

DON MORRISON HIGH AMATEUR IN OPENING DAY PACIFIC SHOOT

L. H. Reid of Seattle Tops All Professionals With the Score of 146 Out of 150.

BIG HANDICAP TOMORROW

Diamond Medal for Winner; Shooters From All Over the Country in Attendance.

Low scores were general in the opening events of the ninth annual Pacific coast handicap of the Interstate association at the traps of the Portland Gun club at Jenne station yesterday.

Don Morrison, the Portland club shooter, was his amateur during the day, with the score of 141 out of a possible 150.

The best score of the day was made in the professional ranks, L. H. Reid of Seattle taking the honors.

Shooters from one end of the Pacific slope to the other, and from the Pacific ocean to the Atlantic seaboard entered in the shooting of 150 birds.

Poor scores started in event No. 1, and continued throughout the 15 events.

Some excellent scores were made in the doubles event, R. J. Starkey, an Idaho shooter, broke 45 out of 50.

Today's events will consist of five strings of 20 birds each.

Dr. M. M. Bull of Eugene, Or., who won the Pacific coast title in 1912, has not arrived for this season's shoot.

The handicap committee, appointed during the shooting yesterday, met last evening at the Imperial hotel and decided on the handicaps for the preliminary event.

Julius Subr, one of the shooters entered in the tournament, recently came to Portland from Cogn Rapids, Iowa.

Guy Eggers is the lone shooter here from Pasco, Wash.

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ED WALSH'S RETURN TO OLD TIME SHAPE SEEMS REAL THING

Big Reel Takes It Easy Until He Gets in Pinch Then the Spitters Come.

CALLAHAN IS HAPPY MAN

White Sox Manager Says They've Worked Over Walsh as if He Were Sick Child Trying to Cure Arm.

By Hal Sheridan. New York, July 21.—The return to form of Big Ed Walsh, Chicago White Sox star spitball pitcher, who shut out New York last week in the first full game he had pitched this season, was still discussed today with keen interest in baseball haunts.

Fans, ball players and sport writers watched Walsh with peculiar interest when he pitched his old-time strike as he settled into his old-time stride after his long absence from the diamond.

"He doesn't seem to have anything," said the press box said. "There's no speed on the ball and it comes over straight as a string."

"He's old enough to use the 'Matty system,'" suggested Henry Fabian, the ground keeper, who used to be a big leaguer. "That's what he's doing now. Wait till he gets into a hole."

In the seventh inning Walsh began to show his real cunning. With two on bases, he broke three spitballs across the heart of the plate and sent them sailing over the fence.

No bush in possession of his first big league victory was ever happier than was Manager Jimmy Callahan after the game.

"It was a hard pull," he said, "and you can't imagine my relief at seeing the old boy step up there and pitch in his old-time form. We have worked and fretted over Big Ed as if he would ever be a sick child, and at last we have been rewarded. Walsh is now ready to go in and take his regular turn, if he has no setback we will come mighty near knocking those Athletics off their perch."

In the series with the Mackens last week, however, Chicago ran into a lot of hard luck and dropped all three games played. Opening today at Washington, Callahan hoped to overhaul the Red Sox, Senators and Tigers.

GUARDSMEN ENGAGE IN WAR MANEUVERS AT GEARHART CAMP

In the afternoon the Twenty-first Oregon battery and cavalry are scheduled to return to Portland today.

Will Open Land In Umpqua Forest

Sixteen Sections Included in Acreage to Be Opened to Entry to Homesteaders Next Fall.

Roseburg, Or., July 21.—An order has been received at the Roseburg land office to the effect that 16 sections of land, formerly a part of the Umpqua national forest reserve, will be opened to entry to homesteaders on October 2.

The purpose of removing this land from the forest reserve is thought to be to make the reserve more regular and the remaining portions easier to patrol.

The sections of land open to entry are situated in three townships, 20 to 24, and 26 to 29, inclusive, and 32, 33 and 34 in townships 26-8, section 4, township 27-8, and sections 10 and 14, township 28-9.

Hunger Strike in Walla Walla Jail

Woman Causes Police Considerable Trouble After Cutting Her Husband and Two of His Companions.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 21.—Having severely cut her husband and two of his companions with a pocket knife Saturday night while trying to persuade her spouse to go home, Mrs. Cal Davis kicked, scratched and bit three police officers who took her to the city jail, broke several windows in the city hall with her shoes, and jammed the lock on her cell door in such a manner that it took a locksmith several hours to open the door.

Now transferred to the county jail, the woman has gone on a hunger strike. County officials say they will not use force in feeding Mrs. Davis.
