

CHAMBERLAIN PUTS INTERESTS OF OREGON FIRST ON PROGRAM

Senator Will Not Leave Post Unprotected to Canvass for Reelection This Fall.

MAY BE ABLE TO LEAVE

Hopes Congress Will Finish Business and Adjourn in Time for Him to Meet Friends Before Election.

Washington Bureau of The Journal.—Washington, June 29.—While Senator Chamberlain hopes to be able to get back to Oregon in time to canvass the state, he is determined that he will not leave Washington unless he can do so without jeopardizing any of the many interests which have been entrusted to him.

"It has been my hope and expectation," said Senator Chamberlain today, "that congress would complete the work of this session and adjourn early enough for me to go to the state and make a canvass. I still believe our work will be completed in time for me to do so. If congress does not adjourn until fall, perhaps the work may be in such condition that it will be possible for me to leave for a short time to make a canvass of the state while congress is in session."

Will Stick to His Post.
"However, that may be, I am fully determined that I will not leave Washington while there is any need for me to remain here. I realize that remaining away from a state while a campaign is on would cost me many thousands of votes and possibly result in my defeat, but I would rather go down in defeat while at my post of duty than to sacrifice any of the interests of the state of Oregon."

"Senator Bourne was right when he said two years ago that it was the duty of a senator to remain in Washington so long as his work requires his presence here. He was also right when he declared that the people of the state must show appreciation of faithful service if they desired that service to be rendered. Bourne's address to the people was misunderstood and caused resentment because of his blunt expression. 'You are now on trial, not I.'"

Stand on Panama Canal.
"I am aware that during my absence my enemies will have opportunity to misrepresent my work and the results I have accomplished. Some members of my own party will unjustly attack me because I have been unable to agree with the views of the president in favor of repeal of the free trade provision of the Panama canal act. It was with great regret that I found myself under the necessity of disagreeing with the man who occupies the position which makes him the head of the party of which I am a member. Nevertheless, I place my duty to the country far above any allegiance to party."

"Moreover, I do not believe that the repeal of the canal tolls provision could properly be made a party measure. In any event, I deem the trust reposed in me as senator of this state to be as sacred as that reposed in the chief executive, and so long as I am a member of the senate I shall continue to vote my own convictions regardless of the opinions of any other members of the senate or any official of the executive or judicial branch of the government."

Appropriations for Oregon.
"The passage of appropriation bills in which Oregon is deeply interested, will soon be accomplished. The senate has already passed homestead legislation most urgently desired by the Pacific northwest. It is my hope that the work of the senate will soon reach a stage which will permit me to leave Washington for a short time without in any way neglecting the work in which Oregon is interested. In that event, I shall arrange a pair so that my vote will practically be counted in my absence and I can then go back to Oregon to meet my friends and make a brief campaign."

Canning Fish for the Winter Months

Thrifty Housewives Take Advantage of Low Price of Salmon and Shad and Put Away Supplies for Future.

