

MURDER CHARGES IN WINTERS' CASE FAIL OF SUBSTANTIATION

Indictments Against Doctor and His Wife and Boarder Are Dismissed.

MYSTERY IS UNEXPLAINED

Apparent Lack of Motive Either for Kidnapping or Murder of Little Catherine Winters Exists.

(United Press Special Wire.) Newcast, Ind., July 10.—Prosecutor Miller today dismissed the charges against Dr. W. A. Winters, Mrs. Winters and W. R. Cooper, a former roomer at the Winters home, who were accused of conspiracy to murder and burn the body of Catherine Winters, the doctor's 10-year-old daughter.

The charges grew out of an investigation made here several weeks ago by Robert Abel, an Indianapolis private detective, who subsequently withdrew from the case. The three defendants expressed confidence before court opened today that they would not appear to press the case, and they were certain that they would be discharged.

The arrests created a sensation here several weeks ago. The whole country had been combed in the search for the little girl, who vanished 15 months ago, when she burst into the limelight with her charge that Dr. Abel had killed and her body disposed of.

Abel based his case on the discovery of a small red sweater, a girl's hair ribbon and a man's shirt in the basement of the Winters home. He declared that a chemist's analysis would show traces of human blood on the shirt. Mrs. Winters had a plausible explanation for the presence of the articles of wearing apparel in the basement, but Abel pressed his accusations and finally caused the arrest of the trio. Each of the three defendants has been at liberty under \$1000 bond.

Catherine Winters disappeared on March 20, 1913. The child had been canvassing the neighborhood in which she lived, trying to sell needles for a church society. She was last seen late in the afternoon, and when she did not return home it was believed she had gone to the home of a neighbor for dinner. The police were not notified until the next day.

The child was the daughter of Winters by his first wife, who died several years ago. Catherine and her little brother inherited \$3000 on the death of their mother.

For many months after the disappearance of the little girl a nationwide search was made for her. The father made many trips, some to distant parts of the country, in the vain search for the whereabouts of the child. Her picture was displayed in moving picture theatres throughout the country in the hope that someone might recognize the little girl.

No Motive Discovers. From time to time reports have been circulated that Dr. Winters was not sincere in his search for the missing child and that he had used a considerable part of the funds raised to conduct the search for other than the purpose intended.

One of the most baffling features in connection with the case is the apparent lack of motive either for the kidnapping or the murder of the child. A thorough investigation was conducted on the theory that the little girl might have been stolen by gypsies, but not the slightest clue was found to support the theory. On the other hand, the circumstances of the case seemed to preclude the idea that the child may have been kidnapped for the purpose of securing a ransom. Both of these theories were ago dismissed as unreasonable by the detectives employed to investigate the case.

On the other hand, there appears to be no adequate evidence indicating a motive for the murder of the little girl. One theory advanced by the detectives connects Mrs. Winters and Cooper, and the other is that the child might have been unwelcome at the home. So far as public knowledge goes there is absolutely nothing to substantiate either theory.

There is a reward of \$2500 outstanding in connection with the case, but most of the money is for the safe return of the child alive. The mayor of Newcastle, the judges of the local courts and the bankers and leading business men of the city all have contributed to the fund and have otherwise lent their aid in the efforts that have been made to solve the mystery.

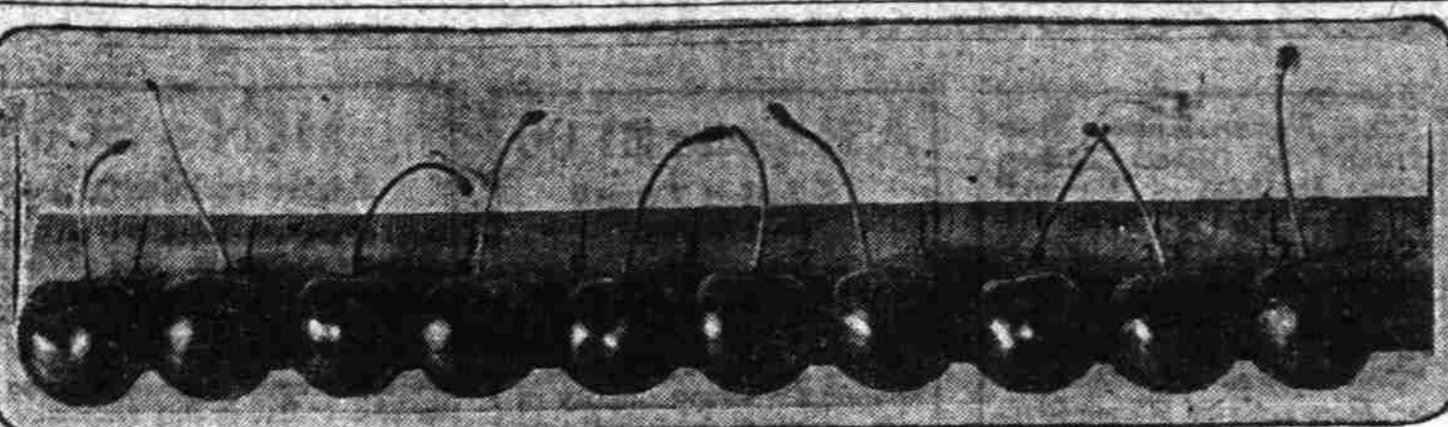

UNPOPULAR LIPTON IS IN FOR PROSECUTION IF ENEMIES HAVE WAY

Both Upper and Lower Classes Dislike Yachtsman-Tea Merchant for Own Reasons

Scandal Resulting From Payment of Commissions to Army Officers May Yet Have to Be Aired.

(United Press Special Wire.) London, July 10.—A determined effort to force the prosecution of Sir Thomas Lipton and his fellow directors in Lipton's, Ltd., on "fraud and bribery" charges, in connection with the army canteen scandal, seemed certain here today.

Regardless of the merits of the case, personal feelings unquestionably are involved in the campaign against Sir Thomas.

The famous yachtsman is by no means as popular in England as in America. The snobbish upper classes have always regarded him as an "upstart," and not even the late King Edward's influence was sufficient to get him into the exclusive Royal Yacht club. By the masses he has been accused of underpaying, overworking and oppressing his employees.

In both ranks of society, consequently, a great deal of satisfaction is openly displayed at seeing his name improved 40 per cent so far.
