

SCHOOL BOARD WINS VICTORY IN LAND SUIT TO ACQUIRE 8 LOTS

Condemnation Case First One
Which Has Been Won by
People in Years.

SUM OF \$5500 AWARDED

Joseph Nash, owner, had asked \$5500
and \$500 for damages to re-
maining property.

In the condemnation proceedings of the Portland school district against Joseph Nash, on trial before Judge Kavanagh, wherein the school district seeks to acquire all of block 2, Slegner's Park, adjoining Richmond school, the jury brought in a verdict today awarding Nash \$5500 for the block, \$500 for damages to the adjoining property, and requiring the school district to assume street improvements to the amount of about \$2500.

Block 2, Slegner's addition, was assessed in 1912 and 1913 for \$2500, which is 45.4 per cent of the amount today awarding Nash \$5500 for the block, \$500 for damages to the adjoining property, and requiring the school district to assume street improvements to the amount of about \$2500.

About a year ago the school board undertook to buy the block at private sale. At that time Nash put a price on it of \$7000, the board making a counter offer of \$6000, which Nash declined to consider. The verdict of \$5500 returned this morning is exactly what the board offered for the property one year ago.

During the past year expensive street improvements have been made in the Richmond district, amounting to \$2305.41, against the eight lots involved in the suit. This sum the jury required the school district to assume.

In the condemnation trial Nash asked for \$5500 for the lots, \$500 damages resulting from the destruction of a barn and \$500 damages to the remainder of the lots. He admitted in his testimony that in 1911 he offered to sell 22 lots, including the eight condemned by the school district, to Deputy Assessor Funk for \$4000.

The suit to condemn the Nash property is the first suit of the kind instituted by the school district in a number of years. Every effort to acquire land for public purposes by condemnation for 10 years past has uniformly resulted in the public paying more than the land could have been bought for at private sale.

The fact that juries in condemnation suits habitually awarded owners more than they asked for their land has had the effect of discouraging public functionaries from condemning land required for public uses, but it is believed that the expense of the school board in the Nash case will result in more of this class of litigation being instituted by governmental bodies.

Father Lanion Is Killed by Horse

Father Paul Lanion, O. S. B., chaplain for the sisters of Mt. Angel college, was killed yesterday when a horse he was riding struck the college and threw him over its head. Father Lanion died five hours later in the college hospital. The funeral is to be held from the chapel at Mt. Angel college Monday morning. Father Lanion was especially well known among the students of the college, having been the chaplain there for a number of years. He is survived by his mother, four brothers and two sisters, all of whom are residents of this state.

Secured No License For Loan Business

Secondhand Man Is Convicted in Municipal Court; Defendant Says He Has Been Persecuted.

A fine of \$15 was given Sam Levine this morning in municipal court for conducting a loan business without obtaining a license. Levine has a secondhand store at Second and Couch streets, where he is accused by the police of doing a brokerage business on the loan.

To ascertain how he conducts the store, a man with two suits of clothes to pawn was sent to the place. Levine loaned him \$4. Three days later the man returned and was charged \$8 to get the two suits, as Levine claimed he pressed the clothing and wanted interest on the loan.

In court, Levine claimed the clothing was sold him, then he resold it to the same man and pawned it to the pawn broker's ordinance. Levine also complained that officers have chased him from one place to another and that he has been persecuted for a delinquent for larceny, for which he was convicted and sent to prison.

Worle's Plans for Great Noise on Flatboat Excursion Get Setback
Straight From Headquarters.

J. Ed Worle, general chairman of the Flatboat excursion committee, has been overruled and one of the largest police officers on the Portland force has been made a member of the excursion and deputized to frustrate one of Mr. Worle's plans, which was to have noise and stunts every minute of the time after the excursion leaves at midnight tomorrow until the close of the entertainment in Seattle Saturday night.

The officer will not, however, wear his usual uniform and helmet. He will wear a Royal Scottish uniform and play a tuba in the band. But at night time on the train the officer will be on call to subdue any noise started by Mr. Worle or anyone else, so that those who want to sleep may do so without disturbance. recognition would be withheld from anyone he might appoint, and Carranza unquestionably was, in effect, his appointee.

Following official confirmation from General Huerta of the news that General Carranza had been succeeded by Francisco Carranza as president of Mexico, Secretary of War Garrison said today that he did not contemplate withdrawing American troops from Vera Cruz immediately.

It was understood that the administration's plan was to continue in occupation of the Mexican port until conditions seemed to be thoroughly and permanently settled.

Experts Federalists to Disperse.
Funston added, however, that he expected the federalists who have remained in the vicinity of Vera Cruz will disperse at once. Their number has been greatly reduced since the city was occupied, by withdrawal of detachment after detachment of the capital. Funston reported also that the British cruiser Bristol had left Vera Cruz for northern destination. He did not know and the German cruiser Dresden had gone to Puerto Mexico. He believed one of them would take Harts and ex-War Minister Blanquet to Europe.

Bedwood Trees Shown.
Pictures of the famous California sequoia or redwood trees were used by J. D. Stafford as illustrations of the kind of Oregon timber he was exploiting, according to the evidence of J. D. Stafford, a San Francisco chauffeur, who was yesterday afternoon in court. Stafford admitted that he did some "locating" himself. One of the pictures was taken among the giant trees of Salavara county at the suggestion of Logan, who said it would be a good "boost" picture. Stafford testified that he was Logan's chauffeur for six months, and did nothing else excepting to boost "for this O. C. stuff," for which he received \$50 extra in addition to his salary of \$20 a week. Stafford estimated that during this time, Logan sold more than 100 locations at \$150.00 apiece.

"Logan was serious and business-like when there was business on hand," Stafford asserted, "but the thing was a joke to him and me, too."

"Did you ask him to do the merits of the proposition," queried Mr. Reames.

"I asked him once about it," Stafford answered, "and he kind of laughed and said they might have a chance in 10 years or so."

The glowing advertisements in the newspapers, Stafford said, were lures merely to get in touch with the people who wanted to invest.

Says He Knows Game Well.
On cross-examination, Stafford said he not only had heard Logan say these things, but that he knew the game because he had worked in the logging business. He admitted the transaction of location business in Nevada, under the grilling of Attorney J. Charles Dennis, Logan's counsel.

R. McClelland, Los Angeles notary public, testified that he was called to take acknowledgments for Logan 200 or 300 times in the course of a year during 1913 and 1914. McClelland indicated that he was well acquainted with the methods used, describing them as he heard through conversations in the office between Logan and the applicants accurately.

M. N. Warren, postal inspector of San Francisco, was placed on the stand by Mr. Reames early yesterday afternoon. He read the following letters, described in The Journal yesterday, were sent to Logan as decoys.

A. Karppoff, a Berkeley machinist, said he paid \$50 and more for a location because he suspected there was something wrong when a man could get a profit of \$2500 or more on an investment of \$150.
