

DEAN OFFERS TO BUY COMPETING COMPANY'S STOCK

Proposition Presented in Letter at Hearing of Telephone Case.

WOULD MODIFY DECREE

Oregon-Washington Company Willing to Pay \$400,000 for Pacific Telephone Company Stock.

There were two developments in the Bell telephone anti-trust case before the federal court yesterday.

The most important was the proposal of W. H. Dean, vice president of the Oregon-Washington Telephone company, operating in Hood River, Klickitat and Skamania counties of Oregon and Washington, respectively, to buy from the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company its holdings of stock of the Northwestern Long Distance Telephone & Telegraph company, which has its principal offices in Portland.

The other was the filing of a petition asking that the big decree of March 26 be modified to the extent that the Bell company, instead of being compelled to sell its stock in the Spokane independent systems, be allowed to take over entirely the independent lines in Spokane and operate the one system.

Letter is filed with Clerk. Dean's letter to the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, offering to purchase its holdings in the Northwestern company, and which was filed with the clerk of the federal court, proposes to buy all the stocks and bonds of the Northwestern owned by the Bell interests at a flat sum of \$400,000.

According to the paper, the par value of this stock which Dean proposes to purchase is \$721,000. The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, the document states, owns 421 2/3 shares of stocks and bonds.

Dean offers a payment of \$5000 herewith as soon as Judge Bean approves the deal and will pay \$95,000 in 90 days following the approval of the bid. The balance of \$300,000 will be in the form of a note due January 1, 1917, to be paid with 5 per cent interest.

Dean reserves the right to organize a new corporation to take over the property and to create a new bond issue for the further development of the holding. He also stipulates that before the Pacific company can foreclose on the big note of \$300,000 if principal or interest is not forthcoming, the foreclosure must be authorized by the court.

The decree of March 26, 1914, provided that the Bell company's holdings in the Spokane independent corporations must be sold within six months, unless the Spokane city council should authorize the consolidation of the Bell and independent lines under Bell ownership.

The petition to modify the decree stated that the Spokane city council on June 22 had passed a resolution deciding that it was in the best interest of the city that the two exchanges should be consolidated and owned by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company and that the latter corporation had the right to ask the Portland court to modify the decree to that effect.

The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company had already applied for a franchise, which will be voted upon by the Spokane city council Aug. 25 and which will be a 25 year franchise. Judge Bean will give both propositions a hearing in open court in two weeks, as soon as Constantine J. Smyth, special prosecutor in the Bell case for the government, returns from his home in Omaha.

Work on Steamers Is Being Hastened

Only Non-Readiness of Panama Canal Will Prevent Starting of Flavel-San Francisco Line in January.

Only the non-readiness of the Panama canal to handle traffic by next January will prevent formal inauguration of the Flavel-San Francisco steamship service of the North Bank road, according to C. C. Lacey, marine superintendent of the Great Northern, who was in Portland Tuesday. He has just returned from Philadelphia, where he lined up on a faster basis the construction work on the twin vessels.

Mr. Lacey and W. D. Scott, general manager of the North Bank, went to Flavel today to inspect progress on the dock construction. They may remain there several days. Mr. Lacey wants to see that the provisions for handling passengers and freight are according to the very latest ideas.

The marine superintendent found work lagging a little at the shipyards, due mostly to slight misunderstandings on certain details. He straightened this out and saw renewed activity before he started west, with the result that he believes the ships will be delivered through the canal within the contract time. If the canal is not ready to receive the ships, he says that won't be the fault of the builders or the two railroad companies that own the North Bank system.

Delegates to Dental Convention Leaving. Delegates who attended the twenty-first annual convention of the Oregon State Dental association at the North Pacific Dental college are leaving for their homes today following the election of officers who will serve for the ensuing two years. Owing to the fact that the National association will meet in San Francisco next year no session will be held by the Oregon association until 1916.

Dr. H. C. Fixott of this city was selected president succeeding Dr. E. C. McFarland who presided at the meetings this year. Others elected were: Dr. J. M. Miller, vice president; Dr. Frank Hollister, secretary; Dr. C. R. Haskell, treasurer, and Drs. C. M. Harrison, E. Hirstel and Millard C. Holbrook, executive committeemen. Dr. W. C. Shearer and Dr. J. H. Tuttle were hold-over members of the committee.

