

RAILROAD TO RETURN EVERY CENT STOLEN BY TRAIN ROBBERS

Restitution to Be Made, Special Agent Says, Soon as Applications Are In.

CREDIT IS GIVEN TAYLOR

Sheriff's Knowledge of Mountains Material Help in Enabling Posse to Find Trail.

Just as soon as the passengers on O. W. R. & N. train No. 5 who were robbed near Meacham last week get in their formal applications for restitution of their property every nickel will be returned, according to E. B. Wood, chief special agent of the railroad, who returned today from Pendleton.

Wood and Sheriff Till D. Taylor, of Umatilla county, who ran the robbers to earth and secured full confessions, were able to get back every scrap of stolen property. Even the \$750 diamond ring taken from a Walla Walla man was found hidden in the river.

"I won't tell you where that ring is," Meadors told Wood during the sweating process. "I can do my bit and get out, find the diamond and get more good out of it than anybody else."

Persuasion of the kind detectives and sheriffs knew so well how to employ finally induced Meadors to tell what had been done with the ring and it was found exactly where he said it was.

Mr. Wood brought back from Pendleton the big automatic pistol carried by Charles Manning, leader of the bandit gang, who was killed by Deputy Sheriff McDuffee.

The weapon is a monster, built like a cannon and shoots a .55 caliber bullet. This gun was found on Meadors. "I knew as soon as we examined the dead bandit's body that he was not Whitney," said Wood this morning. "Just because the name 'Hugh Whitney' was engraved on the watch he wore, many thought that was enough to prove him to be Whitney. But I also had a check, returned from the bank, that bore the signature 'Charles Manning.' With that to go on, we were sure it was Manning. From the special agent of the Oregon Short Line it took us less than an hour to get Manning's whole history, who his pals were and all his connections. We found that Manning for years was the real leader of the Whitney gang around Cokeville, and had won Whitney's watch at gambling."

"If we had missed Meadors and Stoner where we got them we would have nailed them at Cokeville, because they were going to lie low a while at a ranch in Idaho owned by Manning's uncle and then slip back to Cokeville."

Wood insists that credit for the capture belongs to Sheriff Taylor, who knew every mountain pass and helped him line up the posse to find the trail.

Speeds 5600 Miles To His Dying Wife

Captain Ueberroth Reaches Philadelphia From Alaska, While Son Comes From Vera Cruz to See Mrs. Ueberroth.

Philadelphia, July 8.—Captain P. H. Ueberroth of the revenue cutter service has arrived at the bedside of his probably dying wife, after a 5600 mile journey at top speed from Unalakleet to the command of the cutter McCulloch to make the trip, which he covered in 14 days. His son, Lieutenant F. E. P. Ueberroth, arrived Saturday night from Vera Cruz, where he was summoned from the battleship Vermont.

Mrs. Ueberroth was stricken with a grave illness necessitating a highly dangerous operation which she refused to undergo until she had seen her husband and son.

Boy Seeker Is Many Sided Politician

Nate Casler, Candidate for "Mayor," Is Democrat, Republican and Prohibitionist Combined, He Says.

Nate Casler, the newsboy candidate for junior mayor, told Rotarians at luncheon in the Hotel Benson yesterday afternoon that if they were politically inclined he was in a position to get all their votes. "For," said he, "I am a bit of a Democrat, some Republican and a Prohibitionist by practice." Other candidates for junior municipal offices made campaign speeches and pledges during 15 minutes allotted them by the club.

EXPORTERS ADVISED HOW TO GET TRADE OF SOUTH AMERICA

Better Packing and Live Representatives in Field Are Urgently Needed.

"The United States will never make much progress toward capturing the markets of South America until our exporters learn how to pack goods properly, and send representatives to the field who have been specially trained to the work of meeting the Americans of the southern continent on their own ground."

So declared Irving Stein, of New York, a representative of the American trading company, who has recently returned from several years' residence in Argentina. Mr. Stein is at the Benson. "In Argentina, Chile, Brazil and about everywhere else, the English and Germans divide the South American markets and do a big business," said Mr. Stein. "Notwithstanding the fact that the Argentine business men like us, and buy in quantities under the English or German label they do not patronize us direct for the reason that we don't do business their way."

"American salesmen are clever talkers, but the Germans, for example, are more clever. No German firm sends out a man until he has been schooled in his line from the bottom up. When he goes to South America he can speak Spanish or Portuguese, dependent on what field he is to cover."

"An American goes down unprepared, a stranger both to the language and customs of those with whom he is to deal."

"What happens? He walks in with an interpreter and the store man is insulted. He slams down his desk and says, 'All the Americans I'll be back in a month.'"

"When I was stationed at Buenos Aires I happened to see a shining example of how we lose trade on account of improper packing. A representative of an American garter firm landed an \$8000 order. The American consul wrote the firm and told them to take care in packing it, because shipments across the tropics need protection against both heat and dampness."

"He got a reply in which the exporter curtly said he knew how to pack. So he shipped the garters in ordinary packing cases instead of zinc and oil cloth covering as requested."

"The goods got wet, and the heat did the rest. The garters were rotted and the importer who wanted American goods went back to his German and English salesmen."

RUSSIAN RULE MADE SUBJECT OF ATTACK IN POLISH STATEMENT

Polish Municipalities Unable to Spend Money They Are Required to Furnish.

OFFICIALS ARE ANGERED

Secret Police Try to Find Out Who Wrote and Circulated Statement on Rejection of Autonomy.

Lemberg, Austrian Poland, July 8.—Vigorous efforts are being made by the Russian secret police, according to confidential information received here today, to fix responsibility for the circulation of a statement widely distributed throughout Austrian Poland, attacking the Russian imperial council's rejection of the bill to introduce municipal autonomy there.

Controlled by officials named in St. Petersburg, the statement asserts, Polish municipalities are unable to spend for their own good the money which they themselves raise by taxation, even such important cities as Warsaw and Lodz being powerless to repair so much as a broken city hall window without the governor general's and minister of the interior's sanction, often long delayed.

"In such towns," says the statement, "ruled by distant and often hostile authorities, questions of public health and education naturally receive little or no attention."

"The proportion of expenditure on education in these towns is only 7.5 per cent, while in Lemberg it is 24.7 per cent, and in some German towns as high as 45 per cent."

"In all the towns of Russian Poland there are only 33 hospitals, with a total of 4832 beds, the lowest figure in civilized Europe."

"The responsibility for this condition rests wholly on the Russian government and its barbarous rule."

Russian officialdom has shown much sensitiveness to public opinion lately and was said here to have been violently incensed when this circular was brought to official attention.

Widow Sues for Increased Sum

Josephine Doty, After Taking Non-Suit, Files Action Against Railroad and Box Company for \$50,000.

After taking a non-suit recently in the suit of Louise Josephine Doty, as administratrix of the estate of her husband, Clarence H. Doty, against the Southern Pacific company for \$7500 damages, because of Doty's death, Attorney John F. Logan and I. M. Smith yesterday filed suit for \$50,000 against the Southern Pacific and the Oregon Box & Manufacturing company on the same allegations in the name of Mrs. Doty.

Before the first suit came to trial Attorney Logan discovered evidence which he thought justified Mrs. Doty in asking greater damages than the law allows in suit for an estate. Doty was killed by a train passing through the box company's yards, and it is alleged that proper safeguards had not been installed to warn people of approaching trains.