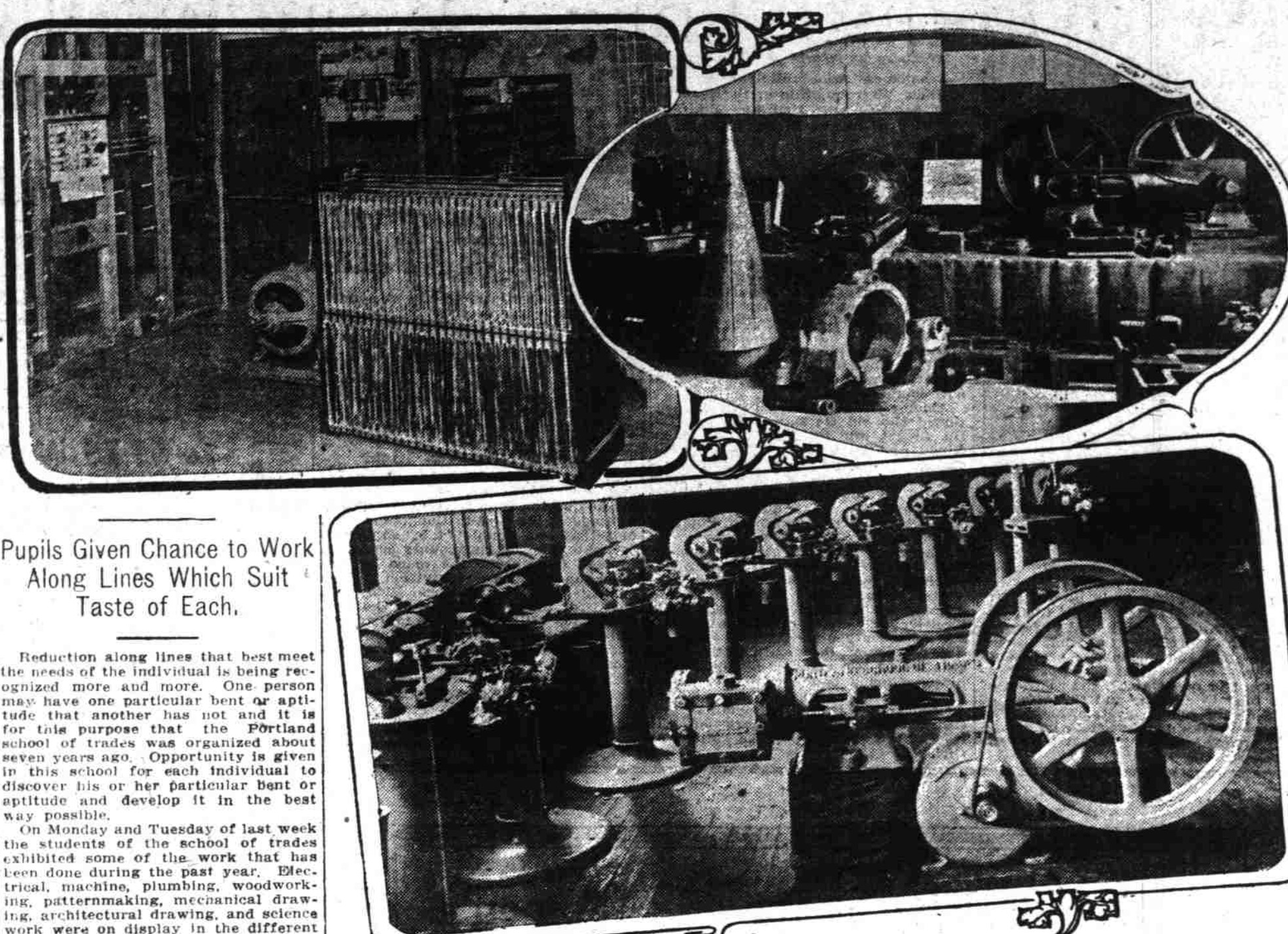
Ridgefield, Wash., June 29.—Salmon fishing now is at its height for bluebacks and many large catches are reported. Many shad are also being caught, this season being an unusually good one for this variety of fish. On the O. K. and Bachelor island drifts some few miles south and west of this place, there are numerous fishermen seeking for salmon and shad further down the Columbia river are still more drifts and many sealers, all reporting good catches. The drifts to the south and west of Ridgefield of the Columbia have been dragged and much improvement made there, a large number of snags and other obstructions which hinder the sealers have been removed. Some of the thrifty housewives of Ridgefield are taking advantage of the low price of salmon and shad and are canning fish for the winter months, while others are smoking them. In canning, the fish are cut into small pieces, small enough to fill a common fruit jar, salted to suit the taste and placed in a wash boiler or other similar contrivance and boiled for two hours, the tops of the jars are left loose, so that the steam may escape. The jars are then allowed to cool slowly when the tops are made tight.

Old Odd Fellow Honored.
McMinnville, Or., June 29.—With better programs and larger crowds than a year ago, the Chautauqua opened Sunday evening with an address by Colonel W. H. Miller, of Spokane, on "When I am Old, Bill." The Lyric Glee club of Lincoln, Neb., furnished the music.

Under the auspices of the local lodge of Odd Fellows, Rev. Joseph Hoberg was presented, Saturday night, with a 55 year veteran's jewel. Grand Secretary Sharon delivered the presentation speech. There are but 12 Odd Fellows in the state of Oregon who are entitled to wear the 55 year jewel. Mr. Hoberg, who is one of the pioneer M. E. clergymen of Oregon, became affiliated with the order of Odd Fellows at Lansing, Iowa, June 29, 1859. He came to Oregon in 1866. He holds membership in Callapool lodge, No. 45, at Brownsville, Or., of which he is the only surviving member.

TRAINING OF HAND AND BRAIN OF STUDENTS



Pupils Given Chance to Work Along Lines Which Suit Taste of Each.

Reduction along lines that best meet the needs of the individual is being recognized more and more. An exhibit is held for two days by the students at the end of each term's work, which is open to the public.

Immigration Men Cry Office Politics

Charges of Misconduct Are Being Investigated by Labor Department; Both Sides Make Accusations.

Washington, June 30.—Immigration attaches here today declared that "office politics" and jealousies were largely responsible for the charges and counter charges of misconduct involving Assistant Immigration Commissioner Larned, Inspector Frank Ainsworth of San Francisco and Inspectors Roger O'Donnell, R. H. Taylor and H. H. Heberle.

The entire affair was being investigated today by John Densmore of the labor department.

Immigration officials asserted that Larned, backed up by O'Donnell, Taylor and Heberle, charged Ainsworth

with "misbecoming conduct" and also with securing household supplies below cost from government contractors at the Angel Island station. Ainsworth retaliated by charging Larned with gross incompetency and by alleging that Larned, O'Donnell and Taylor had released wealthy Chinese and other aliens. Densmore has called upon Inspector Ainsworth to prove his charges.

Miller Explains Commerce School

Plan Is to Train Young People of the State in the Fundamentals of Commercial Life; Citizens May Profit.

Salem, Or., June 30.—Work cut out for the school of commerce, established at the University of Oregon, was explained by H. B. Miller, head of the school, before the county school

superintendents at their convention yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Miller described the possibilities and opportunities and need for such a school to train the young people of the state in the fundamentals of commercial life, particularly bearing upon the cost of production and the world markets with their various elements of competition. He said that through the industrial and commercial survey department the practical side of commercial affairs will be taught, not only to the students but to those who are actually engaged in production and commercial life.

He said there is no other department in the state for utilizing and passing on to the people of the state the vast amount of available information about cost of production and market conditions in other states and countries.
