

OPINIONS DIFFER ON USE OF GILLNETS AT MOUTH OF COLUMBIA

Chamber of Commerce Opposes Any Attempt on Part of Fishers to Use Channel.

FISH INTERESTS OBJECT

Requirements of Commerce Paramount to Those of Fishermen, Says Portland Commercial Organisation.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)—Washington, June 17.—Correspondence, by wire as well as mail, indicate to the senators and representatives from Oregon that there is no unanimity of sentiment in Oregon over the use of gillnets in the lower channel of the Columbia, or the prohibition of their use by the war department. While the fishing interests have filed voluminous protests against the action of the war department in declaring that fishermen must keep out of the channels of the Columbia, the Portland Chamber of Commerce has telegraphed to Senator Chamberlain that it does not hold with these protests and that it considers the requirements of commerce paramount to the interests of the fishermen and canneries. That the attitude of the chamber may be understood, the telegram referred to is herewith given in its entirety.

"Portland, June 2, 1914.—Honorable George E. Chamberlain: We regret that questions have arisen on account of a circular issued by the war department prohibiting gillnet fishing in the ship channel at the mouth of the Columbia river. We understand from good authority complaints against the rule are only from some small operators who have caused much trouble to shipping by refusing to move after setting their nets fairly in the channel. All interests on the Columbia river between Portland and the mouth of the Columbia river and many of the most important fish operators are heartily in accord with the ruling made. The supreme requirement is unobstructed navigation out of the river. Owing to the necessity of big ships having a suitable draft, delay from nets in the channel at the mouth must not be tolerated. One steamer has just been delayed 12 hours in entering the pilot claim. It was not an accident. The nets in the channel. We are advised a small auxiliary schooner went around a few days ago trying to avoid the nets. Millions have been spent and we have struggled for years to get a safe channel to the sea, and the odds have been heavily against us, so we cannot countenance delays and dangers from the presence of nets in the channel at the mouth. We earnestly urge that the ruling referred to be allowed to remain in effect.

Protests Against Re-Checking Vote

Columbia County Clerk Objects to Expenses Incident to Effort to Determine Judgments Winner.

Salem, Or., June 17.—County Clerk H. E. Labaree of Columbia county protests against going to the expense of \$750, which he says it will cost, to have the county canvassing board make an official canvass of the vote for Judge McNary and Judge Benson, candidates for the Republican nomination for supreme court judge. His protest is contained in a letter to Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott. He says District Attorney Dillard has rechecked the vote and found the first official canvass to be correct. Secretary Olcott today saying he had rechecked the vote on these two candidates and asked if it was necessary to call in the canvassing board. Secretary Olcott has sent official blanks to all the county clerks for a canvass of the vote on supreme court candidates in place of the first abstracts received.

No Change in Union.
La Grande, Or., June 17.—Recheck of the Benson-McNary vote in Union county made no changes in the original count. McNary got 318; Benson, 496.

Salem Cherrians Plan Big Things

Water Pageant Each Night Will Be Feature of Annual Celebration—Baseball Tournament Also.

Salem, Or., June 17.—A water pageant each night of the annual cherry fair is to be a new feature of Salem's annual celebration, which will be held June 25 to 27 inclusive. J. D. Turner, chairman of the sports committee, outlined his plans at a meeting of the chairman of all the committees of the fair last night. There will be a water parade, motor boat races, single and double canoe races, top rolling and canoe punting, and toboggan surf riding. It was announced that there would be a baseball tournament during the fair between teams from Dallas, Hope, Well, St. Paul and Stayton. There will be motorcycle races conducted under the auspices of the Salem Motor club. The feature for the closing night will be a historical pageant, illustrating the development of Oregon from the days of the Indians and the first settlers down to the present.

Von Klein Starts For Salem Today

Man Sentenced to One to Four Years in Penitentiary Waives Further Objections.

E. E. C. Von Klein will be taken to Salem this afternoon to commence serving his sentence of one to four years in the penitentiary if plans of Sheriff Word are not changed. Sheriff Word said that Von Klein has waived all objection to going and does not care to await the return of the mandate. Von Klein was convicted last fall of polygamy on the charge of marrying Ethel Newcomb in San Francisco two years ago while he was married to Louise Histrup Von Klein of Minneapolis. He was tried twice on charge of stealing \$2500 worth of jewelry from Miss Newcomb and each jury disagreed. The supreme court yesterday upheld the conviction on the polygamy charge.

Attempt Is Made to Burn Old Barn

Structure at 505 Albina Avenue Saved From Flames for Fifth Time Since June 2.

