MANUFACTURERS AND
LAND PRODUCTS SHOW
TO BE HELD IN FALL

Definite Action Is Taken for
Holding Big Event and Of-
ficials Are Chosen.

ARMORY NOW SECURED

Big Building Will Be Surrounded by
Temporary Structures Giving
Large Exhibition Area.

A comprehensive exhibition of the products of the land and factories under the official name "The Manufacturers and Land Products Show of Portland, Oregon," will be held in this city from Monday, October 26 to Saturday, November 14, 1914. This was brought about through the definite action of a committee of five men representing the directors of the Manufacturers' Association of Oregon, and the Pacific Northwest and Products Association Friday at the meeting held in the Commercial club. At a previous meeting held several days ago, by the joint directors of these two organizations, the following committee of management was selected: For the Manufacturers' Association of Oregon, Colonel David M. Dunne, Henry Connor, A. J. Kingsley, A. M. Harradon, A. E. Gantenbein, P. Feldman, A. C. Black, O. E. Helms, R. B. Bain, W. F. McKibben, W. H. McMonies, T. S. Mann. For the Pacific Northwest and Products Association, the following directors: John S. Beall, Wilfred Jones, W. J. Hoffmann, Francis Sealy, William McMurray, E. L. Thompson, W. B. Conant, P. Bateham, J. Fred Larson, E. D. Timms, W. D. Skinner, H. J. Oppenheim, R. W. Hild and Julius Meier. These, in turn, at a subsequent meeting, selected the following men to serve the big board as an executive committee with full power to transact all the business of the forthcoming show.

"Show" in Every Sense. The men entrusted with the handling of this exhibition decided that it would be up to date to call it a "show." This is what they propose to make it, a showing of the products of the factories, farms, fields, orchards and even of the waters of the Pacific northwest. This executive committee consists of Colonel David M. Dunne, chairman; A. J. Kingsley, E. L. Thompson for the Manufacturers' association, and A. P. Bateham and John E. Beall for the Land Products Show association. The executive committee in turn, selected Louis W. Buckley general manager of the exposition. J. W. Raymond was named secretary. Offices will be secured in the Commercial Club building and in charge of Manager Buckley, will be opened tomorrow. The committee proposes to go ahead in an active manner, and carry through all the details of the show as speedily as possible, especially in the issuing of premium lists, advance circulars and the arrangement and allotment of exhibit space. By unanimous action of the entire board of directors, Colonel David M. Dunne was elected chairman of the executive committee and president of the show.

Strong Financial Committee. Manager Beall an active exposition manager of land shows, manufacturers' exhibitions, food exhibitions and similar exhibitions for the past 20 years.

The plan, proposed is to hold an exposition that shall be virtually self-supporting, but whose financial affairs are to be governed and carried out through underwriting the entire financial end of the proposed show. One of the strongest financial committees possible was appointed and headed by L. Samuel, who stated at the meeting of the committee that the amount of the guarantee fund of \$15,000 would be raised in three days. Over one-third of this sum has already been tentatively pledged by the larger interests of the city.

Armory Is Secured. Yesterday the executive committee secured through the city engineer, the Armory and around which will be built temporary structures sufficient to give 10,000 square feet of exhibit space. Products, not only of Portland and Oregon, but of the entire Pacific northwest, will be installed on this floor space, making an exposition that will vie successfully with any of a similar character ever held in the United States.

A great many special events and the cooperation of scores of organizations, together with the management of the concert bands and musical attractions, will help provide an unlimited attendance. The management decided to make this a popular price exposition. Not the least attractive feature of the exposition will be the apple and fruit show. Premiums aggregating \$4,000 in value will be given to exhibitors in the fruit and agricultural or land products, departments. An effort will be made to have the showing of land products partake of a novel and original character. The method of fruit culture, the spraying of orchard trees, and the displays of farm machinery and tractor engines will help to interest not only the agriculturists and horticulturists, but the general public as well. A very considerable sum of money will be devoted toward the building of beautifully decorated booths and the overhead decorating and lighting.

KLUG HEARS SENTENCE

Attorney George Ludwig Klug, convicted of uttering a forged mortgage for \$400 to John Duda, was sentenced to an indeterminate sentence of two to 20 years in the penitentiary by Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday. Duda, Herman Yetter and Irene and Emma Paulsen, each of whom testified at Klug's trial that Klug secured money from them on similar mortgages, signed a petition that Klug be paroled, saying that they believed the loan had been sufficient. Judge Morrow did not consider the petition and also refused to grant a new trial. Notice of appeal was given by Klug's attorney.
