



Salem, Or., July 3.—In view of the threatened car shortage in handling the big crops soon to be harvested, the state railroad commission is preparing to issue rules and suggestions for shippers, consignees and railroad com-panies, urging all of them to cooperate in keeping the car shortage down as

much as possible. Similar rules and suggestions were issued by the commission last year and had a beneficial effect. The commission will urge shippers to be more specific in their orders for cars, and to load cars promptly and to their full capacity. They will be urged not to use cars for storage, but to unload them as quickly as possible. The railroad companies will be celled on to keep the cars moving as prompt-
