Today's Forecasts.

Portland and vicinity—Unsettled tonight and Saturday, probably showers; warmer Saturday, southerly winds.

Oregon—Unsettled tonight and Saturday, probably showers; heavy frost east portion tonight; warmer Saturday, southerly winds.

Washington—Unsettled tonight and Saturday, probably showers; warmer Saturday, southerly winds.

Idaho—Unsettled tonight and Saturday, probably showers; heavy frost south portion tonight; warmer Saturday.

Weather Conditions.

The pressure is moderately high on the north Pacific slope, and from the region of the Great Lakes south to Florida. Low pressure with unsettled weather conditions obtained in most other sections. In the Pacific states, New Mexico and the southern plain states, precipitation has occurred within the last 24 hours in fairly heavy amounts. Some of the heaviest rain has been reported from the interior. The rainfall was very heavy in eastern South Dakota, 1.58 inches having occurred in 24 hours at Huron. The weather is much cooler in north central California, Nevada and Utah. In the mountain states, Iowa, Illinois, Pennsylvania, District of Columbia and interior western Canada, temperatures continue considerably below normal on most of the Pacific slope. Killing frost was reported this morning from southeastern Oregon.

The conditions are favorable for unsettled weather in this district on Saturday and Sunday, probably with showers. Frost will form in the early morning in the Pacific states, southern Idaho, and elsewhere. It will be warmer Saturday.

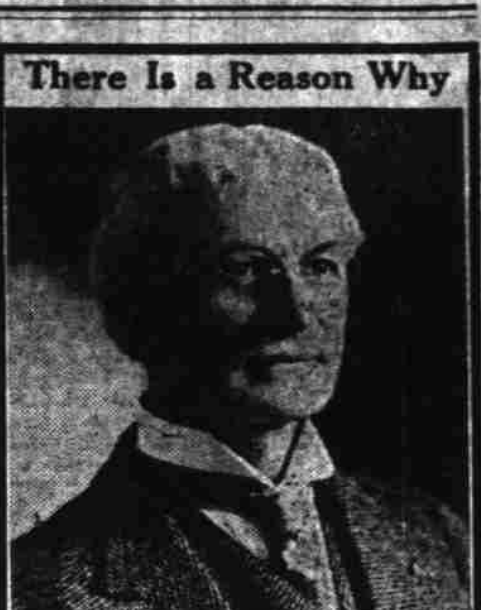
