Agent Scott to the effect that the stops between Oswego and Portland, of trains from Newberg, will be eliminated, thereby having trains arrive at Jefferson street in the morning at 7:45 instead of 7:50. The evening train to Newberg to leave Union station at 5:30 instead of 5:50, reaching Newberg 20 minutes earlier than at present. Commencing June 6 an experiment will be made of having a Saturday night train leave Union station at 11:54 to accommodate theatre goers.

An additional train was put on Sunday which arrives here at 2:05 and starts back at 2:25 p. m. A loop train has also been put on which leaves Newberg for Portland at 5:34 p. m.

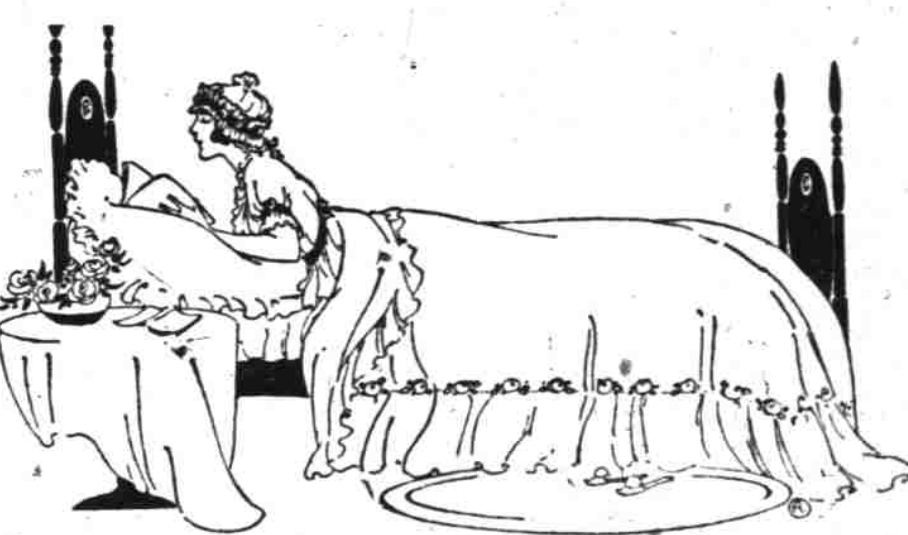
