Four was the largest number made in an inning, but three tallies in one session got to be very common. The second and third innings were frames in which the Computers failed to count.

McCredie used four hurlers, starting with Lefty Evans, filling in with Rieger and Martinson, and finishing up with Hanson. He even threatened to send Bill Speas, general rouabout, in to show up his regulars. But none of the bunch could find a spot where they got four hits, a sacrifice and a walk in four trips to the plate.

Jack Niss, after fanning out in his first trip off Evans, nicked the other Beavers for four blows. Middleton was the only Oak who went hitless. Evans might have gotten away all right, for he seemed to have plenty of stuff, but he walked Middleton to start with, and then failed to gather in a bun that eventually went to Kores and a fast man like Kaylor beat it out.

Zacher bunted and was safe when Evans' throw drew Rodgers off first in an effort to reach it. Middleton scored. Hettling scratched a fluke double through Kores and Kaylor, who had gone to the field.

BLANKENSHIP IS RETIRING FROM BASEBALL FIELD

Veteran Catcher Who Signed Up Walter Johnson Goes Into Business.

Salt Lake City, Utah, June 12.—Clifton T. Blankenship, manager and catcher of the Murray, Utah, club, in the Union Baseball association, is quitting the game after 12 years of activity and will make his home in Salt Lake City, where he will go into business. Jack Thornton will be playing manager in his stead.

Blankenship started in the Southern League and played with the Cincinnati Nationals, Washington Americans, and in the Pacific Coast league and California league. He has acted as manager of the Salt Lake, Missoula, Mont., and Murray teams, in the Union association, and is popular with the fans in every city in the circuit. He discovered Walter Johnson, the phenom of the Washington Americans, and "Bullet Joe" Busset with the Athletics, who won one of the games in the world series last fall. Blankenship was one of the greatest catchers ever in the game and was greatly missed by the fans in the north-west.

Jack Thornton will have active charge of the Murray team, but Dr. C. F. Harvelle, president of the Murray club, will direct the coaching of the players, and Thornton will work under his direction.

PAT EASTLEY NOT FOR SALE BUT GOOD PRICE WILL NOT BE SPURNED

Spokane Wanted Star Right-hander, but Couldn't Stand Amount, Says McCredie.

Although It Is Semi-Holiday Usual Privilege Is Extended to Fair One. Double Header at 2 O'clock Sunday.

"I told President Farr of the Spokane baseball club sometime ago that the Colts were in financial distress but wouldn't part with Pat Eastley unless the offer was so flattering that it could not be turned down," said Judge W. W. McCredie, the Portland magistrate, this morning.

The report emanated in Spokane that the Indians, who are bent on winning the Northwestern league pennant, had been kicking the Colts for some time. They dickered for and landed Lou Stanley, who has begun to win games for them.

Eastley would be a big help to Spokane and his service would go far toward giving them a pennant, but as Judge McCredie says, he is not on the market, unless the price is such that it cannot be turned down. He asserts that he has not heard from Farr recently about the star right hander.

Although this is a semi-holiday, Judge McCredie stated that the ladies' day privilege would not be withdrawn and the fair fans could crowd into the ball park to their heart's content. The crowd yesterday was the largest early weekday turnout of the season, but many fans were probably drawn to the park by the proximity of the starting place for the balloon race.

The double header Sunday afternoon between the Oaks and Beavers will start promptly at 2 o'clock. It was scheduled by President Baum to take up one of the two games lost on the 11th appearance here of the Oakland club. The other game will be played on the next trip north of the Oaks.

WHITE READY TO BOX AZEVEDO IN FRISCO IN JULY

Billy Murray Leaves for the Coast Today to Fight George Chip.

San Francisco, June 12.—Acceptance of Promoter Coffroth's offer to box 20 rounds here next month with Jose Azevedo, of Sacramento, was received here today from Charley White, the Chicago lightweight. White also announced his willingness to box Willie Ritchie here in September. The champion promised Coffroth to give him the first chance for his services in the event of beating Freddie Welsh.

White's acceptance came through his manager, Nate Lewis, and read: "White accepts terms for Azevedo match. Asks you name any date next month, but wants to know just when, so can arrange his theatrical dates. Will be in San Francisco two weeks before match. Also accept Ritchie match for September."

Coffroth also received word that Billy Murray would leave for San Francisco today, to prepare for his July 4 match with George Chip. Murray's 10 round decision over Al McCoy last night has added to his drawing powers.

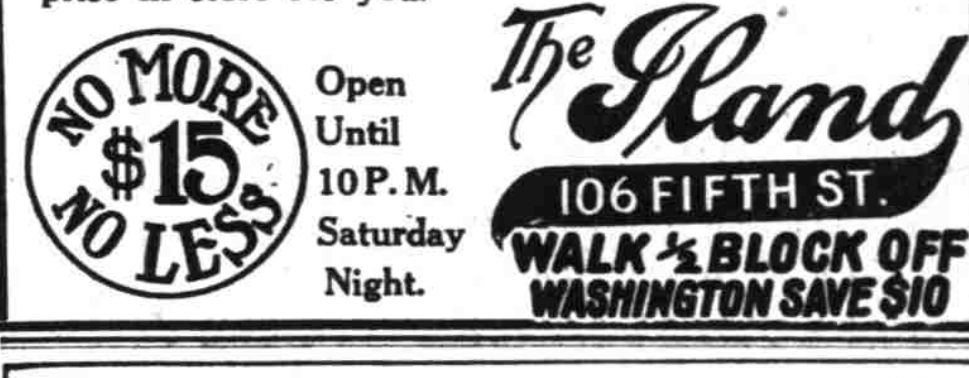
