

GRAND DUKE DOOMED FROM THE MINUTE HE CROSSED INTO BOSNIA

Bombs Found Under Table,
In Bedroom and Even the
Railroad Was Mined.

FEAR AUSTRIAN-SERB WAR

Austria Convinced Assassinations Were
Result of a Widespread Plot on
Part of Many Servians.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Berlin, July 1.—War between Austria and Serbia was feared here today as a result of the assassinations of Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria by Gavrilo Princip, a Serbian student, at Sarajevo Sunday.

Serbia, of course, could resist Austria for hardly a day, but Russia is supposed to be its protector. Should the czar be drawn into the controversy, it was agreed here that nobody could tell where or when the trouble would stop.

Many were saying that fears, expressed when the archduke was killed, of a disturbance of European peace through his death, seemed likely to be speedily justified.

Austrian officials had unquestionably been convinced that a widespread plot was behind Francis Ferdinand's assassination, and that it originated in Serbia. A note said to have been sent from Vienna to Belgrade demanded the conspirators' punishment, was interpreted in Serbia as reflecting on the nation. The people were furious.

On the other hand, Austrians were enraged by the open assertion in Serbian newspapers that the assassination was provoked by Austrian oppression of its Serbian subjects.

Investigation at Sarajevo showed that the most elaborate plans were made to kill the archduke.

Aside from the successful attempt made by Princip, and the failure of Nedjeljko Cabrinovitch, bombs were found planted under the table at which the archduke was dining and in the chimney of his wife's room at 1110, a Serbian suburb which the couple were to have visited. Several powerful bombs were also found in possession of a Serbian woman arrested at Sarajevo as a suspect.

Finally the railroad by which the archduke and his wife were to have left Sarajevo, it was discovered, was mined in several places.

AUSTRIAN TROOPS IN PROVINCES PUT DOWN SCORES OF UPRISINGS

Budapest, July 1.—Austrian troops had gained the upper hand today in the various provinces in which pro-Serbian and anti-Serbian disorders broke out following the assassination Sunday of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife, the duchess of Hohenburg.

The fire started during yesterday's rioting at Mostar, capital of Herzegovina province, was extinguished, the Croats who invaded the Serbian quarter were driven back into their own section of the city and cavalry was patrolling the streets. Sarajevo was still under martial law. If a Serbian revolt had been planned in Bosnia and Herzegovina it seemed to have been stamped out for the time being.

The Serbian population was in an ugly temper, however, and predictions of future trouble and especially of more assassinations, were freely made. Gavrilo Princip, who killed the archduke and his wife, and Nedjeljko Cabrinovitch, who made a similar but unsuccessful attempt, both denied that they had accomplices or that they knew one another. The police were not convinced, however, and more arrests were expected.

"A study of anarchist literature convinces me," said Princip, "that we cannot do a greater service to our fellowmen than by assassinating rulers."

PANAMA CANAL DEAL CALLED DICKER WITH OLD CANAL'S ROGUES

ment on the subject. His administration is responsible for the unfortunate situation which confronts us as a nation. We are doing the best we can to wipe out the chapter of national dishonor for which he is responsible.

"In order to build the isthmian canal the dismemberment of Colombia was not at all necessary. There never was a time when Colombia was not willing to negotiate with us with reference to the rights to the canal, which were obtained on the isthmus. Prior to the fake revolution arranged by Mr. Roosevelt and his advisers, we were on most friendly terms with Colombia. In 1898 we entered into a treaty with Colombia, at that time known as New Granada, by which we guaranteed the rights of sovereignty of New Granada, now Colombia, in the isthmus of Panama. Subsequently we protected on more than one occasion the rights of sovereignty of the Colombian government over the isthmus of Panama.

Treaty Obligations Broken.

"There were no revolutions on the isthmus of Panama from 1891 down to the Roosevelt revolution of 1903. At that time, under the direction of Mr. Roosevelt, we violated all our treaty obligations and became directly responsible for the dismemberment of

Colombia. This act of national dishonor was not at all necessary. We could have built the Panama canal without it, and it did not cost us \$40,000,000 to acquire the rights to the French companies had in the isthmus. As a matter of fact, their franchise was about to expire. In a few months it would have expired.

