Dismissal of Devlin No Surprise Because Unpopularity Caused Dissension.

NO CHANGE FOR PRESENT

Tyler Says It Would Not Be Fair to Announce Any New Names—Devlin Finishes Out the Week.

San Francisco, Cal., June 8.—With pitcher Tyler Christian in charge as manager, the Oakland Coast Leaguers were en route today to Portland after a disastrous week here with the Los Angeles club. The Oaks lost five and won two games.

The dismissal of Arthur Devlin as manager did not come as a surprise. It had been rumored in baseball circles for days that he was soon to be let out. The change seems to have the approval of the fans as well as the members of the Oakland team. Devlin's baseball ability was never questioned, but he was not popular and there was much dissension in the club while he was in charge.

Christian admitted before leaving for the north that he has several changes in mind but will make no announcement until he lands the players he has in view.

"There will be no changes for the present," Christian said. "I am not sure the new men can be landed, and it might interfere with our plans to give any indication now of what is to be done. It wouldn't be fair to the men at present with the team or to the new fellows we have in mind."

The owners of the club decided to make the change Saturday, but in accordance with the wishes of Devlin, he was permitted to finish out the series with Los Angeles. He was on the coaching lines in the afternoon, while Christian kept very much out of sight.
