

ORANGES LEADING IN IMPORTS OF FRUITS OF UNITED STATES

Apples and Bananas Follow Closely, According to British Statistics.

POTATO VEGETABLE KING

Tubers Valued at About \$11,000,000, Annually Are Sent to the Great Britain Markets.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)—While British statistics do not reveal the proportion of imports of fruits and vegetables from the United States, it is of great interest to our growers to learn from the consular reports that raw fruits and vegetables to the value of more than \$75,000,000 are imported into Great Britain annually.

Oranges lead, followed closely by apples and bananas. Among vegetables potatoes rank first, tomatoes being second and onions third in importance. Some of the items and their value are given as follows: Apples, \$10,854,004; oranges, \$12,993,644; bananas, \$10,573,384; lemons, \$2,322,400; grapes, \$3,603,852; almonds, \$4,322,124; other nuts used as fruit, \$4,350,004; pears, \$3,182,232; plums, \$2,128,198; apricots and peaches, \$14,951; cherries, \$599,699; currants, \$717,356; other fruits about \$1,739,390.

Potatoes in Lead.—Imports of vegetables were valued—all of these figures being for 1913—at \$26,721,032. Onions were valued at \$5,037,085, tomatoes at \$6,563,361 and potatoes at about \$11,000,000.

Official American statistics show that the United States sent to the United Kingdom apples valued at \$4,253,134, and oranges valued at \$1,285,288. The orange exports showed a falling off as compared with both previous years, while apples showed a fair increase. In 1912 the exports of oranges were 25,063 boxes, valued at \$90,812, and in 1911 22,078 boxes valued at \$85,045. The exportation of vegetables from this country is not large.

London, of course, holds the bulk of this trade. Detailed figures for last year are not available, but in 1912 there were imported at London 1,183,949 hundredweight of apples, valued at \$4,158,483; 742,607 bunches of bananas, worth \$1,412,003; 494,688 hundredweight of currants, \$2,195,305; 218,593 hundredweight of grapes, \$980,941; 109,220 hundredweight of almonds, \$2,522,380; 22,420 hundredweight of other nuts used as fruit, \$1,728,751; 1,668,745 hundredweight of oranges, \$3,621,497; 1,678,432 hundredweight of pears, \$3,182,232; 1,192,380 hundredweight of potatoes, \$1,329,270; and 572,956 hundredweight of tomatoes, \$1,894,387.

Australia Sends Apples.—In this connection, a brief article appearing in a recent issue of the London Times is of interest:

At Covent Garden during the past week (first week in May) there has been a fair supply of Australian and Tasmanian apples, though the fact that it has been on rather a small scale has brought about something of a rise in price. The quality, however, is showing a decided improvement, since the better class varieties of this popular fruit are now being imported. The Medina discharged at the week-end 30,000 bushel cases, the shipment constituting the supply for the whole kingdom. Although this may appear a large supply of apples for one week, it is nothing in comparison with the quantities which reach Great Britain during the winter months from the American continent. In the absence of apples from any other quarter than the Australian commonwealth at this time of the year, increased prices must be looked for, but at Covent Garden there is no expectation that the cost will go beyond a point which the average consumer can afford to pay.

There has been an abundant supply of Cape fruit, especially of grapes. Unfortunately from the point of view of the seller, the fruit has ripened during the voyage, which, while it has improved the eating quality, has caused a great quantity to arrive somewhat out of condition. But what is a loss to the seller is a gain to the public, and the result is that one can obtain grapes of a quality and at a price which rarely fall to his lot at this time of the year.

Vegetables Coming In.—Of pears, Australia and Tasmania have sent a fair supply, and there is no doubt that in a few years' time more varieties will be grown which are capable of standing transportation. Belgian hothouse grapes of a peculiarly fine quality are now entering Covent Garden, and so are a few cherries from Portugal. In about a day's time French cherries will make their appearance in this country, and, according to a reliable source, the crop promises to be very abundant.

Covent Garden is now busy with spring vegetables, in which, for some time to come, potatoes will form an important element. Spain, a new district for the production of this class of vegetables, is entering the field with excellent supplies, and immense quantities are being sent from Barcelona. It is expected that within the next fortnight there will be landed at the docks 30,000 hamper of new kidney potatoes (a hamper holds 56 to 80 pounds). In addition, Lisbon is this year growing a big crop, one steamer bringing 30,000 boxes of round potatoes for London alone. Kidney potatoes find a ready sale at 4 cents a pound, and the average price of the round potatoes is 3 cents. In about a day's time vegetables of all kinds have been very plentiful in the past week, and the only question is whether, if the temperature keeps as low as it has been for the last few days, the supply will continue on quite as large a scale. To speak generally, the prospects for home-grown fruit and vegetables are most promising, but it remains to be seen what effect the cold weather, should it continue, will have on the season's output.

Lake Water Released.

Eugene, Or., June 18.—The water in Waldo lake, a body of water at the summit of the Cascade mountains 100 miles east of Eugene, has been lowered five feet during the past two weeks by letting the water flow through one of the headgates. It has been there during the past two or three years by the Waldo Lake Irrigation & Power company. A tunnel 700 feet long and 9 by 10 feet has been built through the solid rock. This will be the main outlet of the lake. The waters will flow into the north fork of Salmon creek and then into the Willamette river. The reason for letting some of the water out of the lake at this time is to facilitate the work on the headgates below the regular water level.

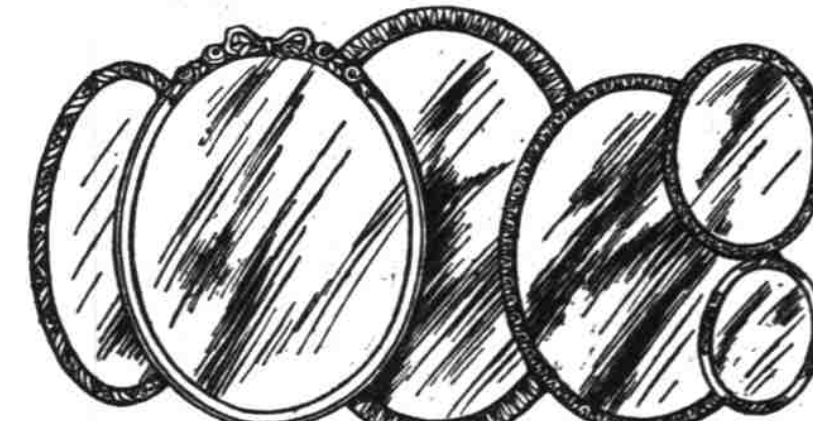
