

DOCK COMMISSION OFFERS COOPERAGE COMPANY LEASE

Low Rate Given on Condition That Plant Employ at Least 200 Men.

WOULD AID ROADWAY

Commission Willing to Assist St. Johns in Building From Drydock to Plant; Want Dredger.

If the Western Cooperage company is sincere in its promise to employ from 200 to 400 men at the new plant near the municipal drydock, the Port of Portland commission will lease the property needed near the dock at a low rate of 5 per cent on the appraised value of the land.

The commission also promised to help the city of St. Johns in building a roadway from the drydock and cooperage plant up to Willamette boulevard if plans were satisfactory and promised the Port of Astoria that they could count on the tugboats Oneonta and Walrus for fireboats in case of fire at Astoria again.
