Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana Will Have Delegates Present Here.

FOUNDER TO ATTEND

A. K. Mozumdar, First Hindu to be Naturalized as American Citizen, Will Deliver Address.

Starting tonight at 7:45 o'clock, members of the Christian Yoga from the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana will hold a two days' district conference at Women of Woodcraft hall, Tenth and Taylor streets.

Moore, arrangements and oratory.

The proposition of securing the Elks band was discussed. Since the band is to be at the Astoria carnival it is hoped that they may be secured for the Seaside festivities.

North Beach Has Water.

North Beach, Wash., June 28.—Hotel matrons and cottagers will be agreeably surprised when they come to this beach this summer for one of the inconveniences in vacationing—lack of plenty of pure water—has been overcome. Cost of the hotels on the beach have piped water and many home owners have installed water on their premises. The water is supplied by a firm of Seattle and Portland men and is obtained from a reservoir three miles east of Newton's station. "Safe and Sane" Fourth Is Urged

State Fire Marshal of Ohio Takes Precautions for the Safety of the Children.

Columbus, Ohio, June 28.—State Fire Marshal Defenbaugh today urged Ohio parents to protect the lives of their children and eliminate fire disasters throughout the state by observing "safe and sane Fourth" next Sunday. "See to it that youngsters are not exposed to serious injury or possible death by refusing to give them dangerous explosives for Fourth of July celebrations," said Defenbaugh in a formal statement, for Fourth of July celebrations. "Deaths and injuries incident to the old time barbarous Fourth have been almost wiped out in Ohio by the adoption by our cities and villages, in 1890, of ordinances either prohibiting entirely or strictly regulating the sale and use of fireworks and dangerous explosives."

Splinter Kills Man.

South Bend, Wash., June 28.—John Clapp, an edgeman employed by the Columbia Box factory, was killed Saturday evening by a splinter which flew from the edge, piercing his left lung. He was able to walk about 20 feet toward the stretcher after pulling out the splinter before he fell. He did not regain consciousness, dying in about an hour. He leaves a widow and three children.

Prison Surgeon Resigns.

Walla Walla, Wash., June 28.—Dr. L. R. Quilliam, who for a number of years past has been physician and surgeon at the Washington state penitentiary has resigned and expects to leave the services of the state July 1.

On the ground floor are two large store rooms and the second floor is devoted to offices. The total cost of the building was \$25,000.

New Freight Service.

Freewater, Or., June 28.—The Walla Walla Railway company is installing a new electric freight motor car to run between Walla Walla and Milton-Freewater. The company is doing this in order to better handle the fruit crop which is shipped from this section. The new car is 41 feet long over the sills, and has a three foot open platform at each end of the car with railings.

Junction City, Or., June 28.—The dedication of the Junction City cannery, which is a branch of the Eugene cannery both being under the control of the Lane County Fruit Growers' association, was held here Saturday by a basket dinner at the cannery building. About 500 attended, business houses closing at 1 o'clock. Music for the occasion was furnished by the Junction City band. The following program was given. Address of welcome by Mayor Forest Miller; "Berry Growing," by George Young; "Cannery Running," by C. E. Logsdon, manager of the Junction City cannery; "Cannery Benefit to the City," S. L. Moorhead; addresses, A. C. Nielsen and S. L. Jensen; "Selling Products," by A. Rupert of Portland; J. O. Holt, manager of the Eugene cannery, gave a talk on the products to be raised for sale in raw state and after being processed.

At this time all stock upon which final payment has been made was distributed. The cannery manager then started machinery, and capped, processed and cooked a small batch of Royal Anne cherries.

Campbell Memorial Held at Centenary

In part, he said: "The fireman who risks his life amid falling walls, the physician who risks his life with contagious diseases, is as much of a hero as he who charges on the battlefield," said the pastor.
