

TWO LOSE LIVES IN INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS DURING PAST WEEK

Seventy Other Mishaps Reported to O. P. Hoff for Filing.

BAKER AND LINNTON ROAD

Rudy Jungnickel Killed While Employed by Hydraulic Company; Mill Fatality.

Salem, Or., June 8.—Two fatal accidents and 70 other accidents were reported to State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff last week. The fatal accidents occurred on the Linnton road and at Baker. Hodges Relieved by Verdict of Jury

Kansas Governor Says He Wanted Strangers to Realize Woman's Assault Charges Were Untrue.

Topeka, Kan., June 8.—Commenting on his exoneration of charges of assault and battery preferred by Mrs. Luella West, Governor Hodges declared he felt the general public knew all the time that the charges would not stand in court.

"But I felt humiliated because I feared a wrong impression might be spread outside the state, where I was not so well known," said the governor. The jury returned a verdict against Mrs. West after one minute of deliberation. The court's charge virtually permitted no other verdict.

Cooled Her Tongue on Ammonia Pipe

Girl Sees Frost on Icing Plant Apparatus and Licks It—Loses Part of That Member as a Result.

Keokuk, Iowa, June 8.—Alma Dentley, 11-year-old girl of this city, was warm when she walked into a local butcher shop. She saw a pile of frost on an ammonia pipe to the refrigerator plant and stuck her tongue on it. She was held prisoner for 10 minutes and before she could be pried loose her cheek and arm were frozen to the pipe. She lost a portion of the end of her tongue and that member was severely injured when the doctor attempted to get her loose.

'DUNDEE' REID, LAWYER, RAILROAD BUILDER, FINANCIER, IS DEAD

Large Undertakings Accomplished With Funds Supplied by Representative.

William Reid, lawyer, railroad builder and financial agent, who was widely known as "Dundee" Reid, died yesterday afternoon at his home at Eighth and Hume streets, at the age of 70 years. He had lived in Portland since 1874, when he came as secretary of the Oregon & Washington Trust & Investment company of Scotland.

Two years later he formed the first savings bank in the state. From 1874 to 1880 he acted as secretary of the Portland Board of Trade.

Mr. Reid engaged in the practice of law in 1887, the year he was admitted to the bar before the supreme court of Scotland, his native land. He was a college graduate, had traveled much and in 1902 was United States consular agent at Wellington, N. Z.

For many years Mr. Reid was actively engaged in railway construction in Oregon. His first venture in that line was in building a narrow gauge line from Gray's Crossing to Sheridan, which was later extended to Dundee. He then built the narrow gauge from Airle to Portland. One of his railroad ventures was building a line from Hillsboro to Astoria. This road was surveyed and about 15 miles graded, but it was never completed. Later Mr. Reid undertook to extend the Astoria & Seaside road across the mountains to Nehalem valley, but the undertaking was pronounced impossible by the engineers employed to make the survey.

Fire at Reedville Destroys Property

General Merchandise Store and Adjoining Residence Go in Early Morning Blaze of Unknown Origin.

Reedville, Or., June 8.—Fire destroyed the general merchandise store and adjoining residence of B. Grassner at 3 o'clock yesterday morning, entailing a total loss estimated at about \$10,000, partly covered by insurance.

The origin of the fire is unknown. It started in the store and spread to the dwelling. Mrs. Grassner was in Portland at the time, visiting with friends. Mr. Grassner, two children and a clerk in the store, who slept in the dwelling, escaped in the nick of time from the burning building, some of them in their night robes.

Mrs. Robert Louis Stevenson's Ashes Will Be Taken to Top of Mount Vane, Samoa, by Her Daughter.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 8.—Ashes of Mrs. Robert Louis Stevenson, who died recently at Santa Barbara, will be taken to the summit of Mount Vane, Samoa, and buried beside those of her husband, according to her daughter, Mrs. Isabel Strong, who is here to-day. Mrs. Strong, who has just returned from Samoa, learned of her mother's death through an old newspaper she picked up while abroad.

