Principal among the achievements of the organization is the night school for mill laborers. This was established last winter, and has been a commendable work. A large number of new members have been taken into the club this year.

One thing which was started but not finished this year was the establishment of a market inspector for Oregon City. The organization is determined to obtain this position, and is working among the members and transfer their trade elsewhere. The complaint is that the sanitary conditions of the markets are poor in the city. Another thing which the club will not let slip is the establishment of a Bible study department.

OUTINGS FOR BOYS IS BEING PLANNED BY RECREATION LEAGUE

Summer Camp Will Be Established at Cascades on Columbia Early in July.

MONEY IS BEING RAISED

Amount Now on Hand \$420, and Balance of \$1000 to Be Secured by Contribution.

Portland boys who usually spend their summers on the hot streets of the city will be given a chance this summer to have two weeks' outing up on the Columbia river. The Recreation league of Portland is arranging for a summer camp at Cascades, on the Columbia, 48 miles from Portland.

A charge of \$5 will be made of each boy, and the balance of the expense incidental to carrying on the camp will be raised by subscription. The league is now soliciting subscriptions from all who feel like contributing toward giving newsboys and others a real vacation.

It is estimated that a boy can be kept at the camp for \$10. With each boy paying \$5 himself a donation of \$5 will assure one boy an outing.

The league has already raised \$420, and as it hopes to care for 200 boys during the course of the summer, must increase this amount to \$1000. Two hundred boys at \$5 each will make \$1000, and donations to the extent of an additional \$1000 will make up the balance of the \$2000 estimated as necessary to successfully carry on the camp. Those desiring to subscribe should address Ray Small, Lewis building, Portland.

The camp will begin July 6, and continue for eight weeks, the boys being cared for in groups of 50 for two weeks each. Trained leaders in boys' work will be in charge of the camp, and every influence will be brought to bear for a wholesome outdoor life in the Cascades.

Marvin Howes, George Axtell, A. B. Clark and A. E. Woods are the men who will have charge of the camp. Under their direction the boys will be trained in camp life, and in the ways of the woods, will be taught to swim, and will be made to do all the camp work save cooking.

Games, hiking, reading and nature study, with regular hours, nutritious food and plenty of sleep and adequate medical examination and care will be features of the camp.

The committee in charge for the Recreation league consists of H. R. Talbot, L. H. Weir, T. Morris Dunne, Ben Selling and A. E. Wood.
