CHERRY RECIPES

Cherries are at their height, the season is short, and for those who like them now is the time to have pies and other prepared desserts. Following are a few good recipes:

Cherry Dumplings.
1 cupful flour.
1 teaspoonful baking powder.
1/2 teaspoonful salt.
1/2 cupful cherries.
1 cupful sugar.
2 teaspoonfuls butter.
1 tablespoonful milk.
1 teaspoonful lard.

Sift the flour, salt and baking powder into a bowl, rub the lard very lightly; add just enough cold water to hold together and roll out to 1-8 inch thick, cut into four parts, divide the cherries and sugar into four and put one-fourth on each piece of dough; wet the edges with cold water, shape with the hands and press the edges firmly together; put into buttered bakeware, brush the top with milk, sprinkle with a little sugar and put the remainder of the butter in small pieces on the top.

Bake in moderate oven 20 minutes covered and 20 minutes uncovered. When removing the cover, you can add 1 cupful of milk to the dumplings if desired. Serve with sauce or milk as desired.

Cherry Moly Ploy.
1 cupful flour.
1 teaspoonful baking powder.
1/2 teaspoonful salt.
1/2 cupful cherries.
1 cupful sugar.
2 teaspoonfuls butter.
1 teaspoonful milk.

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl, rub in the lard very lightly and add just enough cold water to hold together; roll out to 1-8 inch thick, cover with cherries and sugar; save 1 tablespoonful sugar to sprinkle on top; roll like jelly roll and put into buttered pudding pan, brush the top with milk, sprinkle with sugar, and put the butter that is left in small pieces on the top.

Bake in moderate oven 20 minutes covered and 20 minutes uncovered. When removing the cover you can add 1 cupful milk if desired. This makes four large portions.

Cherry Salad.
Cherry salad is very nice when you use ox heart and black Spanish cherries.

1 cupful ox heart cherries.
1 cupful black Spanish cherries.
1/2 cupful marshmallows or blanched almonds.
French dressing.
Lettuce leaves.

Wash and stew the cherries, with a small pointed knife remove the stone and insert a small piece of marshmallow or blanched almond. Put into ice cold place until ready to serve. Line salad bowl with lettuce leaves, lay the cherries in first, then the almonds, the ox heart, and serve with French dressing.

Serving the cherries prepared in this way with whipped cream makes a very nice dessert.

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Plan to Extend Sane Movement

Portland Association Credit Men Cooperates With National Fire Protection Association to Prevent Casualties.

In an effort to extend the sane Fourth movement throughout Oregon, the Portland Association of Credit Men is cooperating with the National Fire Protection Association.

Recently a bulletin issued by the national board of directors urging the enforcement of a rational celebration of Independence day, and giving a table showing the casualties that have resulted for the last 10 years as a direct result of an orgy of fire and noise.

Since 1903 when the sane Fourth idea was broached, the number of victims of Independence day celebrations has steadily decreased owing to activity to prevent use of dangerous noise making and fire producing fireworks.

In 1903, the table shows that 456 were killed and 3393 injured. In 1913, the death list totaled only 32, and the injured 1151.

While Portland has a strict fireworks ordinance, there are many cities within the state that have not, and the Portland association is now endeavoring to get the police to take action to prevent injuries and fires.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 20.—Alleged to have kept a card index of houses that might be robbed, Roy Heart, 36, is under arrest today. In addition to his card index system, the police say he found a quantity of loot in his room.

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MOUNT RAINIER TOLD OF IN CIRCULAR JUST ISSUED AT CAPITAL

Department of Interior Publishes Booklet on Beauties of Washington's Park.

(Special to The Journal.)
Washington, June 20.—Methods of seeing the wonderful ice fields of Mount Rainier National Park are given in a circular on that reservation just issued by direction of Secretary Lane. This park is situated in Western Washington, about 56 miles southeast of the city of Tacoma. It has an area of 297,550 acres and comprises Mount Rainier and all the approaches, including one of the largest glacier systems in the world, radiating from any single peak.

Surrounding the mountain are beautiful forests of fir and cedar, and in the natural parks below the snow line are luxuriant fields of wild flowers of all colors and descriptions. The lower altitudes of the park are densely timbered with fir, cedar, hemlock, maple, alder, cottonwood and spruce. The forested areas, extending to an altitude of about 5500 feet, gradually decrease in density of growth after an altitude of 4000 feet is reached, and the high, broad plateaus between the glacial canyons present incomparable scenes of diversified beauties, seemingly arranged to suit every taste. These "parkas," as they are called, are studied here and there with lakes and streams bordered with clumps of pine.

The general elevation of the glacial valleys at the boundary lines of the park is about 2000 feet above sea level. These valleys afford a comparatively easy grade to the lower ends or "anous" of the various glaciers—approximately an average additional elevation of 2000 feet. At these glacier snouts the real alpine nature of Mount Rainier National Park territory is thrust upon the traveler, and from, over, around and alongside the glaciers trails have been constructed with a view of making the wonders of nature within the park easily accessible as well as to provide patrol routes for the protection of the forests and game. These trails lead to the camps or parks known as Paradise Valley, Henry's Hunting Ground, Van Trump Park, Cowitz Park, Ohanapecosh river and its hot springs, Summerland, Grand Park, Moraine Park, Elysian Fields, Spray Park, Natural Bridge, Cataract Basin, St. Andrew's Park, Glacier Basin, etc. In addition to the rules and regulations, the circular contains lists of books and magazine articles for the benefit of those desiring more detailed information.
