Suspected Plotters Arrested in Italy

Jails in All Large Cities Filled With Men Taken in Anti-Government Outbreak Crisis.

Modane, France, June 24.—The jails in every large city in Italy are packed, according to arrivals here today from across the frontier, with prisoners arrested in connection with the recent anti-government outbreak throughout the country.

The authorities believe the uprising was the result of a widespread revolutionary plot and are making strenuous efforts to run down the leaders and break up the organization. A good many of those most prominently identified with the movement, however, were reported to have escaped abroad. The Italian suspicion that Austrian influence was behind the troubles was understood to be showing itself constantly in connection with the examination of prisoners.

MEANS OF REGULATING ADOPTING OF CHILDREN IS URGED BY GARDNER

Superintendent of Boys' and Girls' Aid Society Makes Report at Annual Meeting.

FINANCIAL STATUS GOOD

Work of Heads of Homes Departments Complimented; Trustees of Institution Relected.

In his report to the Boys' and Girls' Aid society of Oregon at its annual meeting yesterday, Superintendent W. T. Gardner made a plea for the enactment of a law regulating the placing of children in private homes, so that agencies may be required to investigate fully the fitness of foster parents to assume charge of waifs.

Mr. Gardner pointed out instances where applicants for young charges of the society had adopted children from other sources when the society's agents had rejected their applications. This resulting often to the detriment of the child.

Financial Report Made.

The meeting was featured by a celebration of the twenty-second anniversary of Mr. Gardner's tenure of the superintendency and of Mrs. C. R. Templeton's service as secretary of the women's advisory board.

The meeting was held at the society's receiving home, East Twenty-ninth and Irving streets. W. B. Gilbert, president of the society, was in charge, and a large number of friends of the home attended.

Secretary F. E. Beach reported the high commendation of the home made by a special legislative committee which visited the society and investigated the home and its management.

Treasurer William F. Woodward reported that \$8776.84 was on hand April 29, 1913, and that \$37,287.34 had been received during the year.

Mrs. Templeton's report showed that the home has always been found clean and sanitary, and that the life of the children maintained there has been wholesome. She spoke of the deaths of Mrs. Levi White, Mrs. H. C. Campbell and Mrs. W. B. Buchanan as great blows to the work of the board.

Many Children Cared for.

Reports showed that since the home was established in 1885, 4378 children have been received. Last year 443 children were taken in and homes in private families were found for 452. The per capita cost of maintenance is 42 cents per day considering that, on an average, 68 children and seven employees are maintained.

The reports complimented the work of Mrs. Mary Graham, who has been at the home more than 20 years. Field work reports were given by John Tiescher, J. D. Cain and J. G. Kilpatrick.

Mrs. A. E. Watson, principal of the Kern school, where most of the children of the home attend, discussed phases of education. Others who spoke were Rev. T. L. Elliot, one of the founders of the home, and Rev. J. D. Corby, W. F. Woodward, Judge C. E. Wolverton and F. J. Farber were reelected trustees for three years.

Ashland Celebrates Springs Victory

Charter Amendment Providing for Commission to Boost New Enterprise Passes by Big Majority.

Ashland, Or., June 24.—A street demonstration last night was held in celebration of the passing by a big majority of the charter amendment providing for a commission to promote the Ashland Mineral Springs project. B. R. Greer, J. P. Dodge and R. A. Minkler were elected commissioners to handle the \$175,000 bond issue voted June 9. The project provides for the piping of lithia, soda, sulphur and other medicinal waters from nearby springs into the city, at a cost of about \$150,000. The \$75,000 item is for the improvements of local parks, and the installation of drinking fountains and pavilions.

The Southern Pacific Railroad company has promised to print and distribute a half million copies of lithograph booklets describing Ashland waters, the scenery, climate and aids, trips, and to otherwise work to make Ashland a noted summer and health resort.

Tape Is President of Medical Society

Hot Lake Chosen as Next Meeting Place; Session at Pendleton Voted One of the Most Successful of Any.

Pendleton, Or., June 24.—Dr. G. W. Tape of Hot Lake was yesterday afternoon elected president of the Eastern Oregon Medical society at the conclusion of its annual meeting here, and Hot Lake was selected as the meeting place for 1915. Dr. L. U. Temple of Pendleton was chosen first president, Dr. R. N. Reber of Pendleton second vice president and Dr. T. M. Henderson of Pendleton was reelected secretary-treasurer.

The meeting was marked by the largest attendance in the history of the society and was one of the most successful. Clinical lectures by Dr. W. D. McNary and Dr. A. E. Tamsie of the Eastern Oregon state hospital, and by Dr. A. E. Rocky of Portland formed the principal part of the programs.

S. N. M. Accepted by Government

Announcement Received Yesterday From Secretary of Navy—Organization Will Leave on Cruise July 1.

Acting under a federal statute passed last February, the secretary of the navy has officially accepted the Oregon naval militia, thereby placing that organization on an equal footing with the Oregon National Guard, so far as federal control and supervision is concerned. Following an inspection of the naval militia last week by Lieutenant R. R. Smith, U. S. N., who reported the organization in fine condition, Secretary Daniels yesterday notified Adjutant General Finzer of the acceptance of the organization and immediately allotted \$3500 of government funds to be used in bearing the expense of the annual practice cruise.

Captain Blair, commander of the naval forces of the state, has been authorized to draw this amount for immediate use.

The annual cruise of the naval men will begin July 1 and will last about 20 days. On the morning of July 1, at 8:30 o'clock, the naval battalion will go by train to Tacoma, where the men will embark on the cruiser Milwaukee. After picking up the Washington naval militia, the cruiser will proceed south, stopping at Honolulu.

On the return trip, the naval men will devote a week to heavy gun target practice.

Lieutenant Commander Blair estimates the cruise strength of the naval militia will be between 175 and 200 enlisted men and 10 officers. During the past 30 days 62 men have enlisted in the service, bringing the organization strength up to 250 men.

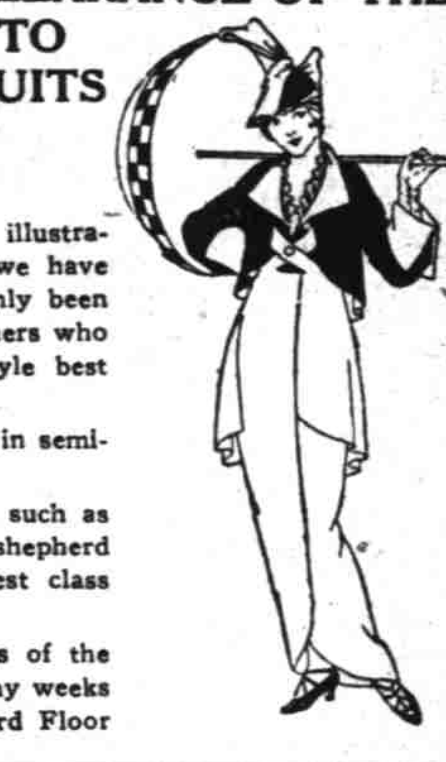
