

LIFE LONG FRIENDS PAY FITTING TRIBUTE TO RICHARD WILLIAMS

Justice McBride Delivers Eulogy to Memory of Pioneer Lawyer at Funeral.

MOTIVES WERE PATRIOTIC

Interest in Politics Was Not Due to Personal Interest—Prominent in Uplifting Portland Schools.

At the funeral of Richard Williams, for a full half century one of the leading attorneys of the northwest, held at his late residence, 235 Fourteenth street, yesterday, deep felt tributes to the dead man's character and memory were paid by Chief Justice T. M. McBride and the Rev. T. L. Elliot. Mr. Williams died Friday at the age of 77 years.

Telling of his warm personal friendship with Mr. Williams, Justice McBride explained that their intimacy discarded formal terms, and used the salutations "Richard" and "Mac." He told how, at the age of 18, Mr. Williams left home determined to make the law his profession, and how to support himself he engaged in teaching school in different parts of the Willamette valley. Admitted to the bar when he was 21, he was a partner of the late Rufus Mallory until the latter's election to congress.

Head of One Office.
Mr. Williams' interest in politics after his removal to Portland in 1871 was due to patriotism, and not to personal inclination, asserted Justice McBride, and beyond serving a single term in congress he never held public office.

Lauding the late lawyer for his part in the upbuilding of Portland's public school system, the chief justice stated that Mr. Williams, as a lawyer, was clear, eloquent and conscientious, and told how he always expressed a distaste of criminal cases, in that they weighed down the attorney with the responsibility of a man's life, which could not be compensated by the fee. Mr. McBride told how in one instance Mr. Williams was employed to assist in the prosecution of a man indicted for murder in the first degree, but on sight of his tear-stained wife and children, returned the fee, saying he had not the heart to prosecute the husband, and thus remove their means of support.

Pastor Pays High Tribute.
The Rev. Dr. Elliot paid high tribute to Mr. Williams' character, and told of his happy domestic life.

Mr. Williams, who was 77 years of age, is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Osmon B. Stubbs; four grandchildren, Richard and Clara Williams, Robert and Jack Stubbs; a brother, Emmett B. Williams, and a sister, Mrs. Helen Stratton, all of Portland.

Following were the pallbearers: Active, L. A. McNary, Judge Kavanaugh, Dan J. Maloney, R. R. Giltner, Raleigh Trimble and Edward Wilson; honorary, P. L. Willis, H. H. Northup, Joseph Simon, C. W. Fulton, Judge Henry McGinn, Judge Wolverton, Charles H. Carey and Thomas Jordan. Interment was in Riverview cemetery.

Richmond School Pupils Hold Exhibit

Assembly Hall Filled With Goods and Produce of All Kinds and Interested Spectators.

The boys and girls of Richmond public school are holding their annual exhibit of home industries this afternoon in the assembly hall of the school. The exhibit opened at 1 o'clock and will continue during the afternoon and evening. All of the stuff shown comes from the homes of the children and is classified in five departments. The girls have examples of their work in cooking shown in the baking department with bread, cakes, pies and cookies. Their sewing work shows new garments, embroidery, darning and mending. From the home gardens both boys and girls show lettuce, beans, carrots, onions, peas, potatoes, radishes and turnips they have raised. There is also a poultry show of a score of birds that were reared by the school boys.

The show is under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher association and prizes of cash and merchandise will be awarded late this afternoon. A committee of members of the association is doing the judging.

O. R. Dinwiddle, the principal, and members of the school faculty are assisting the children in the annual show.

ITALIAN ATTEMPTS TO 'SHOOT UP' PICNIC AND INJURES ONE PERSON

Man Said to Have Become Indignant When Countrymen Ruled Off Dance Floor

Said to have been indignant because two of his countrymen were ruled off the dance floor at Bonnevillie yesterday for "roughing" Jim Petrone, an Italian grocery clerk, attempted to "shoot up" a picnic given by Portland Aerie No. 4, Brotherhood of Eagles, with the result that Hugh Ferguson, of 544 Overton street, received a bullet in the ribs.

Ferguson is now resting easy at the Good Samaritan hospital, where the bullet was extracted by Dr. Andrew C. Smith last night. His condition is not serious.

Petrone is lodged in the county jail here in Portland, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, while G. Gallucci, owner of the Moon saloon, First and Jefferson streets, is also held on an open charge for mixing in the melee that followed the shooting. Gallucci received a bad beating, and had his clothes stripped from his back as well, when he attempted to assist Petrone after the latter was seized.

Petrone is said to have begun shooting at random in the crowd when Ferguson grappled with him and attempted to wrest the gun from the Italian's grasp. He was shot in the attempt, falling against a tree, while C. L. Fisher, of 705 Sherman street, was also wounded in the chest.

"Dad" Hunter, special agent for O. W. R. & N. company, arrested both Petrone and Gallucci, bringing them to Portland with the assistance of Henry Q. Aldrich, an ex-deputy sheriff, who was a member of the picnic party.

Ferguson was taken to Portland by train, and then rushed to the hospital in a Red Cross ambulance. The shooting happened a little after 5:30 o'clock, when the last of the athletic events was being held. Petrone and Gallucci are said to have been seen talking with the two Italians who were put off the floor previous to the former's fusillade. Jack Gavin, a watchman, said he saw Petrone pull his gun and level it at the crowd, and immediately saw what he was going to do. In reply, Petrone is said to have hit Gavin in the face with the gun, knocking him down.

About 175 persons attended the picnic, but according to H. Enke, vice-president of the Eagles' lodge, neither of the Italians was a member.

WOULD BUILD CANAL MONUMENT HONORING WORK OF PHYSICIANS

Plan Urged at Meeting of American Medical Society in Atlantic City.

NEW LAWS ARE URGED

San Francisco Invites Association to Meet There During Year of Panama-Pacific Exposition.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 22.—A monument on the Panama canal zone commemorative of the part physicians took in making the big waterway's construction possible was strongly urged at the opening of the American Medical association's 65th annual session here today.

The committee charged with arranging for such a memorial reported to the delegates, the association's legislative body, in favor of a \$30,000 appropriation to pay for it, leaving the selection of a site to the secretary of war. Also the committee asked that a day be set aside at the San Francisco exposition in honor of medical workers in the canal zone.

The council on health and public instruction recommended to the delegates an investigation to secure more accurate information concerning the American health problem, a campaign to inform the public how to avail itself of recently discovered methods of preventing diseases and prolonging life, and the cultivation of sentiment in favor of laws "which will render possible a conservation of human life commensurate with our advancing knowledge."

From the medical society of the state of New York came a suggestion for federal laws providing for examination of immigrants by expert alienists as a means of excluding the mentally unfit.

An invitation was received from the medical society of the state of California, the American society for Tropical Medicine and other organizations in a congress on tropical diseases.

The committee on scientific research announced a \$200 award to Edith Clapppole of Berkeley, Cal., for an article on "Streptothrix Infections of the Lungs."

The house of delegates was called to order by the president, Dr. John A. Witherspoon of Nashville, Tenn.
