Assert That Wealthy Lawyer, Clubman and Yachtsman Could Clear Up the Affair.

Line Will Lose Much Tax Money

Attorney General Says Oregon & California Grant Lands Cannot Be Listed Until Litigation Has Been Settled.
Eugene, Or., June 12.—Lana county will lose at least \$150,000 and possibly more tax money in two years on account of a ruling just made by Attorney General A. M. Crawford. He has sent an opinion to B. F. Keeney, assessor of this county, that the Oregon & California grant lands cannot be listed for assessment until the suit to recover the land to the government is settled in the United States supreme court.

Falls City, Or., June 12.—Roy and Floyd Hillegas were arrested Tuesday three miles east of the city, charged with burglary and larceny. Hood River, Or., June 12.—Alex Bonaducci, who was arrested for attempting to kill Giuseppe Gregorio, and who fired one shot from his revolver, barely missing the complainant, was given a hearing before Judge A. C. Buck yesterday and bound over to appear before the grand jury under \$500 bonds. A. L. Mulvaney, who was charged with supplying two girls with liquor, pleaded guilty to the charge and will await the session of the circuit court in July, when Judge W. L. Bradshaw will pass sentence.

Merchants May Reorganize.

Albany, Or., June 12.—The Albany Retail Merchants' association are considering reorganizing into a county association, which will probably be known as the Linn County Credit association. The purpose of the association is to reorganize and cooperation among the merchants, the establishment of certain rules governing the credit business and for the adoption of a credit rating guide.

Fishing Industry Is Hurt by Seals

People at Mouth of Umpqua River Plan Campaign to Exterminate Them—Improvements Drive Them Away.
Roseburg, Or., June 12.—Seals are proving so destructive to the fishing industry at the mouth of the Umpqua river that the Oregon sealers are determined to rid the river of them, and have raised \$150 to be spent in such an endeavor. Both dynamite and sturgeon hooks will be used in the campaign, and a large number of salmon and prevent others from entering at all.
Since improvements are going on at the mouths of other rivers and harbors where the seals used to congregate, they are now gathered in large numbers at the mouth of the Umpqua, where they are not disturbed.

More Troops Have Been Authorized

Lieutenant Hennessey Will Assist in Organization of Additional Cavalry in Oregon to Meet War Dept. Plan.
Salem, Or., June 12.—Lieutenant Peter Hennessey, detailed by the war department as instructor of the O. A. C. cadets, has been ordered by the department to assist in the organization of additional cavalry troops in Oregon to meet the war plan of the government, according to an announcement made by Governor West today.
The nation is divided into military zones, and the governor explained that the small number of cavalry troops is out of proportion to the number of infantry, and that the war department is having the number of cavalry troops increased. The governor announced that he would tender Lieutenant Hennessey a commission to head the cavalry organization when it is completed.