Suicide Suspected As Train Robber

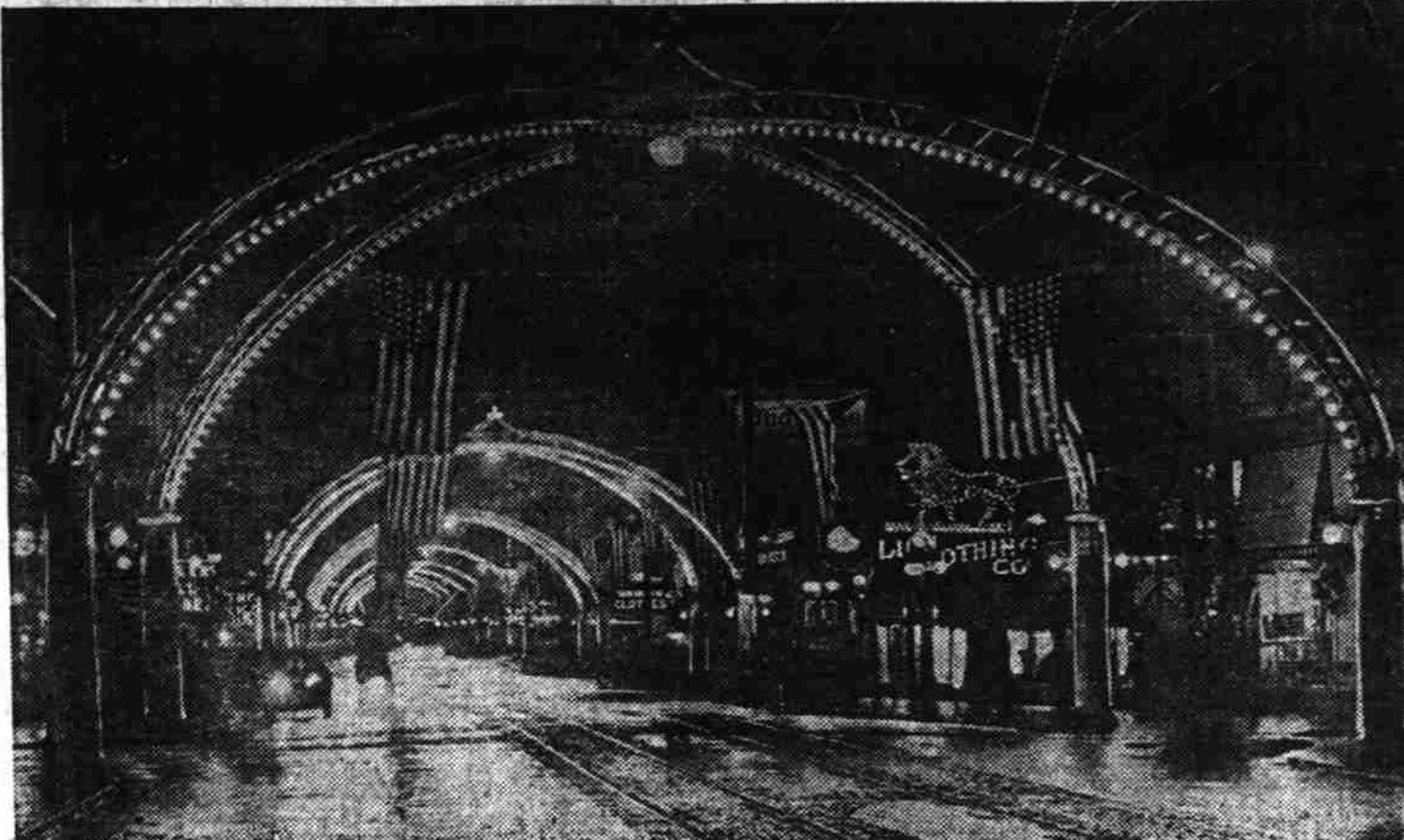
Wife of Jack Folmer, Who Killed Himself When Arrested in Stockton, Estimates Knowledge of Holdups.

Stockton, Cal., June 8.—Mrs. Jack Folmer, who is being held here for the Arizona authorities on charges of forgery, is said to have told a remarkable story of crime committed during the past few years by her husband, Jack Folmer, who killed himself while being taken to jail here a few days ago.

According to Chief of Police Belare, the story she outlined to him included everything from picking pockets to train robbery and murder. The couple spent considerable time in the northwest, and the woman hinted at crimes committed around Tacoma, but did not give details. The police here believe Folmer was concerned in some of the train robberies near that city. Mrs. Folmer is only 19 years old, having been lured from her home in Oakland five years ago.