For the fifth time since June 2 an unoccupied barn at 505 Albina avenue caught fire at noon today. So persistent have apparent efforts been to burn the structure that families living next door have moved away, fearing that the barn would ultimately burn and destroy their homes with it.

The barn belongs to Mrs. Anna Herrall, 821 Flood street, and has been occupied for some time and the police have been watching it in an effort to catch parties who they believe have been trying to burn the structure. Yesterday a bottle of kerosene was found in the structure while kerosene was also evident at the blaze this morning. Engine company No. 8 extinguished the blaze after small damage.

Mexican Congress Hurriedly Convenes

Bill Designed to Promote Country's Sacrificed Said to Be Ready for Consideration at Mexico City.

(United Press Leased Wire.)—Mexico City, June 17.—The Mexican congress was convened hurriedly in extra session here today. It was understood matters of the highest importance were scheduled for consideration. That the foreign and interior departments have had framed a bill to be submitted to the lawmakers immediately was known definitely. Its provisions cannot be learned, however. The impression was that it was designed to promote the country's pacification.

Mediation Fails or Succeeds Friday

Differences Between American and Mexican Envoys Today Seem to Be Almost Irreconcilable to Onlookers.

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 17.—Either there will be an agreement here today or a provisional successor to President Huerta or mediation negotiations will cease. It was understood this afternoon that there will be a conference on that date at which the "A. B. C." mediators and both American and Mexican envoys will be present. So far as today was concerned the differences between the Americans and Mexicans seemed irreconcilable.

Says Road Controls Four Parallel Lines

Springfield, Ill., June 17.—The charge that the New York Central railroad controls the four parallel lines connecting Chicago and New York—and the Lake Shore, the Nickel Plate, the Big Four, and the Michigan Central—was made before the Illinois public utilities commission in an objection filed against the proposed merger of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern with the New York Central.

Heads School of Mines.
Reno, Nev., June 17.—The regents of the University of Nevada announced today that T. M. Lincoln of New York had been selected as the new head of the Mackay school of mines to succeed George J. Young, who went to the University of Minnesota a year ago. D. B. Huntley of San Francisco has served as president during the interim. President Lincoln is a graduate of the Columbia school of mines and of the University of Illinois.

Baby Is Drowned.
Moody, June 17.—Phillip, the 15-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Minker of Moody, Or., was drowned in the Deschutes river Wednesday evening. The little one slipped out of his mother's sight for a moment and fell into the water. The body was recovered in the river near his home next morning at 9 o'clock.

No Meeting Tonight.
Vancouver, Wash., June 17.—Although this is the regular meeting night for the Commercial club, no meeting will be held, the warm weather of the past few days making it hard to get an attendance sufficiently large to warrant a meeting. There are no matters of any great importance to be discussed and the members will meet until the first meeting next month.

Men Serve Dinner.
Vancouver, Wash., June 17.—The first of a series of get-together meetings was held last evening at the Minnehaha Grange hall, when the men of the grange served a chicken dinner. A good number of Vancouver people were in attendance and all pronounced the "eat" first class, thereby upsetting the theory that men cannot "shine" at cooking.

TENTACLES OF VICE FIND WAY TO MANY HOMES OF WEALTHY

Speaker Says Girls in Socially Prominent Circle Are Among Victims.

CLUB WOMEN CONCERNED

Women's Federation Electing National Officers; Liquor Traffic Is Condemned at Chicago Session.

(United Press Leased Wire.)—Chicago, June 17.—The closing sessions of the twelfth biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs which has been in progress here for more than a week, were scheduled for today. Announcement of the result of the balloting for national officers, which began yesterday, was expected at noon. It was generally admitted that the state headed by Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker of Texas, president of the federation, had been elected.

There was no abatement of interest in the sessions of the convention and the auditorium, where the main sessions are held, was jammed with delegates and spectators.

While no final figures were given, it was announced shortly after noon that scarcely any opposition to the nominating committee's slate had developed.

Mrs. Pennybacker Leading.
As far as the count had proceeded, it was stated, Mrs. Pennybacker had 1100 votes. A score of other candidates for president received a scattering vote. Among the latter was Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, but the vote for the wife of the chief executive was declared illegal because she had not been nominated.

The convention adopted a resolution condemning the liquor traffic and declaring the federation's support of all federal and state legislation which tends to eradicate it. The resolution was presented by the Kentucky delegation and read in part:

"Resolved, That the women of this federation hereby place themselves on record as opposed to the liquor traffic, and in support of all federal and state laws as tend to eradicate this evil."

Club Women Warned.
Delegates were much aroused over the statement made by George Kneeland, the New York vice investigator, in an address before the gathering Tuesday, to the effect that he had a list of 500 girls belonging to rich and socially prominent families who were secretly practicing immorality.