Two Double Weddings. Marriage license records of yesterday revealed two double weddings. The happy bridegrooms who secured licenses to wed the first two sisters named announced their wedding for last night at 963 Brooklyn street, the home of the two brides. The principals were Edwin H. Gunn and Miss Ida W. Pipey and Kenneth B. Grinnell of Hubbard, Or., and Miss A. Winnifred Pipey. The other wedding will be celebrated today at the home of the brides in Lents. The principals are Frank P. Baxter, Ridgefield, Wash., and Miss Matilda Krause, and John Mitchell of Gresham and Miss Minnie Krause.

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ESTATE TO MRS. HARDER. Sincere love and a dying blessing to each of seven sons and daughters was the only bequest left them by William Harder, the railroad man who died June 18. His estate was left in full to Mrs. Louisa Harder, his widow, who was named executrix of his will. The estate consists of \$1114 in the United States National bank and five shares of stock in each of the Great Northern Employees' Investment company and the Great Northern Iron Ore Properties, the shares in each being estimated at a value of about \$100.

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TOWNSEND CREAMERY HAS HOUSEWARMING AT ITS NEW PLANT

Constant Stream of People Throng Through Big Building for Over Two Hours.

INDUSTRY IS EXPLAINED

Staff Employees Tell How Machinery Works; Well Known Men Take Part in Formalities.

Music, speaking and a general reception marked the formal opening last night of the new plant of the T. S. Townsend Creamery company on East Seventh and Everett streets. For more than two hours a constant stream of people which taxed the capacity of the big building thronged through the various departments and saw how White Clover butter and ice cream are manufactured.

Every step of the industry from the moment cream is received from the outside until it leaves the factory a finished product was explained by the staff employees who were on hand at their stations for that purpose.

Representatives of various commercial and civic organizations were present to congratulate Mr. Townsend and view the new building which occupies a quarter block, represents an investment of \$130,000 and is a result of 28 years of business activity in Portland on the part of its owner.

Among those who spoke in relation to the creamery industry of Oregon, its growth, development and future, were Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company; R. L. Sablin, of the Merchants' Protective association; Colonel David M. Dunne, president of the Manufacturers' association of Oregon, and Frank McGrillis, of the Realty Board.

Mr. Townsend pointed out the relation of the creamery to the general trade of the community.

From 8:30 until 11 o'clock when the housewarming concluded, an orchestra played continually and refreshments were served.

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Training for Vocation Discussed

Washington Commission Meeting at Tacoma Will Hear Addresses and Discussions by Leading Educators.

Tacoma, Wash., June 24.—"What shall the state of Washington do to encourage vocational education?" was the broad question taken up for discussion at the opening session of the vocational training commission. The program as announced by Mrs. Josephine Preston, state superintendent of schools, includes addresses by more than 50 of the state's most prominent educators, including Mrs. Preston, W. M. Kern, superintendent, Walla Walla; H. G. Lull, of the state university, Seattle; Professor F. O. Krueger of the state college; E. W. Olson, state labor commissioner, and A. P. Marsh, president State Federation of Labor, Everett.

Mrs. Preston said that the principal reason for the majority of children leaving school, especially after having completed the grade work, was the necessity to learn some vocation or trade in which they could not be publicly instructed, and that because they were not so instructed in schools, much of the vast amount of excellent material was wasted.

Women Will Hold Joint Rally Here. Addresses Touching on Immigration Will Be Discussed and Reports on Missionary Work Will Be Heard.

Including a survey of the immigration problem of the Pacific coast in the light of the opening of the Panama canal, the Oregon branch of the Woman's Board of the Pacific and the Woman's Home Missionary union of the Congregational churches of Oregon, will hold a joint rally tomorrow at Pilgrim church, Missouri avenue and Shaver street.

Dr. Clinton S. Latourette will give a discussion of the Chinese nation of today, and addresses on phases of immigration will cover the needs of the Indian, the mountain whites, the Armenians in California and the other foreign factors of the future population of the west.

The rally will begin at 9:45 a. m.