"Under the contract the French companies had with Colombia, in a few months all the property of the French companies had on the isthmus would have reverted to Colombia. Colombia owned a large block of stock in the French companies and was a party to be reckoned with.

"Colombia claimed more of the \$40,000,000 we were willing to pay for the canal rights than the Panama Canal company was willing to give her, and the fight made by the Roosevelt administration was a fight for the new Panama Canal company. On account of the fact that prominent persons connected with the old Panama Canal company had looted the company and stolen millions of dollars the new Panama Canal company was organized.

Old Guilties Paid in Full.

"Stockholders in the new company were the penalized stockholders of the old company. In other words, these stockholders in the old company who had stolen from the old company were compelled by the French government to subscribe to the new company the amount they had stolen from the old company and the transactions of the Roosevelt administration were with the representatives of the new company.

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"On account of the manipulations of the Roosevelt administration these thieves were paid in full. The Roosevelt administration preferred that the amount of the \$40,000,000, except that I know that under the Roosevelt regime the penalized stockholders in the new company got their money.

Papers Locked Up in Paris.

"Mr. Roosevelt has frequently stated that all the archives and the papers connected with the Panama Canal transactions were surrendered to this republic by the liquidator of the French companies. The archives, that were brought here consisted in the main of blue prints, drawings, etc. The papers which show what became of the \$40,000,000 are locked up in a fireproof vault in the city of Paris by order of the civil tribunal of the Seine, there to remain under French law for 20 years.

They are in sealed packages. At the expiration of that time under French law these packages, with the seals unbroken, must be taken out and burned. If an order could be obtained, and this administration may be able to obtain it, directing the surrender to this country of these documents, which certainly ought to go with our purchase, we would know what became of all the \$40,000,000 we are supposed to have paid to the French companies.

"The Panama revolution was arranged in the United States by Dr. Amador, the first president of the Panama republic, representative of the French companies, and William Nelson Cromwell, of New York. The evidence shows that the Roosevelt administration was in a position to know all about it. In the month of October, 1903, Dr. Amador was in the United States in consultation with representatives of the Roosevelt administration and on the eighteenth of October he wrote a letter to his son, the original of which can be obtained at any time, and advised him that arrangements had been made for the revolution.

Warships Stand Off Colombians.

"At a critical period, just at the outbreak of the revolution, our warships arrived at either end of the canal, coming hundreds of miles. The officers of these ships received their orders from the Roosevelt administration long before any one except the conspirators ever dreamed of a revolution in the isthmus of Panama. They were instructed to keep the Colombian government from landing troops on the isthmus to put down a revolution. This they accomplished.

"Colombia was not permitted to land her troops, although she tried to do so. We placed a cordon of warships around the new republic and made this fake revolution successful. We did this in the interest of the French thieves, who wanted their share of

the \$40,000,000 we were willing to pay.

The B. V. mentioned in the letter of Dr. Amador was Bunau Villaja, the first minister of the Panama Republic to the United States. He also was one of the largest penalized stockholders in the new company.

It is time the facts about the Roosevelt revolution on the isthmus of Panama were known.

Panama Flag Made in United States.

"From a commercial standpoint it is important that friendly relations be reestablished and maintained with the great republics to the south of us. We are trying to do this. The honor of our country demands that we wipe out this stamp upon our diplomatic history. We are trying to do it, and we are about to succeed. In spite of the frenzied, unpatriotic rantings of Mr. Roosevelt and those others whose ideas are on a par with his.

"The money with which the alleged revolution on the isthmus was financed came from the French Panama Canal companies, and was furnished through channels in the United States. When Dr. Amador returned in October, 1903, from the United States to Panama, he carried with him the flag of the new republic, which was made here in the United States.

For the Campaign Fund.

"It is readily susceptible of proof that large sums of money were contributed by William Nelson Cromwell to the Republican national campaign funds, the money coming directly from the treasury of the French companies, and that the first improper expenditure of money by the French companies in the United States was a contribution to the national Republican campaign fund of \$40,000.

I shall be very much surprised if, when the facts are known, there is not an overwhelming approval throughout this country of the attempts of this administration to settle the difficult question between this country and Colombia.

PROFITS ARE ENORMOUS

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This, however, is assuming that the scandal subsides. It is not certain that it will do so. The socialists are making the most of it and their organ Vorwarts, has published quantities of documentary evidence concerning it.