"Yesterday was the first time I ever discussed this subject publicly," said Kneeland. "One woman's club refused me permission to tell its members the truth."

"But I warn you club women to look out for your own daughters and the daughters of the other respectable women in your cities. The girls on my list are not weak minded or subnormal, either. Most of them go wrong from a spirit of rebellion against the rules of strictness of their home life. They generally turn to strangers. They seem innocent on a casual acquaintance but in the close personal contact of the dances they lose control of themselves."

"I sent an inspector to my home town in Massachusetts and he found a number of girls of 15 or 16, apparently respectable, who really were leading lives of vice."

Litigation May Delay Improvement

Harbor Work at Mouth of Tillamook Bay Threatened by Injunction; Real Estate Man Is Stumbling Block.

Tillamook, Or., June 17.—Harbor improvements at the mouth of Tillamook bay may be delayed by reason of suit filed here yesterday against Giesbach & Joplin, the contractors engaged in the work. W. G. Dwight, a local real estate man, is the plaintiff. Dwight seeks to have the contractors enjoined from using a quarry which they opened and also asks damages for injuries done to the property upon which the quarry is situated. He claims to own a half interest in the land.

Giesbach & Joplin have been operating under a permit given by G. W. Kiger, who owns a half interest in the land. Dwight asserts that the property has been damaged to the extent of \$7500 by the work done.

CAPTIVE BALLOON IS CUT LOOSE FOR NICE LITTLE "JOY RIDE"

Captain Ed Unger Starts on Trip With Two Passengers as Companions.

Braving the uncertainties of the same region that so nearly proved the undoing for four ballooning parties, Captain Ed Unger at 1:57 p. m. today cut loose his balloon California for a "joyride" in the heavens. In the basket with him were two passengers, H. V. Kaddery and Phillip Thiel, both Portland men who have made flights before.

"There's no prize to this ride—nothing like \$3000," said Unger to the crowd that gathered around Third and Clay streets just before he gave the signal to let go. "We're just going for the fun of it. I wasn't going to be cheated out of a balloon ride even if I didn't get into the Rose Festival race."

Then more sand bags were taken off, and the big bubble floated upward, swerving first a little toward the south and, when the current from off the building tops took it, diagonally toward the east.

At 2 o'clock it had reached an altitude of probably 500 feet, and was being wafted southeast.

"I'll soon qualify to be a pilot," said Thiel as he climbed into the basket. "This will be my third ride. I went up twice before some years ago in Wisconsin. We have provisions for several days and will have some fun."

Kaddery was not apprehensive, in spite of the experience of the other balloonists. "We'll be back," he said. "If we don't get back, we'll write."

Unger said there is no plan in his mind to continue the course of the balloon. He isn't courting disaster, he said, but is willing to take a chance.

Accused of Trying To Defraud Store

A Well Dressed and Good Looking Woman Arrested by Lipman-Wolfe & Company Detectives.

Detectives at the Lipman, Wolfe & Co. store yesterday detained Marie Greenwood, a good looking, well dressed woman of 27 years, until Deputy Constables Drugot and McCullough arrived to arrest her on a charge of impersonating Mrs. F. P. Russell to secure goods valued at \$25.

The woman is said to have looked up people with accounts at the store and then made use of her knowledge to charge costly purchases to their accounts. She is held in the county jail pending a hearing in the district court.

U. S. Ship to the Rescue.

United Press Correspondent With the Pacific Fleet.

U. S. S. Yorktown, June 17.—(By Wireless to San Diego, Cal.)—It was learned today that the rebel gunboat Tampico was sunk in its fight with the federal warship Guerrero yesterday. Captain Malpica of the Tampico and his chief engineer committed suicide. The Tampico's crew of 100 men were rescued by the U. S. S. New Orleans. Malpica deserted from the federal forces three months ago, taking the boat with him. The destruction of the vessel leaves the federalists in control of the Pacific.

Twenty Killed and Wounded.

Washington, June 17.—Official figures received this afternoon from Admiral Hildesheim placed the number of casualties in the fight between the federal gunboat Guerrero and the rebel gunboat Tampico at Topolobampo at 10 killed and 10 wounded.

DEATH OF M'KAY NOW BEING INVESTIGATED BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Statements of Spectators Who Saw Fatal Accident at Speedway Are Taken.

BOY ORDERED FROM PITS

Witness Declares Young Man Had Been Warned Twice, Once by Deputy Sheriff.

