RELIEF TRAIN BRINGS KILLED AND INJURED INTO LOS ANGELES

Santa Fe Wreck Results in Two Deaths and Fourteen Injuries to Passengers.

OPEN SWITCH IS BLAMED
Fast Running Limited Crashes Headon Into a locomotive Standing on Sliding at Bagdad.

Los Angeles, June 13. — Fourteen of the passengers, who were injured when the Santa Fe's California Limited collided with a freight train at Bagdad, Cal., 210 miles east of here, last night...

The bodies of B. M. Cram of Los Angeles and Charles Belden of San Francisco, who were killed, were taken to a special train and taken to Santa Fe hospital.
