Bloom Is Product of Three Year's Work by Priest and Was Grown in Church Yard.

Portland yesterday afternoon saw a new variety of rose and heard it named "J. A. Currey" in honor of Secretary J. A. Currey of the Rose Festival Association...

The ceremony was held in the Sixth street entrance of the Hotel Portland in the presence of a large crowd. Queen Thelma, queen of Rosaria, took the blossom from the hands of its creator...

The new blossom, the only one of its kind in the world, is the result of three years' work by the priest and was grown in the churchyard of his pastorate at Brooks. It is a cross between the Graus and the La France of the Tepitz and the sharply turned petals of the La France, magnificently shaped and provided with heavy foliage...

ture more than passing glances of the beautiful blooms. For this reason there has been some talk of making a small admission charge next year, for part of each day at least, with a view of giving rose lovers a better opportunity to see the displays.

Despite the recent adverse weather conditions, which destroyed many prospective prize-winning blossoms, the display this year is more comprehensive than that of last year. Thousands of blossoms were entered for the awards offered and yesterday the judges after a hard time of it passed upon them and selected the blooms which in their estimation were the best.

The judges divided the exhibits into two sections and worked in teams. They were J. H. Booth, of Roseburg; R. G. Gamwell, Bellingham, Wash.; W. E. Sherlock, Cornelius; Dr. E. S. Sulliger, Vancouver, Wash.; Father Schoener, of Brooks, and A. J. Clark of Portland.

Silver vases, offered by local people, made up the first prize awarded in vases and cash the second prizes. Fifty first prizes were awarded.