Investigation of the accident last Sunday at the automobile race which cost the life of Walter McKay, 17 years old, was begun this morning by District Attorney Evans. Statements of eight spectators and officials were taken and the general opinion from the statements seems to be that young McKay should not have been in the pits where the accident occurred.

Driver H. P. Deebach, whose failure to control his car brought on the accident, is said to be in Tacoma preparing for races there. A subpoena was issued for him and he will probably be required to return to give a statement.

Signal Was Given.
Frank E. Watkins and J. E. Appleby, timers, told Deputy District Attorney Pierce that Deebach's mechanic gave the signal that the car would enter the pits as it turned the curve toward the judges' stand and said that they should have warned him to the pit to all there.

Appleby, Watkins, H. L. Keats, representatives of the A. A. A. and W. S. Dunning, an automobile dealer, all said that the car entered the pit at a speed between 15 and 20 miles an hour, that the brakes were locked and that the engine was dead. They said that the rear wheels skidded on the grass and turned the rear into the fence, from which the car seemed to rebound before it crashed into the car standing in the pit.

Watkins said that young McKay had been put out of the pits twice before the accident, once by Deputy Sheriff Beckman, and said that orders were given that no one should be allowed in the pits who did not wear an official badge. Keats said he could see no criminal negligence on the part of anyone.

Did Not Realize Speed.
The opinion of the majority was that Deebach, who was completing a long race in which he had been traveling at a mile a minute rate, lost the sense of speed proportion and did not realize the speed at which he was traveling when he entered the pits. The opinion was that at a greater speed he could not have entered the pits.

John E. Cronan, a broker, C. L. Boss and E. L. Sulitor of C. L. Boss & Co. said that they were sitting in the grandstand across the track from the scene of the accident. Deebach, they said, was traveling at a reasonable speed and as he turned into the pits was given the signal that but four laps remained of the race. They all testified that they heard his engines start up after Deebach turned in, showing that he had decided to continue the race without the repairs for which he turned into the pit.

A crowd had blocked the other entrance from the track to the pits, according to their story, and Deebach apparently decided to run down the automobile standing in the pits that he might save the people who blocked his way. Andy Walmborg, sitting in an automobile near the car that was struck, said that Deebach seemed to be dodging the crowd, but that he was skidding on the grass and his engine stopped. Deebach's car was struck and the oncoming racer, to be caught between them as they struck.

Subenas are out for other officials and spectators and the examination of these will be continued this afternoon.

Clerk Coffey Has Started Recount

Republican Election Returns to Be Gone Over for Benefit of Benson and McNary.

The recount of election returns for the Republican nomination for judge of the supreme court to determine the winner between Henry L. Benson of Klamath Falls and C. L. McNary of Salem began in Multnomah county this afternoon.

County Clerk Coffey began the recount on notification from Secretary of State Olcott that a recount will be made throughout the state. Judge Benson's claim of nomination by 54 votes on a mistake discovered in this county, and Judge McNary disputes this claim, saying he has won the nomination by a narrow majority.

Portland's Milk Is Given Compliment

Federal Official Makes Examination and Results Will Be Known in a Few Days.

Portland's milk supply is very good and the milk is equal to the best in the country, according to F. H. Bothell, in charge of the western dairy investigation work for the United States department of agriculture. Mr. Bothell has been conducting a milk contest here under the direction of the health department and has just finished his work.

"The results of the contest will be made public in a few days and will show the bacterial count and chemical analysis of milk coming to this city."

"In many cities," said Mr. Bothell this morning, "and I believe Portland is one of them, many people hold the opinion that milk is unfit for use. This impression has been formed by gross exaggerations made by parties not qualified to judge conditions."

"When people have a milk supply such as Portland's, they are not in any occasion for discriminating against milk."

"The results of the contest show that the milk of Portland stands well up in the rank of city milk supplies. The contest is a fair index to what the dairymen are daily doing. All of the pasteurizing and raw milk depots are in excellent condition."

"I wish to compliment Dr. D. W. Mack of the city's milk division on the showing which has been made."

Suffragette Chains Herself to Statue

Police Cut Bonds of Woman Who Had Started to Make Speech in Crowded Part of London.

London, June 17.—A woman chained herself to the Duke of Wellington's statue in front of the Royal Exchange, in the most crowded part of London, today and started to make a suffragette speech. The police cut the chain and removed her, but not until traffic for blocks in every direction was so hopelessly jammed that it took an hour to restore order.

Albanian King Victorious.

Durazzo, Albania, June 17.—The rebels who were attacking this place to overthrow William of Wied, Albania's new king, were in retreat today. Thus far William and his supporters have made good the capital's defense, but a fresh rebel attack was thought likely.
