

**KELLY CLAN TO HOLD ANNUAL REUNION IN PORTLAND, JUNE 27**

One Hundred Members Expected Out of Total of 350 of the Family Tree.

**HISTORY WILL BE READ**

Big Dinner One Feature of Gathering of Descendants of Four Original Kelly Pioneers of 1848.

The Kelly clansmen are gathering in Portland again for their 16th annual reunion, which will be held at the old homestead of James G. Kelly, on the Section Line road, near Kelly Butte, Saturday, June 27.

One hundred members of the clan are expected to be in attendance at the gathering this year. The clan is composed of about 350 persons, consisting of men, women and children residing in the states of Oregon, Washington and California. Infants in arms and venerable pioneers will be seen at the reunion, and the historian of the clan, Miss Nellie Fawcett, will read from the pages of the past the deeds and incidents of family life that have become part and parcel of the worthy descendants of the original four Kelly trail blazers—Clinton Kelly, Albert Kelly, Gilmore Kelly and Thomas Kelly. These progenitors have departed this life, but their family tree is still very much alive, and its branches are continually replenished with the young buds of the new generation.

**Record Is Kept**  
Business of keeping tabs on the doings of the Kelly Clan has become so arduous a task that it is necessary for designated certain members to jot down a complete record of the happenings as they occur. Last year's program, marriages, deaths, births and graduations are noted each year. If it were necessary the secretary, Agnes Kelly, of Portland, could tell in a moment just how many able-bodied men there are among the Kellys on whom Uncle Sam could depend in war time.

Numbers of the professions are represented. If the Kelly Clan should so desire, it could form a cooperative colony whose members, supplied as they are with diversified talents, could amply supply the needs of all without calling upon outside experts. There are doctors, lawyers, ministers, school teachers, literary exponents, politicians, mechanics, an artist, good cooks and last but not least farmers.

History of the Kelly Clan records that the four original Kellys crossed the plains and settled in Oregon in 1848. These doughty men and their families were present when the foundation stones of the commonwealth of this state were laid. Clinton Kelly donated the ground on which the Clinton Kelly public school now stands.

Penumbra Kelly of Portland, chief of the clan, carries off the honors of being the oldest member of the organization. During the past year three members have passed on. They are Mrs. Margaret E. Kelly, wife of the late William Kelly; Dr. O. P. S. Plummer and Mrs. Rebecca Fawcett, of Portland.

The reunion will be in the nature of an old-fashioned good time. The fun will commence at 1 p. m., and a monster dinner will be served at 5 o'clock in the evening. The entertainment features will include instrumental and vocal selections and recitations.

Mrs. A. B. Manley, 663 Williams avenue, is chairman of the committee on arrangements, and her assistants are Mrs. O. P. S. Plummer and Mrs. Emily Shaver.

**Guardsman Charged With Embezzlement**

Michael Schuh Accused of Appropriating Government Overcoat and Cap; First Arrest of Kind in State.

Charged with the embezzlement of government property in the appropriation of an army overcoat and cap, Michael Schuh, quartermaster sergeant of Company F, Third Oregon infantry, was arrested yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal Leonard Becker. This is the first arrest for this kind of an offense ever made in Oregon, although a good many arrests have been given by the government to the militia is said to have mysteriously disappeared from the Armory lately. Schuh lives at 511 North Twenty-fifth street.

James G. Lee, a farmer near Hillsboro, was also arrested at his home for receiving stolen property. According to a statement made by Schuh to officers of the militia and Assistant United States Attorney E. A. Johnson, he said he had been employed by Lee, and that the latter, expressing a desire to have an army overcoat, gave Schuh the money to come to Portland to get it for him. Later, it is stated, militia officers went to Lee's farm and found a quantity of other government army property.

Following his statement to the United States attorney's office a few days ago, Schuh is said to have attempted to enlist in the United States marine corps, but on account of the suspicion in connection with the present affair it is said he was rejected.

**Chinese Boy Will Be County Ward**

Parents Unable to Agree Throw Burden on Child and James Chee Will Stay at Fraser Home.

James Chee, 12 years old, will become a member of the county's family at the Fraser Home as the result of trouble between his father, Dong Chee, and his mother, Mrs. S. S. Chee. Judge Gatens ordered that the little Chinese lad be held there until an investigation can be made into the family affairs.

Chee alleged that his wife was immoral. The father offered to pay the expenses of keeping him in some home if taken from the home. When away from his parents the boy is made to suffer by their hatred for each other, as the father tells him not to eat what the mother gives him for fear of poison, and the mother informs him that the father will surely poison his food. Mrs. Chee was satisfied that the boy should go to the home, but demanded that two elderly Chinese women, with the father, be kept from the home while the boy is there. The boy seemed to be the only one who felt bad, and he rubbed his tearful eyes as he left the courtroom.
