

STATE TROOPS AND REGULARS CAMP FOR MILITARY INSTRUCTION

Order Established in Three Hours After Guards of Oregon and Idaho Arrive.

CAPTAIN WELCH KICKED

Half Mile Stretch at Gearhart Is Occupied by Troop Tents.

(Special to the Journal.) Camp of instruction, Gearhart, Or., July 14.—Just three hours after the Idaho and Oregon state troops arrived here for the annual camp and summer maneuvers yesterday, permanent camp had been established. The regulars who have been in since Saturday, and who have been resting up since the long hike across country, watched the process intently, and found little to criticize and much to commend.

Like the systematic unloading one sees when a big circus comes to town, the cooking apparatus was unloaded first, and by the time the almost 2000 troopers had pitched their tents, after coming in on four trains, the evening meal was ready. The camps of the regulars and of the militia looked much the same after 6 o'clock last night.

Troop carpenters yesterday erected the racks for saddles and at battery headquarters tables and benches were put together and sink holes dug. Military work proper also had its inning. On the sand dunes in front of the camp Captain Tebbitts gave his men instruction in extended order skirmish drill, while the battery teams were maneuvered up and down and the cannoneers drilled in camp at the guns.

It was very foggy and misty this morning. Twenty-one hundred men are in camp. This is the largest military gathering the state has ever had. Today is being given over to company drill in close and extended order. This afternoon officers, commissioned and non-commissioned, are receiving lectures. The regulars are getting the most strenuous workout, as they are here as model troopers for the militia men.

Captain H. U. Welch escaped serious injury yesterday morning, when the horse he was attempting to mount plunged and struck him with his hoofs. He was slightly bruised, but mounted later and continued the drill.

Lieutenant Colonel Morrison, of the Vancouver battalion, of the militia, of the company is favorably impressed with the efficiency already shown by the state troops.

The camp is spread for nearly half a mile north and east of Gearhart.

Holman is gratified. "I am very much gratified because the Taxpayers' league has authorized an investigation," said Commissioner Holman, who asked the Taxpayers' league to authorize an inquiry.

PORTLAND'S NEW BOY MAYOR ELECTED AS DARK HORSE

Junior Government Election Material Help in Reducing Debt Against Home.

His Honor the Mayor! That's the title just acquired by Eugene J. Rich, Portland's new boy mayor, who was elected as a dark horse in a field of four.

Young Rich is 18 years old, a graduate of the Couch school and the son of St. S. Rich, a local cigar dealer. He promises to give the city the best government he knows how and will appoint his secretary and chief of police in the near future.

The newly elected officials will be inducted into office under the auspices of the order of Muts, while it is also rumored that they will be given a trip to the Panama Pacific exposition. Of the original \$8000 mortgage due on the Newsboys' Home, \$520.71 still remains to be paid.

The four commissioners elected are Stella Riggs, Archie Weinstein, Julius Steinberg and Norman Youmans. Abraham T. Weinstein is district attorney and will have as his deputies I. Edward Tonkon and Abe Weinstein. Morris Rogaway, auditor, has chosen as his secretary Joe Snitzer.

Food Law Violations Against Pocketbook

Portland, Maine, July 14.—The eighteenth annual convention of the American Association of State and

Federal Dairy, Food and Drug officials, which opened here today, proved to be the most largely attended of any meeting of its kind ever held in the United States.

The commissioners were stirred to enthusiasm by the ringing address of James H. Wallis, Food and Drug commissioner of Idaho and president of the association. Commissioner Wallis took strong ground in favor of uniformity of food and drug laws, but declared that uniformity should not be made a cloak to emasculate strong statutes but that the weak laws must be made to conform to the strong.

Referring to frauds perpetrated under the food laws, President Wallis said: "Not all violations of our food laws are attacks upon health. Many of them are assaults upon the pocketbook. During the year in many states strong and effective efforts were made to stamp out some of these frauds. The vast majority of food manufacturers are honest and square, but occasionally we find one who conceives it necessary to his success to hoodwink the public regarding the quality or quantity of the particular food he sells. Such a one is no better than he who pilfers from the public in other ways and he should be dealt with accordingly."

Employe of Bank Reported Missing

Carroll D. Hurlbert, in Charge of Mailing Dept. of First National, Not Heard From Since Going on Vacation.

Carroll D. Hurlbert, in charge of the mailing department of the First National bank, with which he has been connected for about seven years, is missing and his wife, relatives and bank officials are at a loss to account for his disappearance.

He left Portland June 30 for his vacation and said he was going to Silver City, Idaho, where he has a mining property, situated about 15 miles from Silver City.

Nothing has been heard from him. Prior to his departure, it is said he arranged his business affairs and made over some stocks to his wife, who was formerly Miss Elmhurst, daughter of Robert Elmhurst, of 890 Xavier street.

According to telegraphic dispatches from Silver City, Hurlbert has not been seen since he left. Neither has the bank nor his wife received any communication from him.

Mr. and Mrs. Hurlbert lived with the wife's parents in the Seaver street home. They had been married three years.

At the First National it was stated today that his affairs are in good shape. His vacation was to have ended July 4.

Hurlbert was a member of the Oregon militia. Before he entered the employ of the First National he worked for the Bank of California and for the Ladd & Tilton bank.

Negro Murderer's Gun Cheats Mob

After Killing Rancher's Wife Near El Centro, Cal., He Flees to the Desert, Where He Commits Suicide.

El Centro, Cal., July 14.—After hundreds of men had searched the desert all night for William Weaver, a negro, who had murdered Mrs. J. A. Marchus, his body was found today near Seeley. He had committed suicide by thrusting a revolver into his mouth and sending a bullet through the top of his head.

Weaver entered the Marchus ranch house near Seeley at midnight and fired at Marchus and his wife as they lay asleep. The bullet passed through Marchus' hand and killed his wife. He then committed suicide.

The husband telephoned the news to El Centro and took the negro's trail after exchanging several shots with him before he escaped.

The first shot was rung and within an hour 300 armed men were on the desert. Other possees worked out of Seeley and Dixieland. Captain Hammond, commanding the United States cavalry at Calexico, ordered a troop held in readiness to join the search today.

The cause of the shooting had not been learned.
