Seaside in Line With Improvements

City Has Been Re-Numbered and Council Plans Further Metropolitan Aims; New Natatorium Is Feature.

Seaside, Or., June 8.—There has been considerable building activity in Seaside this spring, and the city councilmen are adding many metropolitan ideas, which will no doubt be appreciated by beach visitors. During the past few weeks, the entire city has been re-numbered, and aluminum numbers affixed to every store and dwelling in the city, so that instead of directing one to a cottage, one can now give the street and address. A short time ago the city council passed ordinances authorizing the paving of Broadway from the depot to the beach; and Seventh street, formerly Main street. Broadway will be widened for its entire length, and cement sidewalks placed on each side of the street. Buildings on each side of the street have already been moved to permit improvement. The city council also decided to employ a rock crusher, and instead of hauling the rock from outside points, the rocks will be gathered on the beach and hauled to the crusher.

The paving company having the contract has a crew and machinery on the ground ready to commence surfacing streets already paved, and immediately after the new sewer system is placed will complete the paving.

The Gilbert block, a two story cement and concrete building on the corner of Broadway and Seventh streets, is nearly completed; and the postoffice will in short time return to its old location.

The First Bank of Seaside opened for business a short time ago in a handsome new building on Broadway, near the depot.

One of the leading improvements at Seaside this season is the new Seaside natatorium at the head of Broadway, directly on the beach. The natatorium will be located in a two story building, erected by J. S. Oates. The entire building is under lease to H. L. Lehman, who will conduct the natatorium portion of the building. The building contains a swimming tank 40x80 feet, and several bath rooms for both fresh and salt water, in addition to fresh water showers.

Dan J. Moore of the Hotel Moore is making several improvements, and is having a park and garden mapped out by a landscape gardener.

W. D. Torrey is refurbishing the Hotel Torrey, formerly Locksley Hall, which opens June 15, and announces that he will maintain the same standard of service as was maintained by him at the Elk Creek hotel for several years.

All the improvements are well under way, so that Seaside will in a few days be in shape to handle the large beach crowd which will no doubt leave for the beaches soon.

Grain Operator Leaves. E. W. Miller, grain operator of Guthrie Center, Iowa, left yesterday for the east after a week's visit with his son, Glenn E. Miller, a Portland business man.
