HEAVY BUSINESS IS EXPECTED AS SOON AS CANAL IS OPENED

Several Steamers Are Available for Immediate Service Through Waterway.

ALASKA LINE MAY PROFIT

Telegraphic Announcement From New York Received Here With the Reenest Enthusiasm.

Telegraphic announcement made in The Journal last night to the effect that the Panama canal would be open by July 31, has been met with a chorus of delight and satisfaction by Portland steamship men. The continued delays and the expectancy have raised havoc with the shipping of all Pacific coast ports, and it is believed that an era of prosperity is due for all steamship lines now.

The announcement that the canal would be open by July 31, was made yesterday by General Manager Alcock of the Pacific Steam Navigation company. As head of one of the most powerful steamship companies in America, it is believed he is in a position

The expectancy of lower rates with the opening of the canal has resulted in the accumulation on the eastern coast of thousands of tons of freight. Wholesalers in this district are said have run with depleted stocks for months, using only what material they absolutely had to have, in order to be able to take advantage of the first lower rates to go into effect with the opening of the great waterway.

Should the canal open by July 31, steamship companies plying to and out of Portland will be in excellent shape to take advantage of their opportunity. The American-Hawaiian Steamship company has three steamers in Pacific waters, which can be sent back through the canal. It also has two steamers in the North Atlantic which can be rushed out here by way

W. R. Grace & Co. will have three steamers here during the last week in July and the first two in August, all of which will be sent through. The British steamers Colusa and Cuzco and the American steamer Santa Cecclia will all load here within the next five

weeks.

The Portland Steamship company,
Portland's Alaska line, is also expected to reap great benefit from the opening of the canal. The already heavy shipments of canned salmon from the north are expected to be greatly enlarged, as their steamers will be able to give fast service to the Daldoren, Br. str.

NEW RECORD FOR LOADING Steamer Leggett Given Unusually

Quiet Dispatch.

(Special to The Journal.)
Aberdeen, Wash., July 18.—After a trifle over 14 hours of loading, the steamer John A. Hooper with 2,350,000 feet of railroad ties cleared this afternoon, breaking in one trip three rec-ords for fast loading, for a single water shipment of railroad ties, and the largest domestic shipment to leave the

The Hooper will cross the bar drawing 20 feet. The Hooper arrived Thursday morning at 11 o'clock and in departing had been in harbor 53 hours, he Hooper did not load overtime, and during the course of loading shifted from the Grays Harbor Lumber mill in Hoquiam to the Aberdeen Lumber and Shingle mill, Aberdeen.

The best known loading record ever made by a steam vessel was the Francis M. Leggett, which loaded 1,600,000 feet of lumber and cleared in 23 hours This is a world's record. The Leggett worked overtime and her record cannot be compared to that of the Hooper in time of actual loading. The argest cargo of railroad ties ever to leave this port before has not exceeded one million feet. Locally the cargo of the Hooper has been exceeded only by foreign tramp vessels going to foreign ports. Destination is San Pedro.
